Fire Sweeps LaSalle Hotel In Windy City

CHICAGO, June 5 (AP) — Fire killed 58 persons and injured 200 others early today in the Loop La Salle hotel, and safety, engineers, and architectural experts sought to establish how the blaze started and why the blaze spread so fast in the "strictly fireproof" hostelry. Within a few minutes after flames were first discovered leaking out from a dummy elevator door off the main lobby, the first three floors of the 22-story building were engulfed in fire. Patrons in the floors above opened their doors and windows to investigate the smoke and sound

of fire engines. This concerted move, the firemen said, created a great draft from top to bottom of the 37-year-old hotel, sucking flames, smoke and gasses up the elevator shaft.

The hotel management asserted there was no delay in notifying the fire department and that "every precaution" had been taken to provide for the safety of the public.

Hotel officials said all equipment was "spotlessly clean" and in perfect condition to meet an emergency, and asserted investigation would show "panic and heavy smoke caused more deaths and injury than actual fire."

Truman Selects Council Delegate

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP) — Senator Warren R. Austin, lifelong Vermont republican, lawyer and advocate of international peace organization, was named by President Truman today to succeed Edward R. Stettinius, jr., as American representative on the United Nations Security council.

Selection of the 68-year old senator from the ranks of the president's nominal party opposition gave a bi-partisan tone to Mr. Truman's foreign policy development, for the United Nations post is one of the most important diplomatic jobs in the president's power to fill.

Meantime Herschel Johnson, deputy American representative to the Security council, will represent the United States in United Nations affairs.

Working with plenty of poise and brilliant control, Block fanned 11 and gave up only two walks, both in the ninth inning.

Robin Roberts, who pitched one of the best games of his career as a Spartan, permitted

only four hits and saw both of Michigan's runs scored unearned.

As well as hurling his club to the victory, Block was credited with knocking in the winning Wolverine run. Michigan loaded the bases in the seventh, Roberts walking the third man up, Elmer Swanson, to pitch to Block.

The Ministry of the Interior announced that with only a few ballots still to be counted, voters in favor of a republic led by 1,820,146.

Student Wages to be Increased 20 Per Cent; President Explains Reasons for Move; Student Council Will Sponsor Meeting

Admitting that the announcement of the raise in dormitory fees had been handled badly, Pres. John A. Hannah yesterday gave out three reasons for the increase. In an official discussion with eight members of the student body, the President stated that increased per capita debt charge, rising labor cost and rising food prices were the primary reasons for the raise.

The student committee met with Hannah, Merrill R. Hanson, assistant comptroller, Emery G. Foster, manager of dormitory and food service, tonight before them a slate of questions.

When asked for a published itemized account of where the student's money for room and board went, President Hannah said "The administration is not engaged in airing controversy in newspapers and magazines, nothing is gained by that. Books are available to anyone who wants to see them."

The President said that the increased per capita debt charge is caused by the construction of new dormitories, which are costing much more than similar buildings constructed at an earlier date.

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
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


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President Hannah States Facts And Figures On Raise In Dorm Rent

 fer time. All the money for room and board from all dormitories goes into a common fund, he added.

He announced that wages of students employed by the college will be raised to 60c July 1, an increase of 20 per cent, while the cost of living has been upped only 13.5 per cent.

Foster said that room rent in the dormitories was remaining the same, that is \$4.25 a week. He said that the additional money is for the cost of board. He estimated that food cost had risen up to 30 per cent here at the college. This has not been caused only by a rise in food prices, but a limited choice often causes the college food service to buy more expensive items than were formerly purchased.

The new rate for board is set on the basis of \$1.40 per day. Figures for the increase were based on rise in the cost of operation for the last two months. Foster added that only by the strictest economy would they be able to break even, even under the new rates.

Representatives from Abbot hall suggested a boarding sys-

tem whereby the students pay a set fee for a meal ticket. This ticket would be punched according to the number of meals actually eaten in the dorm. At the end of the term the student

would have returned to him an amount of money proportional to the meals missed.

Foster said this plan would not be feasible, explaining that all meals are planned and ordered

for a week in advance. He added that the rates have been set, taking into consideration that students miss some meals.

Later in the day when Foster was approached on the question

of whether fraternities and societies would be forced to pay their room and board in conformity to that of the college, he said that it was entirely up to individual organizations.
