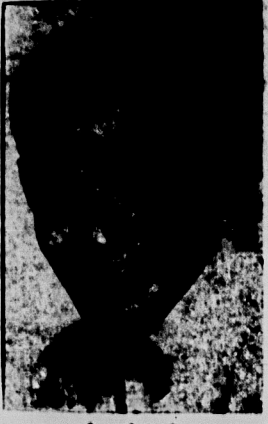

Students Discuss FEPC Legislation For Michiganders

Representatives of student organizations attended a Fair Employment Practices committee meeting Thursday night to discuss race discrimination in Michigan.

Dr. Marshall Knappen, formerly of the history department, talked about the proposed Michigan Fair Employment Practices act, which would make it illegal for an employer to discriminate against an employee on the basis of race, creed, or color.

The Fair Employment Practices committee is backed by Protestant, Jewish, and Catholic organizations, Knappen revealed. Also supporting it are the Civil Rights congress, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and the CIO.

Representatives from YW callinets, the American Legion, Hillel, Student council, and the American Veterans' committee will report to their respective organizations. All students who wish to circulate petitions for a state FEPC should contact these groups.

# State Marching Band Develops Formations That Need As Much Planning As Grid Plays

Turning a chess game on a ping-pong table into a between-halves band exhibition may sound like a Rube Goldberg maneuver, but it happens every week at Michigan State.

That's the method behind the intricate formations turned out by the band. Leonard Falcone and his marching band at Spartan football games. For sheer complexity, it rivals the efforts of Coach Charles Bachman's blackboard strategists and their flying "Z's".

Ideas for the band's formation of the day may come from any member of the band. Usually, though, they're the brain children of a flexible committee headed by Falcone and including Major Morgan Brakonecke, of the military science department,

Frank Peabody, graduate student from Birmingham; David Lindsay, Williamston freshman; Norman Kohl, Coldwater senior; Walter Dow, Petoskey senior; and James Wooley, Elsie junior, all band members.

**Ping-Pong Table Enters**  
The committee sits through suggestions and picks one for its adaptability and fitness. Then the ping-pong table enters the picture. On its surface is traced a football field and, with this as its proving ground, the committee tries out the prospective formation.

At this stage, the table looks like the floor of a kindergarten. The committee members arrange blocks with all the concentration of five-year olds, but they have

more in mind than the construction of a toy house.

Each of those blocks represents a member of the band, and the committee's concentration mirrors its effort to fit anything from an oil derrick to a Mississippi showboat into the limitations of an 80-piece band.

Too, there's the problem of keeping trombones in the front rows, a policy deemed necessary in view of the damage a trombone slide can do to an unprotected neck. A further consideration is keeping the drums in the center of the formation for rhythm purposes.

**Based on Rank System**  
Finally, since Michigan State's band operates on the rank sys-

tem, it must be determined whether the formation in mind can be developed with this system. The system bases its formations primarily on rank and file movements which insure a clean maneuver and keep the band sections intact.

If the formation meets all these requirements, the entire plan is mimeographed and distributed to the band. Each band member has a number and the mimeographed sheet reveals his place in the formation.

Then with Major Brakonecke, the band's drill master, at the helm, the band marches. It marches for an hour and a half on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday. Then on Saturday it marches again, this time for only a few minutes. The result is the half time entertainment cheered by Spartan grid fans.

**Enrollment Peak to Come**  
The college financial difficulties resulted from a decision of the state administration to advance the previous appropriation as needed to care for the influx of veteran students. Authorities of the veterans administration estimate that the peak in college enrollment will not come for at least three or four years and then total college enrollment will not be close to three-times the present figure.

"We have not begun any building that was not originally planned for 7,000 students," Hannah stated, "and we may have close to 20,000 students in two or three years."

# Catholics Will Open New Student Center

## Will Have Social, Study Space

From the subterranean chamber called the "Spartan Room" to the "Pent-House" apartment of the Newman club's new Catholic student center, evidence of careful consideration and excellent execution in providing a "home away from home" for Catholic students at Michigan State college can be seen.

Located at 117 Fern street the center will be opened shortly, but formal dedication will not take place until Dec. 8.

The entire fund to decorate and equip the center has been raised by donations of the Catholic students, their families, friends and various Catholic organizations.

### Tip To Follow

Whether the Spartan room shall be equipped with card, pool or pingpong tables or used for some special purpose will be for the men to decide. This room is reserved exclusively for their use.

The distinction of being the most popular room on the first floor may be about evenly divided between the lounge, Little Theater, and the snack bar.

Many a pleasant hour will be passed away by Newman club members on the polished oak floor of the lounge to music provided by the new RCA recorder. Other features of this room include cushioned window seats and a fire place.

### May Use Kitchen

Those who wish to display their proficiency in the kitchen will have unlimited opportunity to go behind the well equipped snack bar. Miss Katherine Hart, professor of institute administration and supervision of Union food service, and Miss Katherine Maahs, also of the college, designed the kitchen and snack bar and supervised the buying of equipment.

On the second floor, activities of a more serious nature will be conducted in the assembly room, library and general office.

Lake the lounge, the assembly will have built-in window seats and plenty of comfortable modern chairs. A loud speaker connected to the lounge radio will provide music for dancing on special occasions.

### Well Stocked Library

The well stocked library will contain books, pamphlets and reference material that can be used in conjunction with the various courses taught at MSC.

Miss Jesse Marion, professor in home furnishings, and Mrs. E. B. Hill, wife of Professor Hill, head of the department of farm management, rendered invaluable assistance in planning the furnishings and interior decoration.

# Russians Approve Governor's Powers For Trieste Area

NEW YORK, Nov. 15 (AP)—The western powers scored a major victory today in obtaining Russian acknowledgment that the government of Trieste should have single-handed power to take action in the event of an emergency.

Struggling with the terms of the peace pact for Italy, the council of foreign ministers spent three hours pinned down to the problem of who should have the authority to "call the cops" in the event of trouble in Trieste.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov agreed that "in a situation that permits no delay" the governor should have complete authority to use the police, according to persons present at the council's deliberations.

Both Secretary of State James F. Byrnes and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin took the position that the question of police authority in Trieste was the "nuts" of the whole dispute.

The volume of liquid fuel shipped overseas in the last year by the Navy and the Merchant Marine was nearly 16 times that of 1941. Overseas forces required nearly twice as many tons of oil as all other supplies combined.

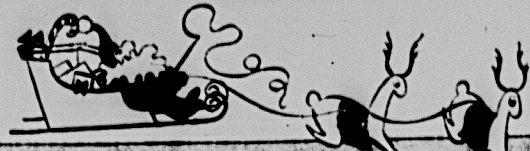
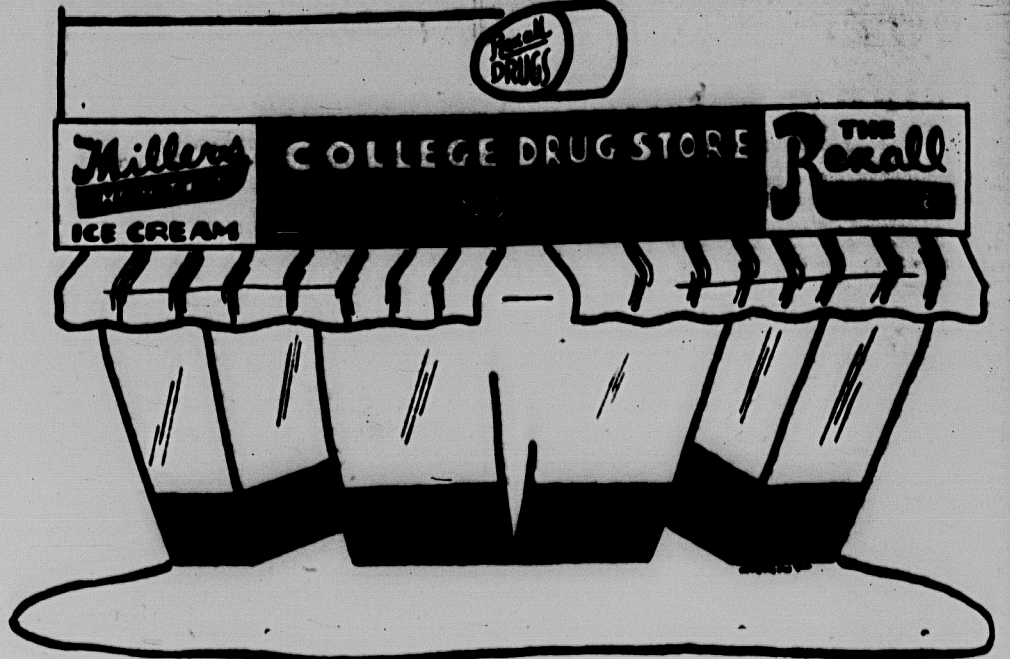

# Lewis - Defies Government; Miners To Strike Wednesday Midnight

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (AP)—Defying a plea from President Truman and a ruling of the Attorney General, John L. Lewis "terminated" his contract with the government today—an action which sets a nation-wide soft coal strike for midnight Wednesday.

Negotiations under way since

Nov. 1 blew up with a bang when Secretary of the Interior Krug, backed by Mr. Truman, insisted that Lewis bargain for his new wage demands with the operators instead of with the government. The operators agreed. But Lewis cried "sheer folly and empty platitude," and flatly refused.

"We do not propose to be driven like dumb beasts to the slaughter of slow strangulation envisioned by your proposal and the operators well known and long used tactics of evasion and delay."

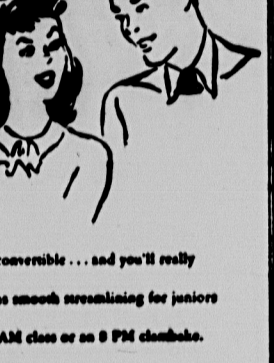
Lewis then carried out his original threat to declare his contract with the government terminated, and served a five-day notice for this purpose. The deadline on this is Wednesday midnight, and the 400,000 bituminous miners traditionally do not work without a contract—hence the prospective strike.

The Smith-Connally act forbids anyone to promote a strike in a government-owned industry.

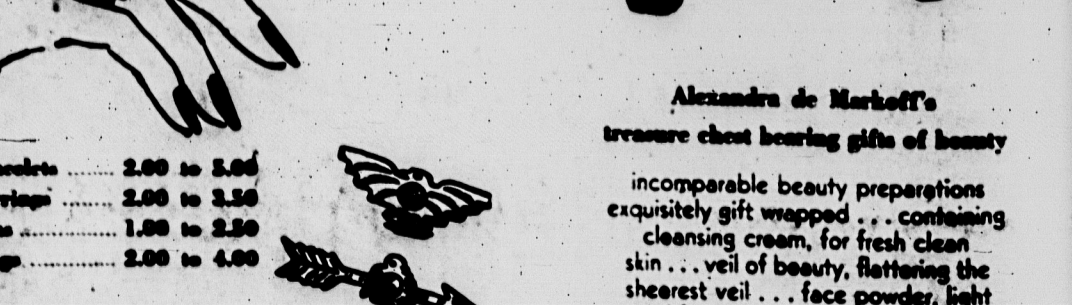

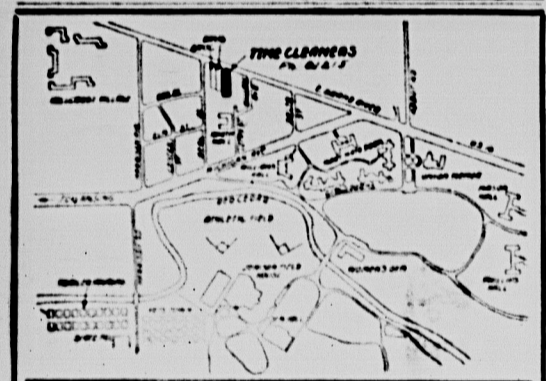
