

# UMW Strike Forces Coal Rationing Upon Nation

## Capitol Delegates Remaining Supplies To Essential Work

### Lewis Claims Legality Of Action: Trial Date Set For Wednesday

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—Officials acted to ration coal to schools and government buildings throughout the nation tonight as John L. Lewis told a court he stands on his contract termination notice and was ordered to trial for contempt.

## Gas Companies Will Expand Pipe Lines

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—Spokesmen for three pipe line companies told the House surplus property committee today their companies were prepared to move natural gas through the big and little inch lines to the east in from two to four weeks.

Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough, warning unions to beware of "arousing such public feeling as to induce Congress to do something which may set the labor movement back for years," ordered Lewis to trial starting Wednesday.

A judgement can scarcely be reached before next week, however, and there was every indication that the soft coal strike will continue at least until then.

Coal to be Rationed  
Against that black background developments came crowding:

1. The Solid Fuels Administration decreed that schools and federal, state and city government offices seeking any of the meager emergency supplies of soft coal which the government has frozen must apply to Washington for it. Utilities, food plants, hospitals and other essential users were given preference over schools and government offices and may order direct from dealers.

2. The Civilian Production Administration ordered an immediate and rigid check by its regional offices to see that the 21-state amount is observed. This widespread power and lighting curtailment, ordered last week, went into force at 6 p. m. local time tonight.

3. U. S. Steel corporation subsidiaries announced a drastic curtailment of operations starting tomorrow. This followed curtailments already made by other steel mills.

4. Senator Fulbright (D-Ark.) renewed his call for President Truman to resign in favor of a Republican. He declared in a radio forum that the president cannot speak to Lewis with the full authority of an officer. He and other Congressmen also advanced fresh proposals to curb strikes.

5. Virginia authorities started legal action against Lewis under the state "Blue Sky" law. They ordered him to appear Monday to show cause why he should not be arrested.

## Braggiotti, Chaikin, Piano Duo, To Perform Here Next Week

Mario Braggiotti and Jack Chaikin, the famous duo-pianists will give two concerts, under the Lecture-concert series, the first to be presented next Tuesday, the second the following night.

Mario, an international figure of the talented Braggiotti family, has achieved distinction as a soloist, composer, conductor, and arranger. Founder of the headline teams of "Fray and Braggiotti" and "Braggiotti and Shaw," both disbanded during war years, he formed his new association with his present partner, after V-J day.

Born in Italy, one of eight children, Braggiotti was brought up in a musical atmosphere. During both World Wars he played cello and piano for the wounded.

He received his education at the Boston Conservatory of Music and the Conservatoire in Paris, making his debut at the Salle Pleyel soon after he and Jacques Fray organized the piano team, which pioneered in bringing jazz to the concert hall. Fray was called for government service and Braggiotti continued two transcontinental tours with pianist Walter Shaw.

In 1943 he was sent to Italy to serve as radio director with the Psychological Warfare branch of the Allied Military occupation. After the liberation of Italy he helped reorganize its musical culture and appeared as soloist in several symphonic festivals.

Partner from Brooklyn  
Jack Chaikin, brilliant young partner of Braggiotti was a musical prodigy, born and brought up in Brooklyn, New York. By the time he was six, he was a scholarship to the David Mannes School of Music in New York City, studying there till he was 17.

He won a second scholarship, to the Juillard Graduate school from which he graduated in 1942, making his debut that same year. A chaplain's assistant during the war, he was honorably discharged in 1946, after which he auditioned and became associated with Mario Braggiotti.

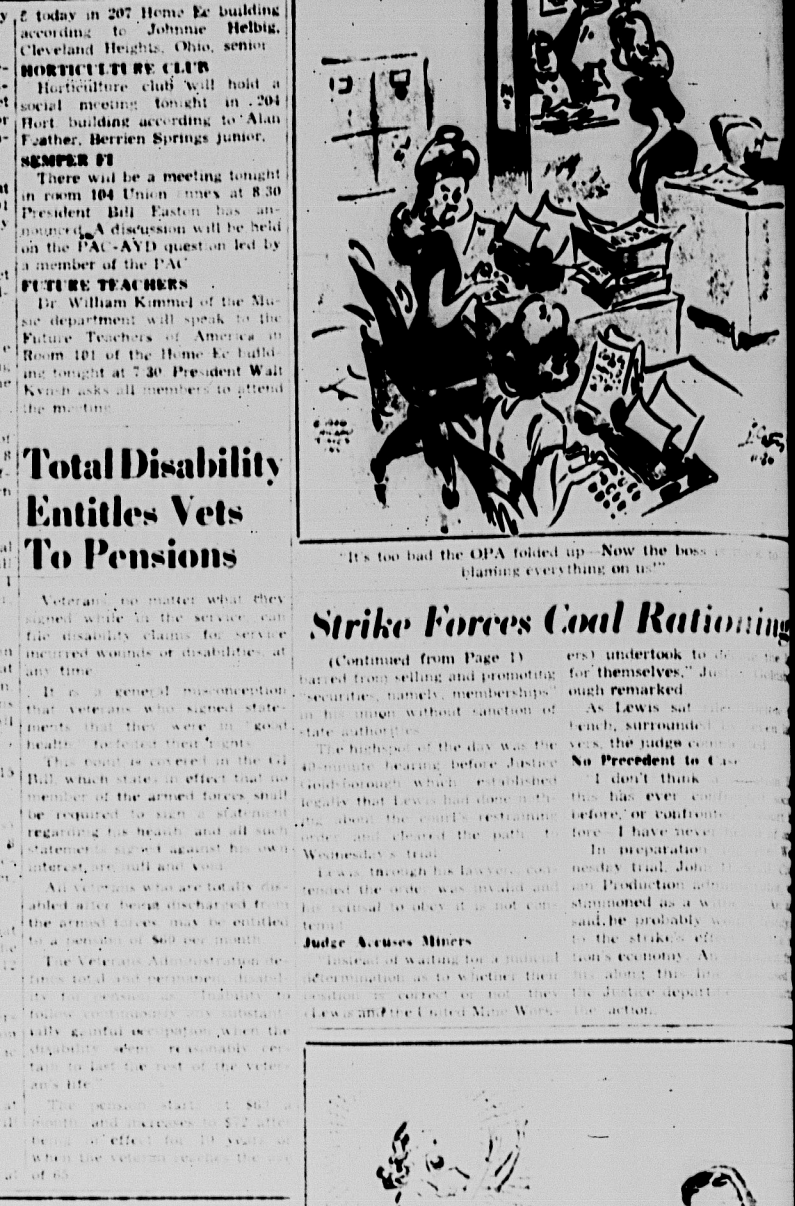

Finishing a scant second behind Brelsford was Stone, and three seconds later Thompson, the slight Texas runner who had led for the last half mile, crossed the line.

The repeaters were the Drake squad, winning their third straight in set on team points. Drake held the amazingly low score of 42 points, the second lowest in the NCAA history, beaten only by their own mark of 25, made in 1944.

Jack Dianetti led Spartan hill-and-dalers as he placed 14th. Other State men finishing in the first group were Ed Kuzenski, 39th, and Jim Gibbard, 50th.

# Molotov, Byrnes Stage Parley

## Seek To Break UN Stagnation Of Business

NEW YORK, Nov. 23 (AP)—In a secret session, Secretary of State Byrnes and Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov were playing a two-handed game of showdown today aimed at settling their differences on the peace pact for the attack on Germany.

The meeting, which was held in Molotov's building, lasted for an hour and a quarter. The nature of the conversation remained secret. The fact that the Soviet government sought the peace pact was held to be the belief that there was no longer any concern among the four powers over the lack of progress made during this session of the foreign ministers' conference.

**Many Subjects Covered**  
With a light touch, the session clamped on the peace pact, the atomic observance, the fact that Byrnes and Molotov covered a wide range of subjects among them:

1. Trieste and the question of how and when a decision should be sought for the removal of foreign troops. Molotov has demanded a three-month fixed date. The rest of the powers have said that the date should be set by the United Nations Security Council.
2. The veto in the western powers have sought a voluntary renunciation of its use by the victors. Russia on the other hand has advocated freeing the present situation which permits a veto without argument.
3. The Danube. The western powers have sought free navigation. Russia has pressed the control by countries on its borders.
4. Disarmament. The question has apparently been referred to the United Nations assembly to determine if and when the victorious forces will be reduced.
5. Germany. The United States and Britain are approaching agreement on a new agreement. Thus far they have failed without success to reach agreement in a peace pact.

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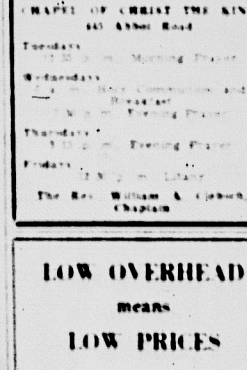
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
