Veterans' News

World War II veterans enrolled under the GI bill of public law 16 totaled 147,433 in the district of Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky as of Nov. 1, 1946. Of this total, 64,455 are in schools in Michigan.

This is part of the VA home-town medical care program, which treats veteran's service connected illness or disabilities through local cooperating physicians on the VA list.

According to John Hicks, VA training supervisor, subsistence will continue automatically through Christmas vacation, unless the veteran requests an interruption. Vacation time will be subtracted from total eligibility time.

Veterans receiving benefit from the Veterans Administration were reminded in a recent VA release of the necessity of notifying VA of any change in address. Federal checks cannot be forwarded from an old address to a new address, resulting in considerable delay of checks in many cases.

To transfer to another school, veterans must obtain approval from the veterans administration, and fill out two forms. They are: notice of interruption of schooling, and application for a supplemental letter of eligibility, according to Charles Gordon, VA contact officer in Demonstration hall.

Failure to obtain approval will result in a delay of subsistence checks, and a confusion of the veterans' records.

U. S. Civil Service Lists Job Openings

The U. S. Civil Service commission yesterday announced that examinations for junior agricultural assistants and for geophysicists will be held from which probational appointments will be made to positions in Washington, D. C., and throughout the United States.

Junior agricultural assistant positions will include men with degrees of sufficient experience in agriculture, botany, bacteriology, entomology, horticulture, soils, or zoology. The entrance salary is \$2,644 a year. A written general test is required.

A bachelor's degree in geology, physics, mathematics, engineering or geophysics is required for the geophysicists positions. No written examination is required. Further information and application forms may be obtained from the Office of Regional Director, Seventh U. S. Civil Service Region, New Post Office Building, Chicago, 7, Ill., or from most first or second class post offices.

Originally only thirty students were given scholarships from two Michigan counties. In 1942 the number was increased to 100 students from 21 counties. A year later the present system was set up. Under this new plan 200 students receive scholarships each year.

Students Selected

Students qualified for a scholarship are selected by representatives of various farm organizations including the Farm Bureau, and by school principals and county agricultural agents.

According to Russ Stalling, counselor from Cassiopolis, both the students' social life and 15 hours of classes per week are directed toward carrying out the purpose of the foundation, which is the betterment of agriculture and home making and the development of community life.

Two Month Course

Under the two month course the men study farm management, soils, forage crops, and other courses related to farming.







