State Department Demands Punishment

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP) — The State department said today the United States has asked for punishment of Yugoslav officials responsible for a "disgraceful incident" in which an American diplomat was stripped of his camera, films and identification cards. The treatment of the diplomat, John M. Cabot of the Massachusetts State, added a new point of friction to American relations with Marshal Tito's pro-communist regime. However, State officials refused to say whether the diplomat was a Yugoslav or American.

Union Heads Bitter In Protest;
Senators Call Labor 'Arrogant'

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP) — A massive coalition of Republicans and Democrats rammed through the Senate today a history-making bill to check strikes and other union activities. The vote was 68 to 24, enough to over-ride a presidential veto, if the lineup remains unchanged.

Bell, Workers Reach Terms On Plant Tie-Up

DETROIT, May 13 (AP) — The Federal Conciliation Service today announced the Michigan Bell Telephone and the Federation of Telephone Employees of Michigan had reached agreement on a proposal for settlement of the 37-day-old strike of 5,600 plant workers.

"Acceptance by the membership will effect a complete contract between the company and the union," Leo Kotin, mediator, said.

Following a membership vote on the settlement proposal, which he estimated would take "about three days," terms of the agreement would be disclosed, Kotin said.

Walter R. Schaefer, union president, emphasized that the proposal did not constitute settlement and said, "the strike goes on," until the rank and file of the FTEM has responded.

"We have agreed only to submit the company's final position to the membership," he said. There was no comment from John F. Aggar, general plant personnel superintendent, and W. T. Kirk, assistant general plant manager, company representatives at today's five-hour negotiating session.

Student Artists Show Their Work At 3 Exhibitions

The Art department's annual student exhibition has opened this week and will continue through June 30th. Howard Church, art head, announced yesterday.

Due to the department's increase this year to over 800 students under a teaching staff of 14 artists, more exhibition space has been made available in three places on the campus. Advanced work in drawing, design, painting, graphic design, sculpture, and lithography printing will be featured in the Art Gallery located in the Music building.

First-year work will be arranged in the corridors and studios of the Union Annex. Pottery and sculpture will be featured in the display cases of the College Library.

Art Gallery visiting hours are 2:30-9:30 p.m. daily and 2-5 p.m. on Sundays. The library exhibition may be seen during regular hours, while the Union Annex shows may be seen 9 a.m.-5 p.m. during the week.

Women May Apply For Summer Rooms

Women students may sign up for dormitory rooms for summer school in the housing office, third floor, Union building, beginning Thursday, May 15, announced S. H. Kessler, director of student housing. All women, who are not at present living in college housing and who do not have an application on file must make an application by May 19.

Unprecedented Epidemic Sweeps Campus

A disease of epidemic proportions is sweeping over Michigan State college campus leaving in its wake an estimated number of casualties among the student and faculty body.

Dr. Charles F. Holland, director of health services, today said all efforts to perfect a vaccine to curb the unchecked malady have thus far met with failure. He said the epidemic has not confined itself to the campus but has spread throughout Michigan and a majority of other states throughout the country.

into the class room because of his particular glassy-eyed stare, but had thought no more of the matter until approximately 10 minutes later when the student walked over to a window, opened it, and rested his chin on the window sill. He said the student then gave a deep, rasping sigh and passed into the coma phase of the disease.

According to reports received from the offices of Prevention of Contagious Diseases, the epidemic has now spread to approximately 83% of the student and faculty body. An official stated this was the largest recorded contamination caused by an epidemic since 1888.

The disease was first recorded here by Prof. Leo Lior, instructor of education, who reported the first symptoms of the disease as a thick, yellow, sticky and on overwhelming desire of the afflicted to be outside in fresh air.

Hospital Larks
Some cases have shown violent attitudes toward the opposite sex and will be confined to institutions for the rest of their lives.

The doctor requested those believing themselves afflicted by the disease NOT to report to the campus hospital as all facilities there are filled to capacity by those stricken with the disease and attempting to receive permission to miss classes in an attempt to seek an outside cure.


The director of health services could offer no hope of relief until June 14, after which date those stricken would begin to feel better. He said attacks would recur throughout the summer months.

necessary to prescribe a treatment as the patient always followed the mode of treatment believed by medical circles as being the most beneficial.

Curriculum Interferes

Doctor Holland acknowledged the fact that the college curriculum was interfering with the cure of all those struck down by the disease on campus. However, he said, the majority of the stricken were facing this obstacle by attending classes physically but not mentally.

The doctor said no medical term had yet been designated to classify the disease but for the time being the laymen's terminology would be used by the college health service department. However, he continued, "It's known as spring fever."

College Foresters Prepare For Summer Training Camp

MSC foresters are busy making preparations to hit the trail for their annual summer camp at the Forest Ranger School near Sault Ste. Marie.

On June 19, 120 forester sophomores and ten staff members will join the 55 students in the forest practice course who are already there for summer quarter work.

A variety of study courses and field trips as well as wide recreational facilities promises a most interesting summer for the men.

New Course

A new course in photography will be added to the regular studies in forest engineering, mensuration, navigation, utilization and silviculture.

Photographers are needed to make maps of forest tracts, and mapping through aerial photography.

Michigan State is one of the first colleges to have a course in aerial photography.

Aerial Maps

Maps can be made from aerial photographs more accurately than by any other method. With these maps and the use of new instruments, forest tracts can be measured and the heights of trees estimated to within a few feet.

Forest planning, which forms the backbone of forestry, is made more accurate by the use of aerial photography.

Groups will alternate in taking one week field trips to points in the upper peninsula as far west as Marquette and Escanaba for practice in forest recreation and utilization courses.

Island Test Camp

Other groups will spend one week periods in the test camp on Neesh Island. Here they'll live under outdoor conditions similar to those of foresters working in the far west. They'll rough it even to the point of doing their own cooking.

Durham forest contains over 5000 acres of timber land, including half of Neesh Island.

Freighters Pass

The camp is scenically located on the St. Marys river, where a continuous stream of lake freighters pass on their way to the Sault Ste. Marie locks.

The increased enrollment this year has necessitated the building of new barracks for several quarters. Classes are conducted in a modern brick building.

A wide variety of recreational facilities, including fishing and swimming, is available to campers during their stay.
