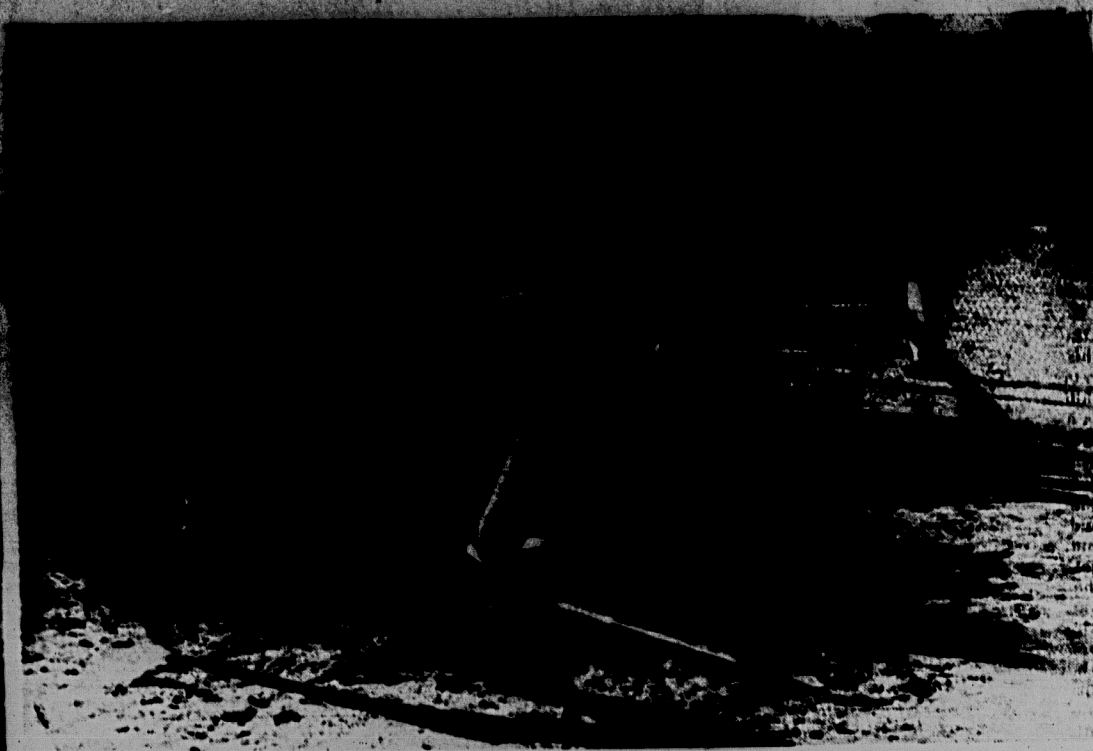

Group To Study
Co-op Project
At Willow Run

Twelve members of the Spartan Wives, executive board will go to Willow Run on Wednesday to meet with the nursery school board at the University of Michigan student housing project. They will be accompanied by Miss Esther Anson of the adult education department.

The group is making the trip to discuss with the U. of M. wives group the organization of a co-operative nursery school. The MS' women will collect information on how such a school is financed, the employment of trained personnel to work with the mothers, and the problems which have to be met by the members.

Investigate Nursery
The Spartan Wives have been investigating nursery school organization in connection with the proposed nursery for children of veterans at Michigan State.

In a co-operative nursery school every mother whose child attends does some work in the nursery, such as, teaching the children, giving out health papers, and how to get along with other children.

First Meeting
According to Miss Anson, the first meeting will mark the first time that the wives organization of the two colleges have met to discuss mutual problems.

The Spartan Wives have invited the U. of M. group to come to Michigan State and study State organization and the activities provided for student wives.

Ingenuity Beats Housing Shortage

Students at MSC not only are finding ways to beat the housing shortage, but they are figuring ways of finance and economy, too. Some of the unique living conditions of a few of the married students show that "they have the situation well in hand."

"We are renting an 88-acre farm and my husband is raising Jersey cows in order to get through school," says Mrs. Herbert Petree. The Petrees have a 16-room farmhouse, and are renting the extra rooms to students. Petree is a first year veterinarian, having spent 3 1/2 years of studying in Tennessee. They have one child.

Beat Extra Rooms
The M. D. Mitchells, in defiance of the lack of apartments around East Lansing, decided to buy their own house, a grey-shingled, English styled building. They painted all rooms of the two stories themselves, and are renting extra bedrooms to students. They find the dining room adequate sleeping quarters for themselves and their one child.

Mrs. Greg Lill, barracks apartments, finds that a few minutes of thought, and some bargain sales, have made their four-room apartment attractive without "Wal-Mart-Astoria" furniture.

Upstairs Walls
Starting with one good piece of furniture, an aqua colored studio couch that folds into a bed, she then mixed paint to match the couch, and repainted the living-room walls.

"Starved" checkered, does wonders for bare bedroom windows, and can be tinted any pastel shade to suit your taste," says Mrs. Lill. Two orange crates, separated by two crossed boards, makes a wonderful dressing table.

Mrs. Lill also covered the table with starched, checkered, making flounces and bows around the top. For wastebasket, she used round sugar pails, and the footstool, a square wooden box covered with padding and chintz.

with are Mrs. Lill's own paintings, except for calendar pictures of babies that line the nursery. The Lills have one child.

The Warren Muelers, of Lansing, could find no place to live when they came to State in the fall. When someone jokingly said, "You can have our old barn," an idea was born.

The Muelers took the barn, added four huge picture windows, vine and white patterned drapes, and repainted the outside of the barn red, with white trimmings. Last week a national magazine took pictures of the home.

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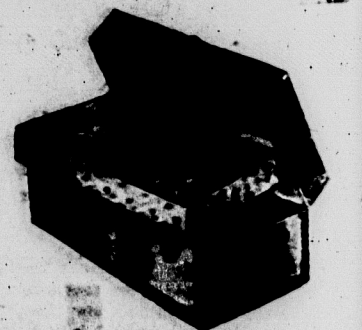
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Spartan Nine Meets Irish At South Bend

Michigan State could coast to a season's average of .750 by winning the Fighting Irish game.

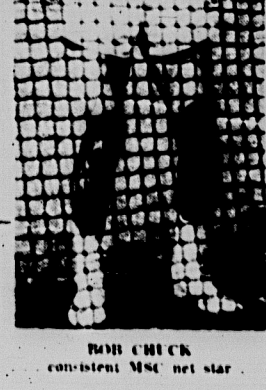
When the Spartans take the field this afternoon it will be the 62nd time that baseball teams for these two institutions have entered competition in a relationship which began in 1887.

Bob Chuck and Jack Shingleton, the most consistent doubles winners this year, failed to repeat an early season victory over Fred Ziemann and Bill Mikulich and were stopped in three sets, 1-6, 6-3, 3-6.

State took a 4-3 lead in the match after splitting the six singles points and winning at first doubles, but the Wolverines evened the score with the second doubles win and took the deciding point when Bob Naugle and Hal Cook topped Bob Malaga and Mickey Elliot, 10-8, 6-4.

Al Reynolds failed in his second attempt to down Andy Paton at No. 1, as the Wolverine ace struggled to a tough, three-set victory, 3-7, 7-5, 8-6. Reynolds faded in the last set after holding match point at 4-5 in the 12th game.

Cessa and Chuck Win. Roger Cessa was in good form to take a three-set, 6-3, 3-6, 6-3 match from Fred Otto and Bob Chuck added the second singles point by beating Dick Lincoln in straight sets, 6-2, 6-1.

Bob Malaga at No. 3, had a bad day, losing 4-6, 2-6 to Fred Ziemann, but Jack Shingleton flashed brilliant tennis after a first set defeat and came back strong to trim Bill Mikulich in three sets, 2-6, 6-4, 8-6.

Against the Wolverine veteran in the third set, Shingleton regained his early season form, which at one time carried him to the second singles slot.

Reynolds and Cessa teamed beautifully at first doubles to knock out a 7-5, 6-4 win over Paton and Otto, a reversal of the Ann Arbor match, but Mike Vatchman, making his first start of the season, at No. 6, bowed to Hal Cook, 2-6, 3-6.

Spartan Track Team After First Win Over Michigan In Twilight Dual Meet

Michigan State's track squad will try for its fourth straight dual meet victory and its first over the University of Michigan when the Spartans play host to the Big Nine team on the outdoor track here at 6 this evening.

The meet will be the final dual contest of the outdoor season for both schools. Michigan State has lost only to Ohio State, while the Wolverines have dropped meets with the Buckeyes and Illinois.

Leading the State squad will be the consistent point-getting trio of Jack Dianetti, Fred Johnson and Bob Schepers. Top performers for Michigan are expected to be Charley Fomville, Bill Osgood and Herb Barten.

Two new field records may be set as Fomville and Johnson perform in their shot put and broad jump specialties.

Fomville has tossed the shot put 53 feet, 7 1/2 inches with several other puts over 53 feet this season and is expected to break the present field standard of 51 feet, 3 1/8 inches set here in 1941 by Jim Delaney of Notre Dame.

Johnson will attempt to break his own record of 21 feet 3 1/2 inches, which he established here May 3 against Notre Dame.

Dianetti and Barten will be matched for the second time in the one mile run at 6:10. In the first meeting at Ann Arbor, Barten ran his first college mile and beat the Spartan ace. Dianetti has since given plenty of evidence that he will be in sharp to give Barten a real race this time.

Boosting a string of eight straight first places in four meets, Sprinter Bob Schepers will attempt to take his fifth double win in the 100 and 220 yard dashes.

In the hurdle events, Osgood, Michigan's leading high and low hurdler, is expected to get his chief opposition from Spartan John Fraser, Hal Mayhew, Fred Johnson and Paige Christianson.

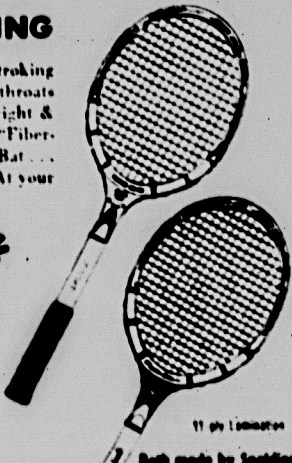

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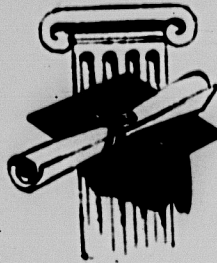
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
