President's Greeting

AMONG the more meaningful of American college traditions is that which brings alumni and former students back to the campus each fall for a renewal of acquaintances and inspiration. Spartans, Out For Third Win, Favored Over Iowa State

With a record-breaking Homecoming crowd of over 25,000 expected, the Spartan grid squad meets the Cyclones from Iowa State for the first time at 2 p. m. on Macklin field.

In commenting on today's game, Spartan Coach 'Biggie' Munn said: "It is my hope that we can look good before such a crowd."

On the basis of records to date, Michigan State for the first time this season, should be cast in the role of game favorite. However, the Cyclones should prove a stiff test for MSC's offensive power.

Coach Emmett Stuber, who arrived last spring from Cape Girardeau Teachers college to guide the Spartans, is rated as a top defensive coach.

His 1946 team led the nation in defensive performance, allowing their opponents an average of 34 yards per game, according to National Collegiate Athletic Association statistics.

After taking their season opener from Iowa State Teachers, 31-14, the Cyclones lost to Colorado, Kansas State and Nebraska. However, on the strength of statistics, Kansas was the only team that outplayed Nebraska.

Last week, against Nebraska's highly-touted offensive that scored twice on Minnesota, the Cyclones' stopped the Cornhuskers cold allowing them but two first downs while registering twelve for themselves.

Still, Nebraska won the game, 14-7, by capitalizing on a pair of breaks. They scored on a fumble and a blocked kick, both within the Iowa State five-yard line. On the strength of statistics, the Huskers were behind in every department except the final score.

The present attendance mark for Macklin field of 22,562, set at the Mississippi State game two weeks ago, is expected to fall today. The athletic department has installed two extra sets of bleacher seats that will accommodate 2,300.

Tickets to the temporary bleachers will go on sale at 12 noon Saturday at Macklin field.

Four fraternity houses and two stores were hit early Friday morning in a series of robberies that swept through East Lansing netting the thieves over \$400 in cash and valuables, Chief C. F. Fogg of the East Lansing police department said yesterday.

Latest reports indicate that \$227 in cash, a \$175 wrist watch, and two \$10 gold watches were taken from Delta Sigma Phi house, 1212 East Grand River avenue; from the Delta Chi house, 101 Woodman, thieves took \$120 in cash and a \$10 gold watch.

In addition, \$60 in cash was taken from the Phi Kappa Tau house, 220 Delta, and \$70 in cash from the Lambda Chi house, 125 Market.

Robbers East and Teller also were captured and thieves attempted to pry open a clothing store safe. They were not successful, however, and nothing was taken.

The MSC weather bureau has been located for the day at the ATO house. The cyclone predicted to arrive at 2 p.m. materializes, and is defeated by the Spartans.

The construction of the annex for the Administration building was begun in January, '46. The annex and the new classrooms south of the river house most of the offices once located in the gymnasium of Demonstration hall. The offices of the Placement bureau, Housing director, Dormitory Food Service, Accounting, Purchasing, Dean of Students and Counselors for men and women are located in the annex.

Partially completed, the Science building will be the largest building on the campus, being 700 feet long and covering 36,000 square feet of ground area. 

More Power To You



Using the new system, Munn's team has won two and lost one this season. Michigan posted on the heat in the season opener to win, 55-0.

State rebounded the following week to upset favored Mississippi State, 7-0, on the strength of a tight defense and followed up with a convincing offensive display last week to whip Washington State, 21-7.

Athletes Record

Kevin Higgins (22:20), Jim Gibbard, (22:35), George Kostisak, (23:32), and Don Trull, (23:38) make up the list of seven slated for the Notre Dame clash.

Sewell led the 27-man field at the mile with a swift 4:48. The last man had passed the mile mark at 5:17. The pace slowed down 1:30 in the mile, and the last time was about six seconds slower than the best practice mark of the week before.

Course Layed Out

The course for the run started in front of Dem hall, followed the road west of the stadium, lapped the oval track once, then ran along the road winding through the trees, and wound up at the track once more.

The distance run was about 200 yards over the four-mile mark, according to Schlademan, making it impossible to predict how well the team will do in their first race.

Runners Well-Bunched

Schlademan was pleased at the way the meet was run, the first ten men were well-bunched and running easily. The last six of the leading seven men finished within 4 1/2 seconds of each other. Tom Erwin and team captain El Kiczepski did not finish in the first group as Schlademan expected. Erwin was slowed down by an old leg injury, and Kiczepski dropped back because of a pain in his side.
