## GOP Defies Truman As House Approves 6.5 Billion Tax Cut

Sixty-Three Democrats Join Bandwagon To Pass Measure

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2 (AP) — Defying the threat of a presidential veto, Republicans slashed their \$6,500,000,000 tax slashing measure through the House today by an overwhelming 377 to 170 vote.

## 8% AND YOU Tax Slash Summary

Here is what the GOP \$6,500,000,000 tax slashing bill, as passed by the House and sent to the Senate today, would do:

1. Provide individual exemptions of \$1,000 from \$1,000 to \$2,000.

2. Apply the community property exemption to all states. This would reduce the tax on community property and give to the family income equally for tax reporting purposes, thereby putting the income in lower tax brackets.

3. Provide percentage rate as follows: Those with incomes after deductions and exemptions which do not exceed \$1,000 would receive a 30 percent reduction.

4. Those with incomes between \$1,000 and \$1,999 would receive reductions ranging from 30 to 25 percent.

5. Those with incomes between \$2,000 and \$3,999 would receive a 20 percent reduction.

6. Those with incomes above \$4,000 would receive a 20 percent reduction on the tax applicable to the first \$4,000.

7. Give an additional personal exemption of \$500 to persons 65 or older, bringing their total personal exemptions to \$1,200.

8. Increase the present extra \$500 exemption for the blind to \$700, making the total exemption \$1,200.

9. Extend to all states the splitting principle in payment of estate and gift taxes.

Russian Complaints Show Success Of U. S. Defense Set-Up Against Communism

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR. (AP Foreign Affairs Analyst)

Russian complaints against American military activities serve principally to emphasize the success with which we are building the world-wide defense line against Communist aggression.

Since President Truman announced the program last March, Russia has been in the position of a man who is tied up in such a fashion that his hands tighten if he struggles.

The Soviets could have lived comfortably within their own frontiers, and even could have been admitted to a respectable place in a world which would have preferred to spend its energy on postwar rehabilitation. But they have continued their efforts to expand and so have hardened the hand of the world against themselves. Then the complaint.

They are complaining about the Marshall Plan in Western Europe, the American refusal to let them gobble up Greece, Turkey and Iran, their exclusion from Japan and Southeast Asia as they have excluded us from North Korea, Manchuria and Central Europe.

They thought Britain was too poor and America too near a depression to bother them when they launched their postwar expansion program. But Britain is coming back strong and America is near recovery. They are trying to realize the Arab states into an anti-Communist bloc, and are grinding them.

The United States has expanded in the same area in territorial fashion, is now supporting large armies in Greece and Turkey and backing them with naval force, and is making a start on a similar program in Iran. An important arms deal
