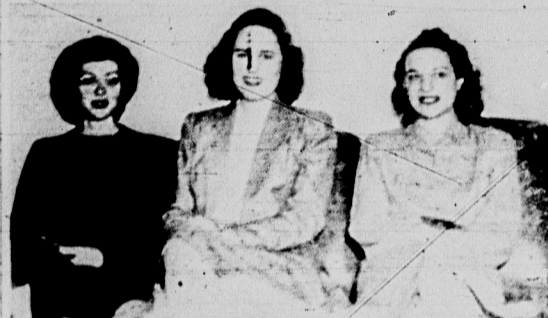
Boards Will Cast Votes for AWS Heads Today

Lincoln: Then And Now

THE GENEROUS BEATTITUDE OF democracy which are generally coupled with Lincoln's birthday have already been pretty well worked over this week by Senator Ferguson in a way it is too bad that the memory of a man of such magnanimous proportions should be gilded in phrases which speak so freely of the "glorious democracy."

The popular practice of Lincoln day oratory tends to fall a little bit too much in glittering generalities rather than make the issues take a concrete significance by applying them to present day problems, and practicing them.

The conclusion is more than obvious. Since Lincoln was a champion of racial equality it would seem fitting that his birthday be observed in a manner expressive of the principles on which he acted.

THE LOCAL EXAMPLE OF DISCRIMINATION against Negroes in East Lansing barber shops cannot be regarded as an isolated case. It is merely a point of departure for something that must come and will come. The small-town feeling of practicality—there's no sense in trying to force non-discrimination, you'll only start race riots—is admittedly a strong argument.

But it won't do. If the American democracy is to survive it must live and evolve with the times. Actual practice of non-discrimination is in its critical

stage of evolution now. Unless Americans accept it with courage and a will, they are working against the growth of their country, something more than just so many bills passed in Congress each year.

EAST LANSING BARBER SHOPS have been of the pan since Jan. 1. The dollar haircut used to be the last straw in the student's battle against high prices. When the race discrimination was sprung, without warning, the barber shops were approached first. This in no way means that the barbers of all the East Lansing merchants and others are practicing race discrimination.

East Lansing is a college town. Like so many others across the country, its merchants and citizens are caught in the spearhead of liberal and progressive movements which begin on college campuses more naturally than anywhere else.

The education which must accompany race tolerance is not for students and teachers only. It is for every citizen of East Lansing. At times the pace of these student liberal movements is too intoxicating for townspeople to understand and appreciate the meaning and direction.

Today, on Lincoln's birthday, it is significant that East Lansing is fast to face with a policy that was slow to his heart.

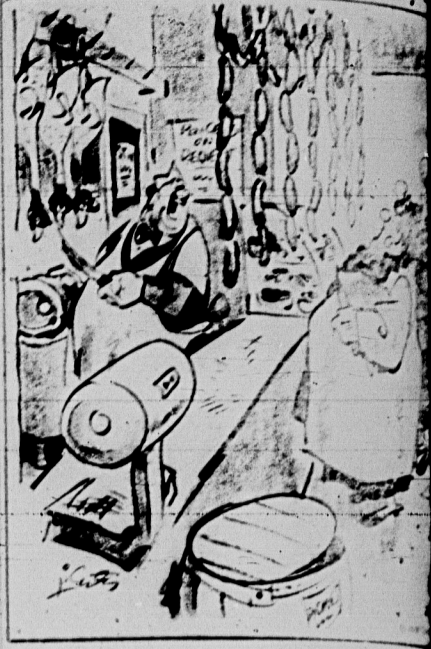

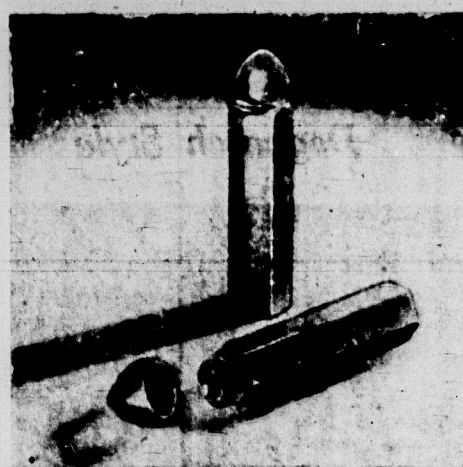

Quigley Hits At Allied Occupation Of Japan

Calls Military Policy Bottleneck To Democratization Of Country

"The unbending 'middle-of-the-road' policy of the Allied occupation government in Japan is one of the chief bottlenecks in democratization of the country."

This was the opinion expressed by Dr. Harold S. Quigley, head of the political science department at the University of Minnesota, in an address at the Music auditorium last night. Dr. Quigley served nine months as a councillor with Supreme Command Allied Powers in Tokyo.

Reactionary Influence

"The failure of SCAP to support the genuinely liberal elements in Japan has in effect served to continue the influence of reactionary groups and left the people with no clear cut political directions to follow," the speaker explained. "Out of this situation has grown the nation's unstable government."

Dr. Quigley cited the difficulty SCAP encountered in trying to find a common meeting ground with Japanese political groups. "Politics in Japan is either too liberal or too conservative to suit the American taste," he related, and there were no middle-of-the-road groups to work with.

Problem Unsolved

Military government, in Dr. Quigley's opinion, is not a satisfactory solution to the problem of occupying Japan.

He expressed the view that a civilian set-up could do a more competent job and would avoid the danger of leaving military after-effects on the people at the close of the occupation.

Record Dance Will Feature Dorsey Discs

An informal Tea dance featuring the recorded music of Tommy Dorsey will be sponsored at the Union ballroom by Union board Saturday afternoon from 3-5.

At least one member of the Dorsey orchestra will be on hand to star in the informal program, Elmer Longmeyer, Union board president, announced.

Refreshments will be served from a special bar on the Union Supper club. Potato chips and cokes will be supplied.

Longmeyer also announced that persons wishing to enter the board-sponsored bridge tournament may sign up this week at the Union desk.

The tournament will be scheduled sometime during March.

Canners Meet At Conference

Michigan canners and fieldmen began their two-day conference at 8 this morning in room 204 of the Hotel Michigan building.

Faculty members are directing the sessions and doing most of the speaking. Representatives of the American Can and the Continental Can companies, and Dore Chemical will speak on raw products production, canners' reference material, and chemical waste control respectively.

Professors R. L. Cardus, Roy F. Marshall, J. W. Ross, and H. T. Delp are acting as chairmen of the several sessions. Dr. Ray Wakefield, control specialist for Gerber's Baby Food company, is director of the Friday evening session.

"If we can't look at things in a clear objective manner, let's get back at them, at all."

Communism Discussed

Topic Courses (Macroeconomic) was to a challenge by trying to define communism, reviewed the theoretical and practical aspects of the ideology.

In theory, communism has many good points. Internationalism and individualism are two of these. But the ultimate aims of communism, such as a constant destruction of art, music, religion and spiritual with the substitution of a mechanical, mechanical man philosophy, are not to be accepted.

Questioned Legality

A motion was made by Bob Fisher, chairman, to require investigation of the situation to determine whether student council rules had been violated by the act. The motion was withdrawn after Mrs. Elliott reminded the group that any action would have to be immediate, since the petition would go to Washington before this council met again.

The new constitution of the Union Board was approved after lengthy debate.

Objection To Limitations

Marshall Bennett (M.S.U.) objected to a provision which limited the number of board representatives from any one Greek organization, but did not put a corresponding limitation on representation from any single independent group.

Janette Cornejo suggested that the Union Board Merit committee should be composed of disinterested persons who had no direct connection with the governing board.

New Election District Formed

Recent chairman of the election rules committee, announced the formation of a new election district No. 16, to include the trailer area. The approximately 100 students there are not represented in the government of Spartan City, and have therefore been removed from the combined area for election purposes, he said.

A representative will soon be selected in that area to represent the trailer group on the council, Bennett reported.

President Jerry Warren relinquished his seat to Vice President Jack Hayes in order to make a plea for council action to combat the existing absorption. The request added fuel for attendance regulations after hearing Warren.
