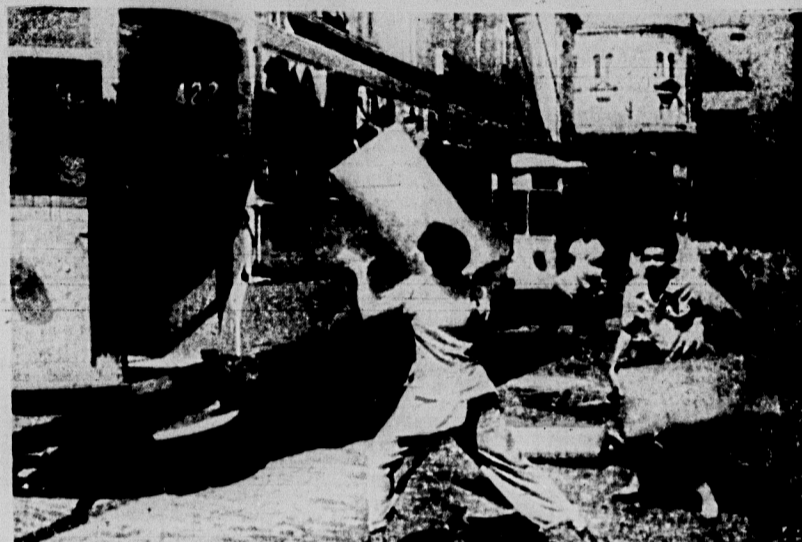

# Intellectual Note Honigsheim Says Marx, Weber Thought Alike; 200 Attend Council Talk

That the seemingly opposed social theories of Karl Marx and Max Weber are fundamentally the same was the basis of a talk delivered by Prof. Paul Honigsheim, MSC sociologist, in the Union Hearsh room last night.

A crowd of approximately 200 persons turned out for the speech. It was the first of a series planned by the Student Council to better student faculty understanding and cooperation.

**Intimate Friend**

Dr. Honigsheim, an intimate friend of Max Weber, said that although both men differed as to the mechanics of economic and political evolution, they agreed on the ultimate goal of the evolution. Both had in mind the creation of "universal justice" and an "all embracing brotherhood of mankind."

The Marxian theory of economic evolution, according to Honigsheim, was based on the belief that the economic progress of a society was automatic. On the other hand, he pointed out, Weberism is essentially a more optimistic philosophy which embraces the belief that economic progress is the result of man's effort.

**Perfection Not Possible**

He said that Weber believed a perfect state was impossible. If a perfect state was achieved, Weber predicted the decay of society.

Followers of both philosophies are generally called revolutionaries. Dr. Honigsheim said, however, he believed that Weber's approach was based on the belief that economic progress could be achieved through individual effort and that this does not necessarily mean revolution.

zations in a special class, he indicated. These special rules would include such things as notification to the council of the name and date of appearance of any speaker, and of intention to distribute literature on the campus.

**No Control**

"If this is to be a successful program, we should not attempt to exercise control over discussion topics," Warren continued.

He refused to comment on whether this meant that state and local issues would be covered by the speakers.

The committee will administer operation of the program, with all problems of arrangement going directly to it. It will invite speakers, and set dates and places for their appearance.

**Suggestions To Be Used**

Speakers will be recommended by the individual campus political organizations, and the committee will use these suggestions as a base for a balanced program, Warren said.

The committee will start to function as soon as the constitution of the first organization is approved, the council head said.

"If the constitutions are submitted to the council's constitution committee before the regular council meeting next Wednesday night, some action will probably be taken at that session," he concluded.

**Vote Questions**

Also announced yesterday were the four questions to be submitted to all-college vote Feb. 26. These are:

"Should the new constitution of the Student government be approved?"

"Should corsages be allowed at open all-college dances?"

**How About Formals?**

"Should all-college formals be strictly formal?"

"Should all charity drives be organized in one Campus Community Chest?"

Marilyn McCowan (Lansing) said that further information on the questions could be obtained from the Student council offices, or from the office of the Dean of Students.

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# Local Greeks Predict Changes In Initiation

## 'Hell Week' On Way Out Elsewhere

"Big changes" in the fraternity system of informal initiation are on the way, according to many State fraternity men.

The opinions came as the result of queries regarding a recent Time magazine article on the subject of hazing, crowded conditions, and the veteran-non-veteran problem in the nation's fraternities.

Time stated that "Some of the horseplay and comradeship has gone out of fraternity life," and that veterans are making and causing the changes.

### Too Much On Minds

The magazine attributed this to the fact that the vets are older and have too much on their minds. In addition, they don't particularly like taking "hazing" and the indignities of informal initiation from 18-year-old actives.

Bob Comer, local Alpha Tau Omega pledge-master, sounded a keynote when he said, "Hazing is definitely looked down upon by most veterans... and is anything but creative toward establishing a brotherly spirit." Comer feels that such energies should be directed toward service to the fraternity or the campus and suggests Hell weeks be carried on in cooperation with a student sponsored service bureau.

### Eddy Agrees

Delta Tau Delta president, Warren Eddy, responded in a similar way. He said, "We can see the benefits of a constructive pledge training period... we feel that it is possible to get our objectives across without the use of paddles."

Again sounding the motif of Kappa Sigma secretary, Robert Harrison, who endorses a constructive hell week.

### Age Differences Important

Jim Powaty, Sigma Chi, and Scott Price, AGR, government trainees, feel there is a strain between veterans and new pledges due to differences in ages and experiences. Powaty believes the biggest problem next fall will be the pledging of men in their teens to groups whose average age is in the early twenties.

There were comments that sanction the horseplay, "humor and fun" of hell week and others and hinted about overlarge memberships.

In looking to the future, Scott Price expects a "big change" in the fraternity system around '49 or '50.

### ISA Gives Full Status To Pre-War Students

According to a decision of the Independent Students' association in a recent meeting, any student who belonged to ISA before the war may be reinstated as a full fledged member.

According to Edwin Hoffmann, president of ISA, any person reinstated and qualifying as an independent will be eligible to hold office in ISA and will not have to wait two terms as the constitution now requires.

Students from State's speech department will serve as chairman and timekeepers.

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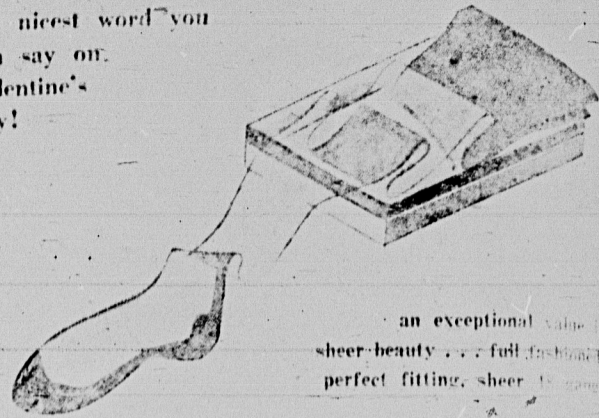
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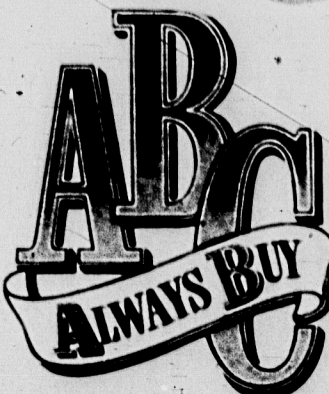
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
