Educators Study In Flying Classrooms

"We'll meet at the Tower of London next week," declared the early English classroom Friday as they held class at the Louvre in Paris. That's all for today.

Does that sound ridiculous? Professor Carl Horn, pioneering in flying classrooms, doesn't think so.

He believes it is possible to establish a system of air trips to all parts of the U.S. and even to Europe—to give students first-hand information about government, industry, science, and national culture. He's leading the way toward a new system of education in step with the air age.

Nearly 200 key educators from more than 30 states are participating this week in the MSU-sponsored flying classrooms.

It is believed to be the largest educational mass movement in history. The students are high school superintendents, representatives of state departments of education, state college professors. The leaders consist of making a rapid-

Open Forum Will Discuss Constitution

Student council members will hold an open meeting for fraternity, sorority, and other off-campus students at 1:30 tonight to acquaint them with the provisions of the proposed council constitution.

Under the chairmanship of Marshall Bennett (Maion), a group including Council President Jerry Warren, Vice President Jack Hayes, Bill Staples Snyder, and Ed Howard, members of the constitutional drafting committee, will review the salient features of the new document.

Everyone will be urged to ask questions, Bennett said. "We will not turn down any good suggestions that may be offered. If you have ideas, show us."

The original date for the vote on adoption has been moved back from February 26 to a date which has not been set, but will probably be March 1.

With added time, allowed for consideration before the vote some sections of the constitution may still be reconsidered. The delay will be necessitated by administrative matters to study the document more carefully before putting a stamp of approval on it.

Capitol Marchers

DELEGATES from the Michigan State chapter of the American Veterans committee and the Spartan Citizens committee were part of a group of 3,000 college students who "marched" on Washington over the weekend to protest legislation for universal military training.

The bill hasn't reached the floor of the House yet, and the students who went to Washington hope it never gets there. Organizations in favor of the legislation, such as the VFW and the American Legion, are using their lobby in the capital to get the measure to a vote during the present session.

There is some conjecture that the bill will not be considered until after the fall elections because it is dangerous as a political football.

Unless opinion on the subject begins to crystallize here at Michigan State pretty soon we might as well wait for two or three elections to go by before it comes up for a vote.

The American Veterans committee is trying to get "big name" speakers for an open forum to be held before the end of the term. Although this group is against the bill, the committee is trying to obtain speakers for both sides.

The forum is a good idea, and a step in

the right direction. However, a single debate on the subject isn't going to go very far in clearing up the confusion in the minds of most students on the subject. More debates should be scheduled and it would be a good idea for some of them to be sponsored by organizations which are in favor of the bill. The State News, in the near future, will use its editorial page to make a listing of the arguments for both sides.

It is from college students that constructive thought and opinion on the subject must come. The best part of our veteran population is now in college. Yet at Michigan State only two groups have been giving the matter any serious consideration.

Elsewhere the lineup is definite. Organized labor, most church groups, the AVC, Senator Taft and Henry Wallace are against universal military training. For it are the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the President's commission on the subject, and the armed services, the Legion, VFW, and the National Federation of Women's Clubs. Most of the nation's press, including the State News is for U.M.T.

A representative lineup of Michigan State students, with both sides well enough informed to make their decision authentic, is a goal the entire student body should be working for.

country. If we wait until his name gets on the Michigan ballot, the Republican and Democratic parties will have an unfair advantage. They will have had three or four speakers on campus already.

Joe Bruno, junior class president, pointed out that the administration had always had the veto power over council action. "But let's go ahead and put it up to them."

Absentee Voting
Jim Cawood (Lansing), backed Bruno.

"Many students will be voting absentee ballots," Cawood noted, "and they come from states where there is no doubt that Wallace will be on their ballot."

Jan Hite (Stourville) said, "I can't understand the administration's reasoning on this so-called loophole of recognition on the Michigan ballot."

Political Activity
King, answering Miss Hite, said, "The constitution of this organization definitely states that they will engage in political activity, not just organization of support for the growth of Wallace backing."

"The administration feels that it must not recognize a group until the party appears on the ballot. The vote overwhelmingly in favor of recognition of the Wallace organization was taken since Lyle Thompson (Quonset) said, 'Let's do what we think is right, with no thought of possible embarrassment.'"

Civil Rights Issue
The council, rightly or wrongly, was brought to the council by Joe Pernick, former student council member representing the American Veteran's committee.

Pernick, presenting the civil liberties plea, said, "These issues are before us not only in the South but right here in East Lansing."

Marshall Bennett (Mason) asked, "Do you think this is within the Student Council's field of activity?"

Representative Body
Yes, answered Pernick. "You are a representative body of all the students on campus."

The proposed permanent committee set-up next came in for questioning.

The suggestion was made that since there were two viewpoints on discrimination, both should be represented on any committee appointed.

"Cawood then said, 'Two weeks ago I spoke in vain for more delay in consideration of the new Student government constitution. Now it seems likely that some of the work we approved then will have to be reviewed in the light of administration recommendations.'"

"New I recommend we take it easy here, and not step into some thing blindfolded. I suggest we postpone consideration of this until next week."

Action Next Week
He offered an amendment which sought postponement, but was permitted to withdraw it while making a plea for defeat of the motion offered by Hoffman.

The motion was defeated, with a subsequent motion to take action in the form of a resolution till next week approved with one dissenting vote.

The resolutions committee was instructed to contact all interested persons in the meantime, and to draw up a bill.

Grain Stops Plunge; Price Outlook Poor

CHICAGO, Feb. 18 (AP) — A late rally pulled some grains out of their price slump today in a session that held mostly bad news for consumers.

The government reported that the nation's meat-on-the-hoof supply is the lowest since 1939. This news caused a temporary slump in grains. Prices rallied later, however, on trade reports that unfavorable weather was endangering the next wheat crop in the northwest.

Art Exhibition Shows Works Of Moderns

An accompanying text explains the care of the fine arts during the war, and the methods, extent, and variety of work carried on by the officers of the American Commission for the Protection and Salvage of Artistic and Historic Monuments in War Areas.

This exhibition may be viewed daily 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and on Saturdays until noon.

Production Slump Due To Weather

East Lansing growers and livestock raisers for pasture growth and heavy grain feed prices indicate that better production is due to part, soon. As a result, many merchants are accumulating only the supplies they need for immediate requirements. This is depressing wholesale prices.

Leading spots on the New York exchange drifted slightly higher in the afternoon session this year. A late rally in cotton moved New York prices from 10 cents to a \$1-a-bale higher.

Wholesale Meat Slags
Wholesale meat values in New York suggest around \$7 a barrel for pork, beef and veal held steady in the Chicago market.

The decrease of 2,643,000 head of cattle during the year was one of the largest reductions ever experienced. Among reasons for the decline, the department said, were high meat prices last year that encouraged farmers to sell and resped feed supplies and high feed prices.

Loss Near Indicated
The report gave added weight to predictions that if demand continues high, there will be less meat and at higher prices during this spring.
