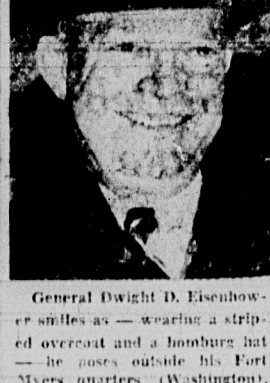

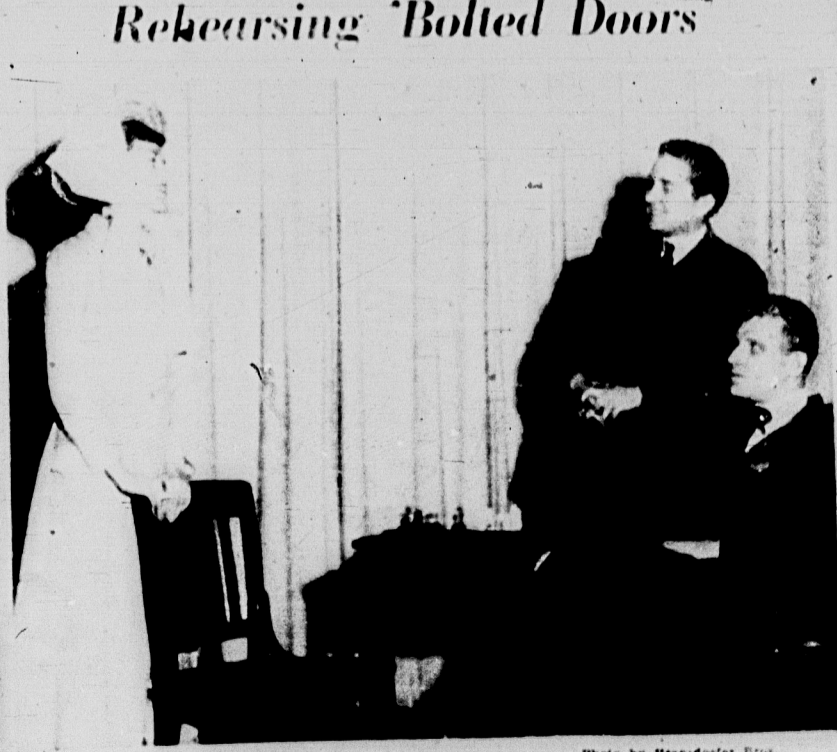

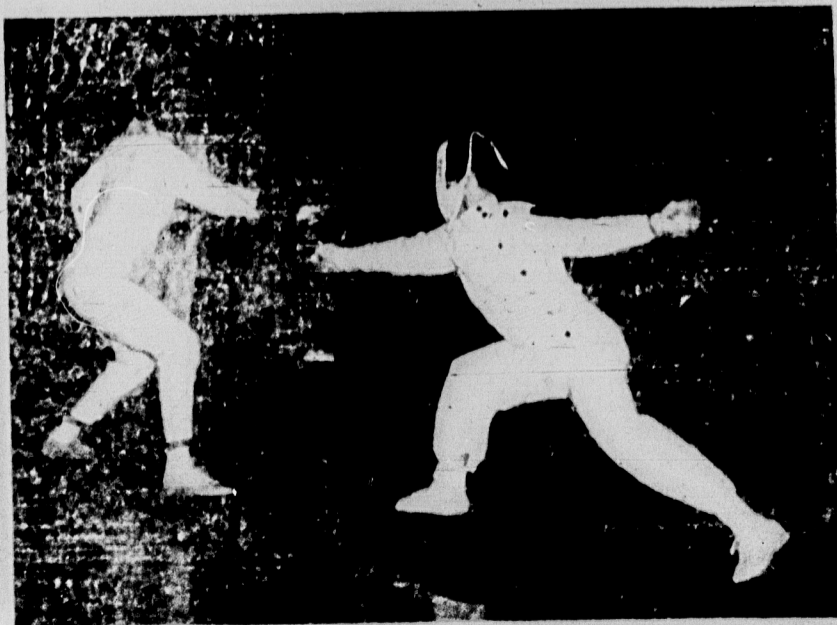

Michigan State's surprise conquest of Notre Dame Tuesday night practically guaranteed Spartan cage coach Ben Van Alstyne his seventeenth winning season in 21 years of coaching at State.

MSC need only beat the Wayne university quintet Saturday night at Jenison field house in order to finish with an average of at least .545.

An upset victory over Michigan a week from Saturday night at Ann Arbor and a victory over Wayne, would give Michigan State a season record of 13 victories and nine defeats for a .591 average.

Winning seasons aren't a novelty to Van Alstyne. The Spartan cage mentor has fallen short of the black side of the ledger only four times in his 22 years at Michigan State.

Counting the victory over the Iron Van has coached State basketball teams to 222 triumphs in 372 games, for an all time mark of .595 against the nation's top 25 teams.

State will be highly favored Saturday night to chalk up its twelfth win of the year against Wayne, despite the latter 37-55 tangle the Tartars gave them last December 27, Detroit.

The motor city school has won only eight of 19 contests this season and is currently plagued with a three-game losing streak. The Tartars have been soundly throunced by Marquette, Detroit, 24 victories and two defeats.

North Carolinians Top Scoring Race

NEW YORK, Feb. 25 (AP)—Averaging 31.2 points more than their opposition, North Carolina State's "Hoosier Hoopsters" soared to the top point this week in their see-saw battle with Rhode Island State for the scoring crown in major college basketball.

The Wolfpack has tallied 2,004 points in 26 games for an average of 77.1 per contest. Their figures include games of Feb. 21 North Carolina State's overall record is 24 victories and two defeats.

Michigan Wallace clubs in Lansing the past weekend the state group voted to be known as the Progressive Party. The name "New Republican" thus would not be appropriate, King said. It would also tend to be confused with the established Republican party.

It's purposes and objectives were not clearly defined, King said that the constitution read "to engage in activity in political affairs" and that to be specific, should state that the club intends to support the Progressive party and its candidates "so that we'll have an expression of just what it is."

Returned to Council

The officers of the club were not properly selected. The president of the group named in the constitution was a graduate assistant, King said, which violates the rule that no graduate assistant or graduate student shall be an officer of an undergraduate group.

King said that the constitution had been returned to the Student Council committee on constitution, and that the faculty group must wait until it is returned for reconsideration before they take any additional action.

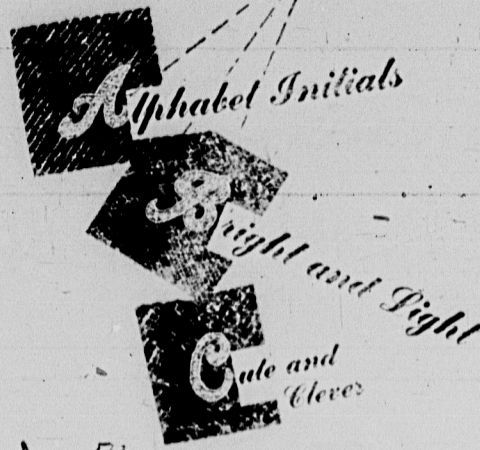
