

## Students Must Lead Issue Thinking Negro Pastor Says

### Rule Weakens Entire Structure Government, Speaker Tells Class

The college student who will change the balance toward minority groups in America, Fr. Norberto, pastor of Christ the King parish in Flint, and a Negro priest, told a group of approximately 100 in Berkeley hall this afternoon.

Fr. Norberto spoke on the "Liberty and the Negro" and the Negro's rights.

He pointed out that every citizen has the right to the privileges set down in the constitution of Independent States and that any citizen who weakens the structure of democratic government who is willing to let it slip away from him is in danger of losing all rights, in the eyes of Americans.

He included the right of security of person, the right of conscience and the right of life before the law. He said he was counting on students to be outspoken in their protests to the injustices to be done to the Negro, not recriminate.

## Red Pact Fear Shakes Finland

### Stalin Asks For Defense Cooperation

HELSINKI, Finland, Feb. 27 (AP)—Fear and pessimism spread in Finland today with the news that Marshal Stalin wants to link Finland in a chain of mutual defense pacts.

Many Finns expressed the hope that the parliamentary freedoms would not be interfered with, but they feared they might be extinguished. The general mood was of resigned tranquility.

Sources close to the government said Stalin had sent a diplomatic note to President Juho Paasikivi pressing for conclusion in the nearest future of a defense treaty similar to that with all Russia's other neighbors of the west.

Barrier Exists  
Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, in signing a treaty with Hungary on February 19, said a barrier against "imperial states" now existed in "islands of friendship and mutual assistance" with all states on Russia's western frontier from the Black Sea to the Baltic.

A Finnish pact with the note was delivered on Monday, even as Czechoslovak Communists under the leadership of Premier Klement Gottwald were in the homes of their drive for a new government to their liking.

Nation Told Today  
The nation was informed of the development of the pact. Then it was learned that President Paasikivi had followed.

## Dean Fears Passage Of Impractical Ideas By Powerful Council

### King Says Appeal Method Same 'As In Any Democratic System'

The Student Council should not be given unlimited authority in matters pertaining to student affairs, Dean of Students Stanley E. Crowe said yesterday.

Saying that the faculty had no intention of cracking down on the council, Crowe pointed out that in any institution levels of authority must exist, and that "there are too many chances of impractical or undesirable ideas" being passed by the council that need checking.

Tan King, councilor for men, said that final authority to regulate student activities must rest with the college faculty and president, adding that in his opinion the right of the Student Council to exist is not being questioned.

Clarification Asked  
A clarification for the purpose of the present Student Council constitution was asked Thursday by James Denison, administrative assistant, in a meeting between Student Council and faculty members. He suggested the council determine existing policies and positions before trying to write a new constitution.

The Student Council has a definite place here, King said. "They've done a fine job and I think they are doing a fine job with the new constitution."

The campaign must include a 500 word or less discussion of the central advertising theme as well as complete copy and layout roughs of each promotional device used. Minimum ideas to cover include window displays, newspaper, radio, and direct mail advertising and one national magazine layout.

Deadline date for the campaign is March 15. Eligibility rules and contest suggestions are on display on the State News bulletin board and entry blanks may be obtained from Cynthia Gorham, Detroit editor.

The entries are being judged on originality and adaptability to a national fashion advertising campaign. They will not be judged on artistic ability. Three identical first prizes are being offered.

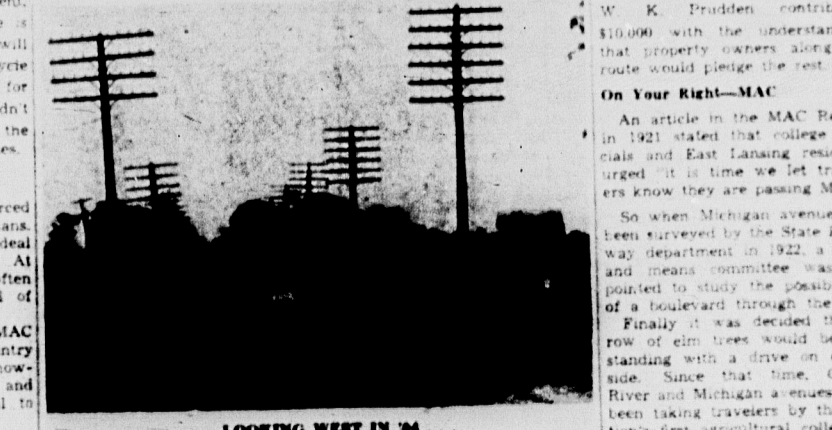
A favorite sport for the MAC cycling club was cross-country tours. From time to time, however, a group had to go out and clear underbrush for a trail to Lansing.

## Library Needs Million Books, Towne Says

In order to be adequate, a new library should seat approximately 1500 students and have space for over one million books. Towne said. The present library seats 700 students and has a capacity of about 250,000 volumes.

A tentative plan for the construction of a new building includes separate departments of the college. Towne said.

Agriculture and science, social science and education, languages and fine arts, Basic College and general references and periodicals would each have a separate reading room.

Each of these rooms would hold about 10,000 volumes in addition to those books in the stacks. Towne said.

Informed quarters pointed out that, under free speech a pact might be signed if it would imply that Finland had been incorporated into the Eastern bloc.

## LETTERS to the EDITOR

**TO THE EDITOR:**

The editorial in the State News of February 25 depicts the Commission on Higher Education's proposal for federal aid to needy and worthy prospective college students as a very worthwhile national objective. Few of us would refute any of the impressive arguments presented for such legislation.

However, we must consider the possible long-term effects of such a plan. Education is a primary factor in the promotion of the democratic ideal. Democracy in educational administration is possible only when many diverse ideas and attitudes are permitted to interact freely. The resultant evaluation and selection of policy can then be a flexible program capable of meeting the needs of all the people. The present system of local control of education operates in this manner.

If such matters are left to the discretion of one small group of men, the incumbent governing body, democracy in education ceases to exist. Powerful pressure groups would strongly influence policy-making in education, even as they so strongly influence policy-making in other fields of the nation. The powerful, often tainted, hand of politics must not be permitted to interfere in the education of our future citizens.

Federal aid to education is a worthwhile objective. Fed-

eral control of education would defeat our present democratic philosophy. Federal aid as an entering wedge of government could quite conceivably lead to Federal control.

Let us consider seriously the potential ramifications of the President's Commission on Higher Education plan before we praise it too highly.

Wayne university's unpredictable Tartars will have the chance of a lifetime to redeem themselves in the eyes of their supporters tonight at Jenison fieldhouse, when they ring down the curtain on Michigan State's home basketball season.

The Tartars with State have always been considered by Wayne as the "big" contest of the season and a victory tonight would make Tartar followers forget the Tartars' poor showing the last two winters.

The Tartars school won only three of 18 tilts during the 1946-47 campaign and have defeated only eight of 19 opponents this season. The Tartars will also be the underdog in their final game this year against Toledo university Monday night.

Wayne last winter MSC only twice in the 11 contests the two schools have played. The Spartans have completely dominated the series since 1929, winning eight straight games.

Early in the season, the Cornhuskers were rated to be little more than a breather for the Spartans. However, the Huskers have shown marked improvement during the latter part of their schedule and State coach Fendley Collins is planning on anything but a pushover in tonight's tussle.

According to Collins, the performance of the Spartans at Ann Arbor Monday night was singular and he is planning two or three changes against Nebraska to add more punch to the lineup.

In the 155-pound class, Pat Sullivan will be back in action for the first time since the Purdue meet. Sullivan suffered a shoulder injury against Kansas State Feb. 1 and has not been in the lineup since.

Close behind Mickles in the scoring race are Bob Maitegan and Dick Dickenson with 27 and 26 points respectively. Maitegan has a record of three falls, four decisions and one loss while Dickenson has posted on fall and seven decisions.

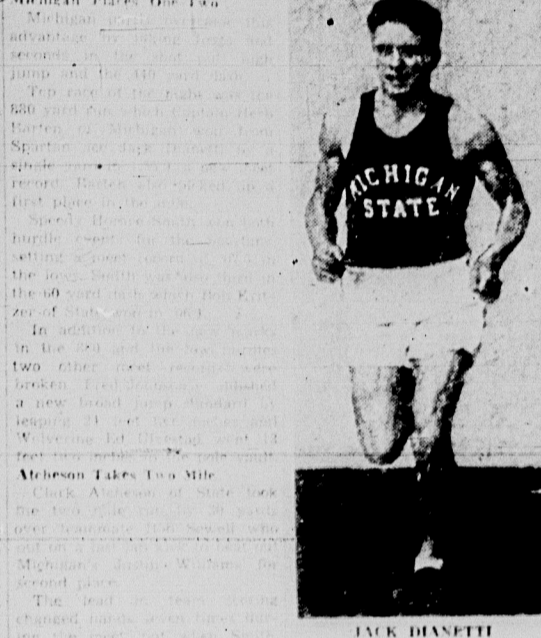

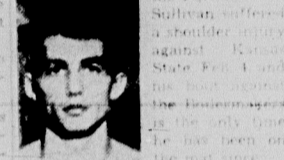

# Library Needs Million Books, Towne Says

Need for a bigger and better library for MSC was stressed by Jackson F. Towne, head librarian recently.

In order to be adequate, a new library should seat approximately 1500 students and have space for over one million books, Towne said. The present library seats 700 students and has a capacity of about 250,000 volumes.

A tentative plan for the construction of a new building includes separate departments of the college, Towne said.

Agriculture and science, social science and education, languages and fine arts, Basic College, and general reference work periods, each would have a separate reading room.

Each of these rooms would hold about 10,000 volumes in addition to those books in the stacks, Towne said.

# LETTERS to the EDITOR

**TO THE EDITOR:**  
The editorial in the State News of February 25 depicts the Commission on Higher Education's proposal for federal aid to needy and worthy prospective college students as a very worthy while national objective. Few of us would refute any of the impressive arguments presented for such a plan.

However, we must consider the possible long term effects of such a plan. Education is a primary factor in the promotion of the democratic ideal. Democracy in educational administration is possible only when many diverse ideas and attitudes are permitted to interact freely. The resultant evaluation and selection of policy can then be a flexible program capable of meeting the needs of all the people. The present system of federal control of education operates in this manner.

If such matters are left to the discretion of one small group of men, the incumbent governing body, democracy in education ceases to exist. Powerful pressure groups would strongly influence policy-making in education, even as they so strongly influence policy-making in other affairs of the nation. The power, often tainted, hand of politics must not be permitted to meddle in the education of our future citizens.

Federal aid to education is a worthwhile objective. Federal control of education would defeat our present democratic philosophy. Federal aid as an entering wedge of government could quite conceivably lead to Federal control.

Let us consider seriously the potential ramifications of the President's Commission on Higher Education plan before we praise it too highly.

# Seaway Project Bill Shelved By Senate After Heavy Debate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP) — The Senate today sent the St. Lawrence seaway project back to the shelf where it has been gathering dust for years.

A 57 to 30 vote returned the bitterly contested plan to the Foreign Relations committee "for further study." It was widely interpreted as ending any chance for further consideration of the enabling legislation this season.

In putting the motion through, Senator Smith (R-N.J.) and other critics of the legislation prevailed over such advocates as Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) and Senator Aiken (R-S.C.).

**May Be Nation's Lifeline**  
Vandenberg stepped down from the presiding officer's desk to plead for approval of the project. "One day this may well be the nation's lifeline," he declared.

Senator Bricker (R-Ohio) argued, on the other hand, that the project might well become a national peril if the nation came to depend on the seaway and then an enemy blew it up.

The proposal called for construction of a waterway link between the Great Lakes and the Atlantic, and also for the construction of a 2,200,000 horsepower hydroelectric plant near Massena, N.Y.

**Opposed By Railroads**  
The United States and Canada were to construct the entire project jointly. Advocates said it would be self-liquidating.

Some, but not all, of the mid-western senators supported the project on the theory it would lower the cost of shipping agricultural products.

It was opposed in committee hearing principally by railroads, eastern and gulf port cities, private utilities and some shipping interests.

**Project Half Century Old**  
Today's action makes it highly unlikely that the House, where identical legislation has been introduced, will consider the measure this session. The issue is almost certain to remain dormant until a new Congress assembles next January.

The seaway has been a source of discussion in top United States and Canadian circles for more than a half-century. All presidents from Warren G. Harding to Harry S. Truman have urged its construction.

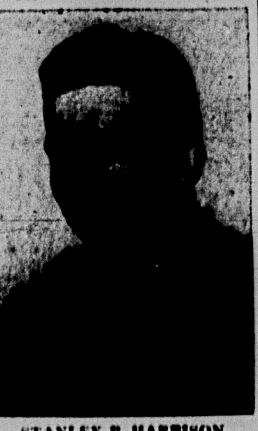

Apparently this was satisfactory to all concerned," Linton said, "because I have not had any complaints since. A majority vote of the faculty established this policy as it does all others."

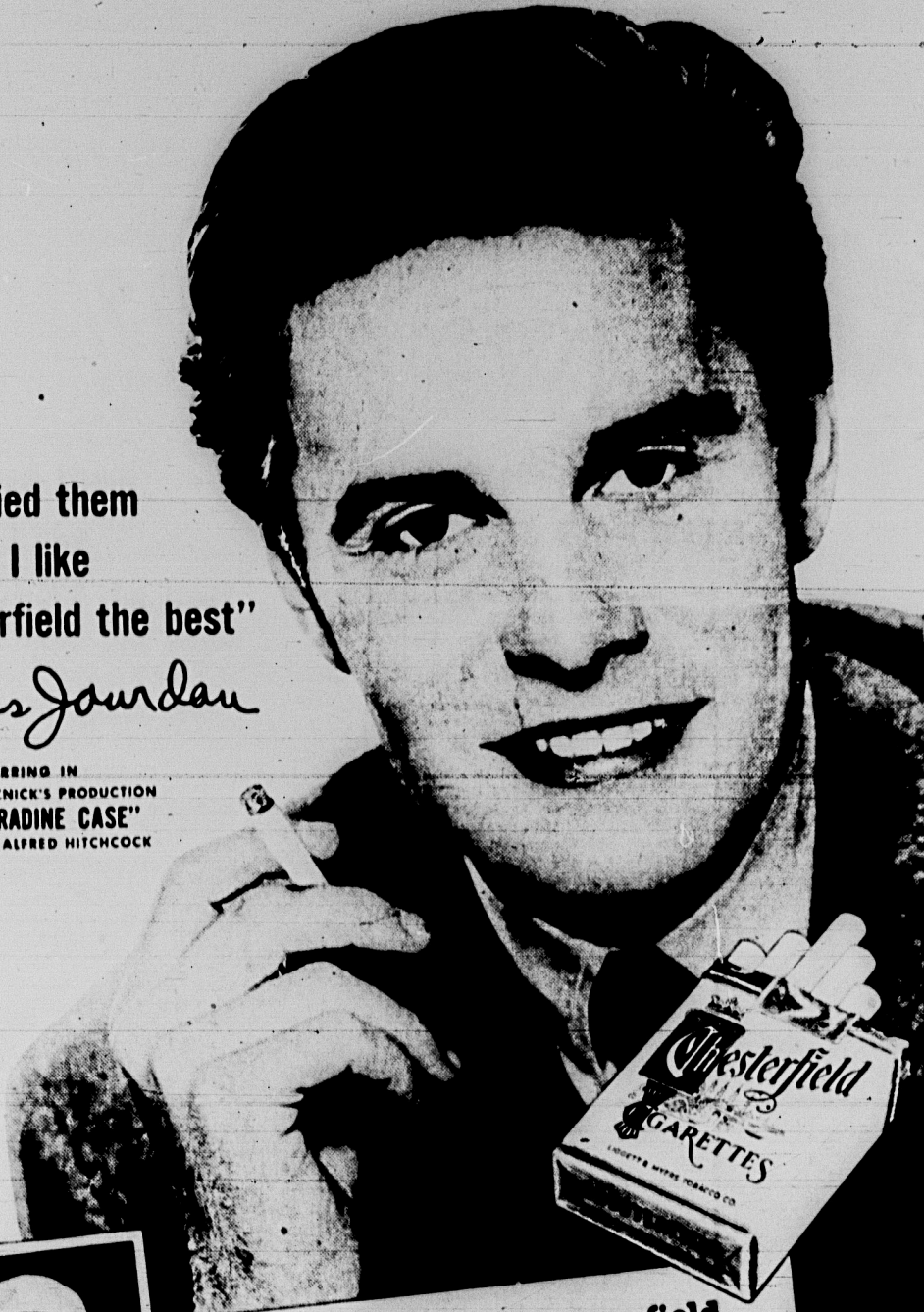
## Too Much Power
