Menace to Medicine

THE National Physicians' committee is offering newspaper cartoonists a prize up to \$1,000 for appraisals of the "political distribution of medical care" in the United States.

We received several pages of glossy propaganda from the committee this week, including sample editorials about the dangers of state medicine.

The reason for this sudden outburst is embodied in measures now pending in Congress to amend the Social Security Act which will, according to the committee, "place the distribution of medical care in the United States under a government bureaucracy."

The bill referred to is the Murray Wagner Dingell bill, which authorizes the surgeon general "to take all necessary and practical steps to arrange for personal health service benefits for all social security beneficiaries and their dependents." This covers 110,000,000 people. The bill provides for medical, dental, home nursing, laboratory and hospitalization benefits. The bill calls for national health insurance, but the committee says that in reality it is state medicine.

The committee's press release reads something like this:

"The source of the unremitting and relentless drive for compulsory sickness insurance—socialized medicine—the political distribution of medical care in

this country is the Moscow dominated Communist party in the United States."

The National Physicians' committee may be right about all these charges. It is their privilege to fight the passage of this legislation.

My only experience with anything approaching socialized medicine was in the army, and I didn't like it. State medicine is a distasteful prospect. The physicians' committee, however, is a little hasty to whitewash the medical profession without offering a cure for its ills which will erase the clamor for socialized medicine.

It's about time the National Physicians' committee did something about providing medical training to ALL those who are qualified and desirous of getting it. The nation is short of doctors, yet thousands of applicants are turned away because there is no room in the medical schools. Some Americans are turned away from medical schools for a more insidious reason: they are Negroes or Jews. This is as much a problem for doctors as it is for medical schools.

There is no doubt that many Americans are too poor to get proper medical and dental care. If socialized medicine is not the answer the physicians' committee should come forward with a satisfactory solution, instead of prating about the evils of bureaucracy.

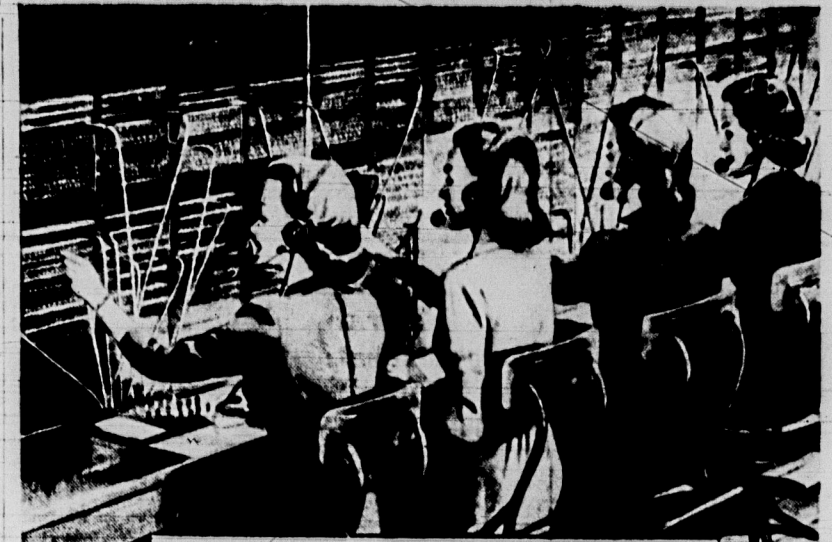

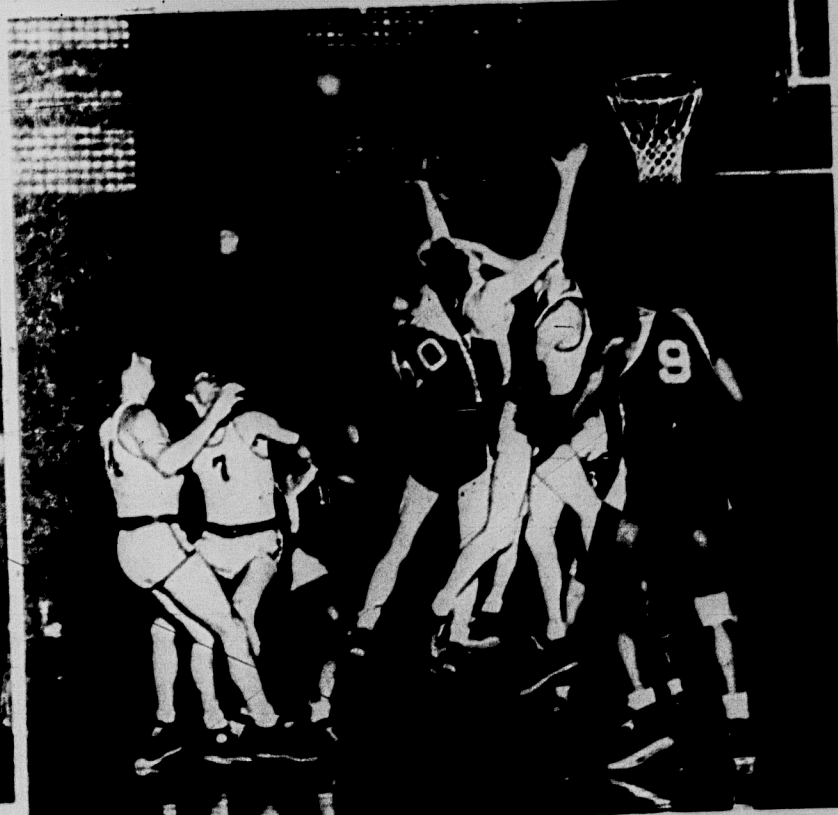

Coal of the Week

After studying ballet and modern dancing, dancing professionally, owning part of a troupe of dancers and living in New York's midtown as a "career girl" for several years Theda Assiff returned to Michigan to attend MSC.

Shortly after she arrived on campus Theda was one of the originators of the Dionysian organization, which was staffed last year. The group was for the benefit of students who felt they had talent in some form of theater art, but hadn't had a chance to show their talent.

At the present time Dionysians are rehearsing for the annual production "What Goes Up" scheduled for the first week of April.

Since she was about seven years old, Theda, now 22, has been dancing. While she was in high school she taught ballet, tap and social dancing at her Lansing studio, and continued teaching for a while after graduation.

Then she went to New York, where, among other studios, she studied at Carnegie hall. During this time she became acquainted

with the now popular Hollywood dancing actor, Gene Kelly, who was in her class.

Later on, in the show business, Theda became acquainted with the stages and audiences at the Capitol and Loew State theater in New York City, at the Shoreham hotel and Capitol theater in Washington, D. C. and at many other popular resorts throughout the east and middle west.

For a time, to follow her varied career, she was assistant choreographer at the Latin Quarter at Miami Beach, where her job was to assist the dance director. In January, 1934, she was dancing with Detroit operettas.

At the time of one of the recent President's balls in connection with the March of Dimes, Theda was dancing in a troupe at the Washington theater, when Hollywood stars, invited to the event, came backstage to congratulate them on the performance. Among the stars were George Raft, Eleanor Parker, and Brian Aherne.

"The people you meet in show business are grand," Theda says seriously, "and not at all as pictured by the average theater-goer. They're serious about their work, and trying to get ahead."

"I feel that I gained valuable experience just associating with the professional people."

In her work with the MSC Dionysians, Theda is in charge of creating and directing dance routines, and also is designing costumes for the current period production.

When she graduates from school the road hopes to go into radio work, along lines which will include work with television. She definitely "expects to have a career," and dancing will feature in it somewhere.

Theda is a first term junior, living at home in Lansing. Her major is in radio.

These and many more questions are the type to be discussed at the "career" convocations on Women's Day, April 22.



Condon Called Innocent

FBI Reports No Evidence Of Disloyalty

WASHINGTON, March 3.—(AP)—Atomic scientists related to the defense of Dr. Edward T. Condon today, and it was disclosed that an FBI report said there was no evidence Condon was disloyal in his alleged association with a Russian spy subject.

The chief of the Bureau of Standards was pictured by the Federation of American Scientists as the victim of a "deliberate smear." It appeared a report of a house in American facilities subcommittee which had said he mingled with alleged Russian agents.

The house group's chairman, Rep. J. Parnell Thomas (D-N.Y.), considered today that the report had omitted the favorable reference to Condon in a letter from a letter by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

Thomas explained that an investigator had copied only parts of the Hoover letter, and said the subcommittee must act that it had in making its report.

A further check disclosure he said, "that while Hoover did say there was evidence that Condon had been disloyal in associating with this one individual, the tenor of the rest of the three and a half pages is entirely different. It is none is certainly critical of Condon and his activities."

Thomas called for full disclosure of the letter by the Department of Commerce, under which Condon works. The subcommittee said the Hoover letter was addressed to the department in confidence last May.

Thomas has said previously that his group has no evidence that Condon is disloyal. When he asked Condon that at least been indiscreet.

Bill Fuller, president of the city says that registration of pets is necessary if the pet are to be kept on campus.

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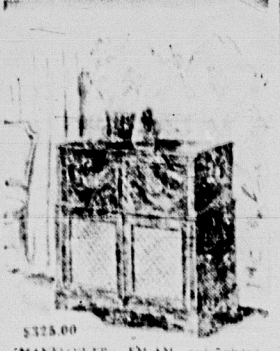
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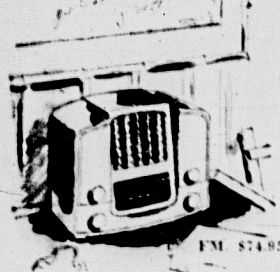
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
