Russia Says Banks Hold ed Officer

April 30 (AP)—A captured American officer reported today that the Russian army officer had a tea at the American official immediately before he was executed a week ago.

George P. Hays, U.S. Army captain, said he was investigating the account was carried by telephone in the office of the American military attaché in Moscow.

The officer was identified as a lieutenant colonel and was reported to have been a member of the American Red Cross.

House Votes Monday On Compromise Bill Which Rejects UMT

70 Group Air Force Proposal Hits Temporary Snag In Senate

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—The House armed services committee has finished work on a draft bill and will vote Monday, chairman Andrews (R-N.Y.) said today.

Under the bill all men 18 through 30 would register, and those 19 through 25 would be liable for two years service. Most veterans would be exempt.

The measure contains no mention of universal military training.

It differs in several respects from one being studied by the Senate armed services committee. The Senate measure contains both draft and UMT and would register men 18 through 25, and draft those 19 through 25.

Teen-age trainees under the Senate measure would be trained in the regular armed forces along with draftees. Under an original administration proposal, an elaborate system of UMT camps would have been set up to train younger men apart from the armed services.

The 70-group air force already approved by the House and by the Senate appropriations committee, ran into a minor snag today.

The Senate will vote on the \$3,233,999,000 bill to start a 70-group air force and otherwise strengthen the armed forces during the appropriations committee had hoped.

The committee yesterday by a vote of 16 to 10 approved the bill and passed the measure to the Senate. They wanted the Senate to take action on it today.

But the Senate rules will not permit a vote on a measure the same day a committee reports it unless all members agree to it.

Nowak Calls War 'Crime' In Aud Talk

"If we understand what is actually happening in Europe, we must conclude that war is not only unnecessary, but would be a crime."

State Senator Nowak (D-Detroit) prepared his talk with this statement last night in the Music auditorium. He spoke under the auspices of the Progressive party, headed by Henry Wallace in the coming presidential election.

Nowak asserted that the spread of communism in Europe, particularly Eastern Europe, was based primarily on economic and social pressures quite apart from Russian political pressure.

The economic and social factors he listed as the cause of the revolution against fascism in the urgent necessity of getting industrial wheels turning again without regard to the matter of ownership, and (3) the fear of foreign exploitation.

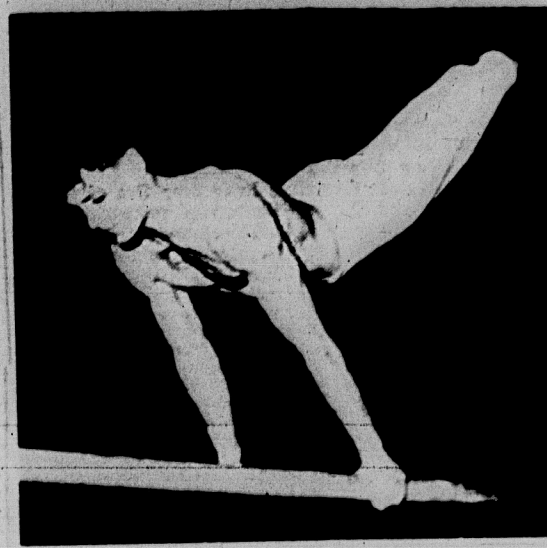

Annual Festival To Draw 77 Bands, 18 Orchestras

Five thousand high school students from all over Michigan's lower peninsula will "strike up the band" at MSC today for the annual festival of the Michigan school band and orchestra association.

Taking over the college auditorium, music building, Jenison gymnasium and the East Lansing high school auditorium, the festival will last from 8 a. m. till 9:30 p. m.

95 Music Groups

The festival will include 77 bands and 18 orchestras. Each instrumental group will have 25 minutes on the program in which to play a warm-up march, a required selection, and a selection of its own choice. In addition each group will compete in a sight reading event.

Leonard Falcone, director of bands at MSC and local chairman of the festival emphasizes that the bands and orchestras have been grouped according to classes and will not compete against each other but against a standard of proficiency in their respective classes.

Judges Announced

Judges for the four classes will be noted music educators of the mid-West. In the college auditorium, adjudicators will be Lt. Col. Harold B. Bachman, former director of bands in the University of Chicago; Mark H. Hindsley, assistant director of bands at the University of Illinois; Merle J. Isaac, Chicago composer; and H. F. Nut, from Vandercook School of Music, Chicago, Ill.

In the East Lansing high school auditorium will be William D. Revell, director of bands at the University of Michigan; George Wahn, Oberlin Conservatory of Music, Oberlin, O.; Albert R. Gish, public schools, Chicago, Ill.; and Dr. Frank Simon, director of the Armo band and former concert soloist with the Sousa band.

Third Group

The third group in the Jenison gymnasium will include Alvin R. Edgar, director of bands at Iowa State college, Ames, Ia.; Leonard Meretta, director of bands at Western Michigan college, Kalamazoo; Traugott Rohmer, Northwestern university, Evanston, Ill.; and Keith Stein, Michigan State college.

The last group in the music auditorium will be Frederick C. Evvs, Hobart, Ind.; Myron F. Russell, director of bands at Iowa State Teacher's college, Cedar Rapids, Iowa; Roy Miller, assistant director of bands at Wayne university, Detroit; and Daniel L. Martino, director of bands at Ohio University, Athens, O.

Foreign Enrollment Rates High Here

Michigan State ranks sixteenth in the nation in the number of foreign students in attendance according to a bulletin published recently by the Committee on Friendly Relations Among Foreign Students, in New York.

Michigan State is listed as having 207 foreign students, 173 men and 34 women, ranking it second in the state. The University of Michigan, ranked fourth in the nation, leads Michigan with a total of 670.

The State of Michigan also ranks fourth in the nation in the total number of foreign students enrolled, trailing New York, California and Massachusetts with a total of 1,424.

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Strike Crisis Hits Nation As Wage Raises Asked

Labor-management differences erupted Friday in the worst crisis since the wave of strikes that swept the country following the war's end.

Strikes or threats of strikes hung over five of the nation's vital industries.

The show-down — expected largely during the month of May — has resulted from a collision of labor demands for another round of wage boosts against a stiffening wall of management resistance to higher operating cost.

Major Developments

1. The CIO United Auto Workers set May 12 for a strike of 15,000 Chrysler Corp. employees.

2. John L. Lewis called on coal operators to start negotiations on a new contract May 18. The present contract expires June 30.

3. Federal agents working against a nationwide rail strike set for May 11, reported hope that might be averted.

Major developments in the steel industry were reported by the CIO United Electrical Workers union announced it has completed all legal requirements for a strike of 200,000 workers against the General Electric and Westinghouse companies and the electrical industry of General Motors.

Federal negotiators in Washington, who have made no progress toward settling the 41-day dispute of nearly 100,000 CIO steel workers, resumed earlier work on the weekend.

Many one-third workers are offered in the current of fourth round negotiations in the five industrial categories of General Motors.

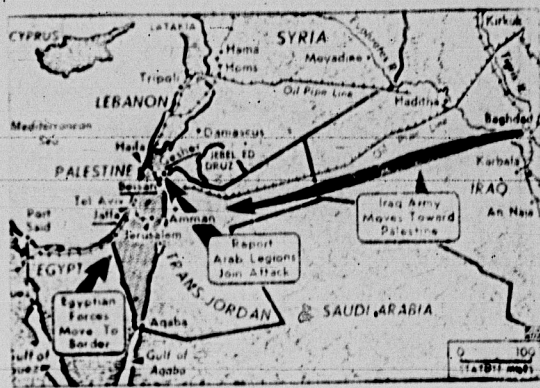

Battle For Jerusalem Rages As Arab Invasion Reported

JERUSALEM, April 30 (AP)—Jewish attack troops drove a wedge tonight around a string of Arab strongholds in a 22-day battle for Jerusalem.

Fighting in the southern section of the Holy City halted the Jews from Arab fighters asked for a truce. The struggle was aimed at two holy religious shrines, the Western Wall and Temple Mount.

Fifteen Jews and 20 Arabs are known to have been killed during the fighting.

Just before the truce halt in the fighting, a Jewish agency spokesman said the British disarmed 1,000 Arab fighters and sent them to Jordan in the desert that if the battle continued Palestine this afternoon.

STREAMLINED WARFARE New Infantry Groups Need Skilled Officers

Infantry is no longer a "fix bayonets... charge" proposition, Col. John L. Whiteley, ROTC commandant, said yesterday in explaining the infantry courses at State.

With new developments and organization, an infantry officer must be not only a jack of all trades, but an expert at most of them.

New Weapons Added

New weapons have been added to infantry armament, he pointed out. For example, line companies are armed with the M16 recoilless rifle. They can be fired from the shoulder and have practically the same potential as the old piece formerly used by tank company.

Effective employment of these require artillery methods of observation and fire control. At the same time tanks are an integral part of the organization of infantry regiments.

Officers Needed

At present there are 26 candidates, which carry a 200-mile career. With such vehicles attached to line companies, officers are needed for immediate command duties as well as company officers versed in armored tactics.

Machine guns and mortars have been broken down to platoon level, Col. Whiteley said. Platoon leaders must be more familiar with their use and possibilities.

Modern Warfare

Modern warfare has prescribed requirements for infantry units and are rapidly being filled by the War Department, ROTC students receive instruction in these new duties, Col. Whiteley said. In addition, during their summer training they work with these new theories and equipment under field conditions.
