Let us all hope that this election will bring forth the type of candidate who wants to work to improve the student government at Michigan State, not the all too frequent type who wishes merely to improve his social standing.

It seems to me that one way to cut down on the number of social climbers in student government would be to make all student government participants ineligible for honoraries.

However I have heard that getting on Student Council and working does not make a social outcast out of anyone.

One Active Group

MSC's newly-formed progressive party deserves much credit for bringing to speak here a speaker who was not afraid to speak frankly on the pressing and controversial problems of the day.

State Senator Stanley Nowak, currently listed as a Democrat from Detroit, Friday night provided a refreshing contrast to previous politicians who have insisted on delivering high school civics lectures to a college audience.

The senator spoke extemporaneously, straight from the shoulder. In the question and answer session, which followed, he answered a series of "hot" questions without hedging.

It was apparent from the beginning that most of the audience was already sympathetic with progressivism as represented by the idea of Henry Wallace.

The chances are that a more representative group would not have fallen in so wholeheartedly with Nowak's ideas on the handling of the Russian situation. An audience a little less friendly might have prolonged the session with some pointed and challenging questions.

The answer to communism vs. defecracy may not be as simple as it sounded Friday night in the Music auditorium.

But the Progressives have carried the ball on the first play. They have set a standard for the Young Democrats, Young Republicans, and any others that may show up before November.

College officials rate a word of praise also, for permitting a talk of this nature to be presented on the campus.

Let's have more of them.
