Leaders Respect Threat To Enforce Seizure Act

WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP) — The coast-to-coast railroad was called off tonight. Three resisting unions bowed court order not to go ahead with the strike which was set for 6 a.m. tomorrow.

Legislators Pledge Fight For Passage Of Construction Bill

Two Lansing Representatives Say State Must Give Support

Two Lansing representatives yesterday pledged continuing support for the passage of the appropriations bill which would allow the MSC construction program to proceed. Rep. Harold W. Hungerford, 2223 Forest avenue, said, "I don't like the treatment it's had."

Rep. Robert M. Montgomery, 2706 East Michigan avenue, added, "I've been for it all the way."

Senator Harry F. Hittle of East Lansing is on vacation and could not be reached. Neither could Rep. Jacob Schepers, also of East Lansing.

Since the federal government does not contribute to educational programs of this nature, it would be a big mistake to let this bill die," Hungerford said. "The state has to bear the load."

"Foolish To Let It Die" It seems to me that with MSC's enrollment figured to level off at between nine and 12 thousand, it would be plain foolishness to let the bill die."

Hungerford is on the House committee for the college.

Winter damage to the bare frames of the buildings already started might very well make it necessary to tear them down and start over," he added.

Montgomery See Quorum Montgomery thought that if a workable compromise could be reached before May 20, a quorum would be on hand to pass the bill on that date.

"The House Ways and Means committee and the Senate Finance committee are back in Lansing working on the bill now," Montgomery reported. "I would go for any workable compromise they might reach. We were willing before to compromise on \$1,000,000 for the Physics building, instead of the \$1,500,000 originally asked."

Difficulty Outlined Montgomery was asked where the difficulty lay between the Senate and the House.

"In the Senate, a group had set themselves up to buck the bill. They refused to take the budget director's estimate of state revenues for the coming year."

"They claimed that the bill as they had cut it would put us standing at \$1,000,000 in the red. With the original appropriations, the House figured a smaller deficit than that."

Other Projects Besides the provision for construction at state-supported educational institutions, the capital outlay bill (Senate Bill No. 16) would appropriate money for the upkeep of county roads and the building of a state mental hospital at Northville.

Both Hungerford and Montgomery stated they would be willing to see the Northville project dropped for this year, particularly if so doing would help pass the remainder of the bill.

Bill Tabled However, Hungerford said, "At this late date, the various sections of the bill cannot be separated."

After having been sent into joint Senate-House conference committee twice without an agreement being reached, the bill is now on the Senate table.

In a talent hunt of a different sort than the current search for student announcers, WKAR is auditioning students for roles in various dramatic programs in the 1948-49 series, to begin next fall.

J. Kenneth Richards, WKAR production manager, said all interested students should see him in his office at the radio station, or call EXT. 489 or 489.

#### Techniques Parallel

At the Columbus, Ohio, Institute for Education by Radio, said Richards, he found that network techniques for production of dramatic programs closely paralleled the methods used at WKAR.

He pointed out that such training would provide a valuable background for the students who later go into professional work as producers or actors.

Replacements for present roles should be underclassmen, preferably freshmen or sophomores, though all students are invited to audition, Richards said.

Richards said extensive experience is not required because he will train promising actors.

#### Need Versatile Actors

Such programs as "Adventures in Music" and "The College Looks Ahead" require a fluid group of actors to retain the continuity of the series.
