\$3,000 J-Hop Profit Unfair

Purpose of the high priced five dollar levy for tickets, the News said, was "so that the junior class could make a nice tidy profit of approximately \$2,500.

No class or group should be allowed to charge more for any event that they spon-sor than is necessary to insure that basic expenses will be met. The average student has enough trouble getting along in these inflationary times without unwittingly being forced to contribute to some pet project.

The price of dances and other social events should be kept at an absolute minimum to insure that as many students as possible have an opportunity to participate.

Campus Chest: Now Or Never

THE CAMPUS CHEST WILL EITHER individual drives have failed too. be given the go-ahead or cut short this Thursday. A group of nearly 100 students representing campus organizations will meet to discuss the plan. We think that it's a question that is worth a little thought, in spite of the many strong arguments against the proposal.

If the students find that the plan is objectionable, they will in all likelihood petition the student council to drop the matter.

The strongest argument against such a project is that are there enough charities to make a campus chest worthwhile. The Red Cross and March of Dimes are of course against inclusion in any sort of combined charity by national policies. The American Legion poppy sale always takes place on Mem-

The Jewish War Relief, it is asserted, appeals to one group. The Newman club drive and the World Student Service Fund are the only two student centered fund drives. And lastly the Memorial Fund drive appeal is aimed mostly at alumni. The last we tend to doubt, from past experience, and a drive for the students would not be too surprising in the future.

FURTHER OBJECTIONS ARE THAT IT hurts the student less to be asked for donations over a long period of time rather than be hit for a lump sum all at once. Then it is argued that the students will give the same amount to the combined chest drive as they would to any single charity. Thus the individual groups would be getting less.

Other objections are that students will not get the individual publicity and educational value involved with the drives like the Red Cr ss, March of Dimes, or WSSF.

This argument we think can be easily overweighted. From the newspaper angle we think that it would be simpler, clearer and more direct to maintain a short concentrated publicity campaign than to handle six or seven disinterested publicity campaigns throughout the vear.

Students may have a particular dislike for some charity that is included in the chest and thus limit their contribution. Finally the objectionists argue that success on other campuses has been limited and in some cases the drives have failed, although it might be here said that just as many or more

ALL THESE OBJECTIONS ARE VALID and should be taken into consideration. However, in our mind, the main argument transcends all of these objections.

A campus chest would provide a sus-tained activity that would include even more students than the well organized WSSF drive of last fall. It would most of all give the students an opening to assert themselves as being capable of conducting their own affairs.

This may sound foolish, but not once in Given Liberty Lou' Group To Hear the past year, or years for that matter, have the students had a chance to show they can By Local Judge conduct their own self-government in an orderly fashion. And this is the main block that stands between the Student council and increased powers and responsibilities.

Whether or not the Red Cross and March of Dimes would be hurt if left out is doubtful. If deemed advisable, the chest could allot a special percentage to each group, and it is hardly thought that either group would refuse to accept a lump contribution, no matter how it was raised.

One of the main talking points for the day chest is that it would be a suitable way of raising money for a charity fund for unforeseen events such as when a fire divested a Spartan family of its belongings in the trailer village last winter. Other worthy charities could well be included, such as aid On Upper Deck to the blind students.

WHETHER OR NOT THE MONEY Carnava raised would equal or surprass the amounts gained in the individual drives during the year would remain to be seen. It's been done more than once.

It is up to the students. If they would give rather see half a dozen charities pop up proughout the year, that's okay. But if they would rather get the business over with in one concentrated drive, it will take a lot of work. The WSSF drive of last fall has for laid excellent grounds for such a drive.
