Music Instructors To Play Mass, Chamber Melodies Of Composer

MSC's annual spring music festival will start its second year as a campus tradition tomorrow with the presentation of chamber music and the "Requiem Mass" by Mozart. Chamber music will be given at 2 p.m. in the Music Auditorium and the mass at 4 p.m. in the College Auditorium.

These festivals are different from those at the University of Michigan and other schools in that they stress the works of only one great composer each year.

Plans are taking shape for submission of a completely revised Student government constitution to the student body at the final vote for student government and class officers May 26.

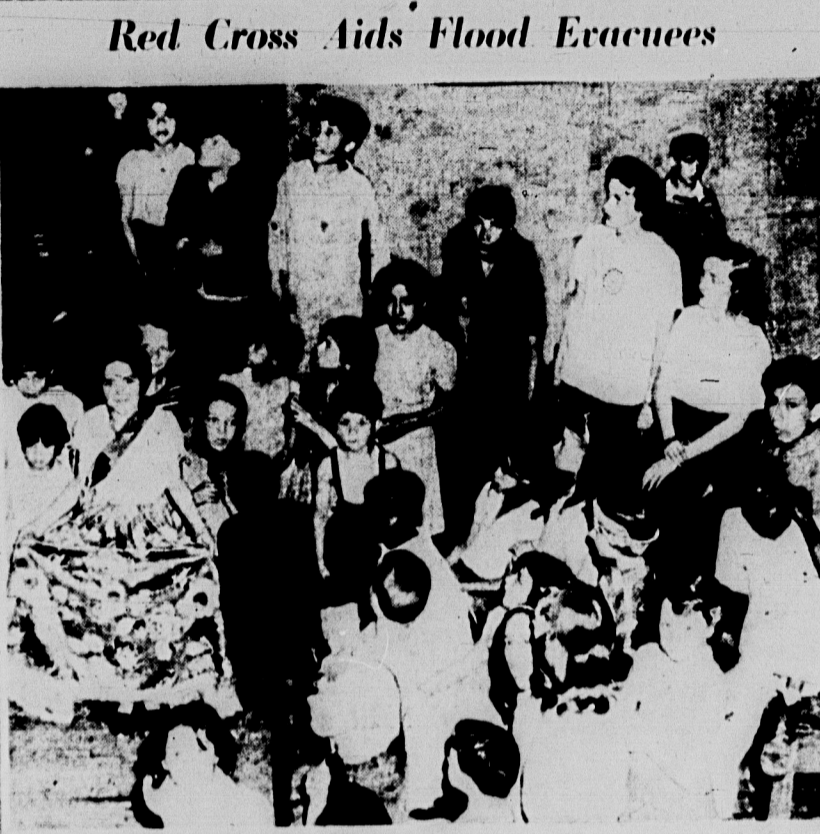
Revision committee members say the document, which has received the tentative approval of key administration figures, is designed to give Michigan State college an efficient, streamlined student government.

The new announcers are: Jim Dunbar, Dearborn freshman, advertising and journalism student; Bob Boston, Pontiac freshman, speech student who was active in school broadcasts in Pontiac; Don Sherman, Bay City freshman, speech student; and Jim Adams, East Lansing high school senior.

Frymire says he expects that the station will need more announcers next fall when WKAR-FM goes into operation. Present plans, says Frymire, call for as many as 12 on the announcing staff.

Four of the present announcing staff will be graduated in June: Dick Hurley, Milbrietown, N.Y.; Ted Brink, Grand Rapids; Tony Chapp, Detroit; and Bob Shackleton, Dearborn. Shackleton has been WKAR's sports editor since January 1947.

Ice Now Delivered To Spartan City, Trailer Camp

Ice is now being delivered to residents of Spartan City and the trailer camp. The first deliveries were made on May 10, and are proceeding on an alternate-day schedule.

The distributors are the Tow & Wells Ice Delivery Service. They start delivering at 8 a.m. on fixed routes. On Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, the cover sections A, C, E, G, J, S, R, M, L, Q, P, N, and K of the trailer camp. They also deliver to Birch Rd., Cherry Lane, and Chestnut Rd. in Spartan City.

On Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, they go to sections H, F, D, and B of the trailer camp, and Shaw Lane, Chestnut Rd., Hickory Lane, Walnut Lane, and Maple Lane in the barracks area. Discount cards are being printed and will be sold to all users who want them. For \$3 ice worth \$3.15 will be delivered, the card being punched at each delivery.

U.N. Sensation

The news of recognition created a sensation in the United Nations assembly hall in New York. It came while the U.N. was expecting a U.S. proposal to set up a trusteeship-type regime for Jerusalem.

Mr. Truman's action came while several hundred persons — some cheering, some crying — watched the first official raising of the flag of Israel in Washington.

Arms Embargo

The President's announcement immediately raised speculation here as to whether the American government was also prepared to lift its embargo against arms shipments to the middle east in order that the Jewish state might obtain weapons in the United States.

Diplomatic informants would say only that recognition did not automatically effect the embargo.

Along with the recognition announcement, the White House reaffirmed that the United States will continue to support efforts to obtain a truce in the Jewish-Arab fighting in the Holy Land and expressed the hope that the See PALESTINE, Page 4

Grid Teams End Drills With Game

Today's intra-squad game in Macklin field at 1:30 will bring to an official close six weeks of spring football drills for Coach Biggie Mann and his 87-man grid squad.

The contest today shapes up as a battle between the former freshman and junior varsity performers on one team and the majority of last year's varsity men comprising the opposing squad.

This year the fight for first string positions has been especially tough because of the unusually large group of first and second year men out for practice.

Two Teams

In an effort to make the men in actual game competition against the more experienced players, Mann has divided his group into two teams, the "Green" and the "White."

The Green squad is headed by Forest Ewaschewski, and Robert Kiora, should be the team to come out on top if experience can be used as a measuring stick.

Eight of the starting eleven are lettermen, the only exceptions being Hank Mietrek, end, Avoy Spenhahn, quarterback, and Carl Netzer, guard.

A glance at the rest of the 40-man Green roster shows a combination of lettermen and first year men.

Ground Attack

The Green attack will probably be centered largely to the ground, with backs like Greer, Waters, Chagnois, and Blomquist on hand to do the leather-bulging.

The freshman-studded Whites, led by coaches Rip Taylor and "Duffy" Demery, are short on experience, but long on determination.

The only veteran in the opening lineup are tackle Carl Campbell, guard Ed Speltz, and halfback Dan Spigel.

Triple Threat

The Whites are fortunate in having ones like Bob McManus and Donnie Dubbe in their line and quarterback, so they are confident in their backfield.

This trio should provide the team with an aerial attack which will go a long way in outbalancing the superior ground game of the Greens.

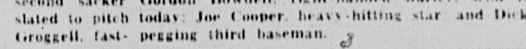

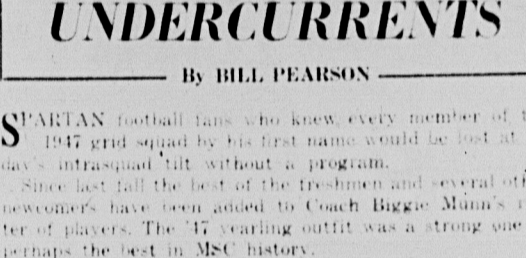

Cowles Gets Minnesota Coach's Job

Declares Choice 'Most Difficult'

MINNEAPOLIS, May 14 (AP)—Osborne "Ozzie" Cowles, 47 year old basketball coach at Michigan, today was named head basketball coach at the University of Minnesota.

The appointment was recommended by President James L. Morrill and confirmed by the board of regents at its meeting today.

Cowles became head basketball coach at Dartmouth in 1936, remaining there seven years. In his years at Dartmouth, he won seven Eastern Inter-Collegiate championships in basketball.

He went to Michigan in 1946 and his cage team won the conference championship last season with 10 wins and two losses.

Cowles termed the decision to leave Michigan as "the most difficult I have ever had to make." He admits that his two-year stay in Ann Arbor was "the happiest of my coaching career."

U.S. Recognizes Palestine State

(Continued From Page 1) Jewish government would cooperate to that end.

Mr. Truman's announcement came without forewarning from state department or other administration officials.

Legal Status Questioned

It left many questions unanswered, among them the question of the legal status of the rest of Palestine and the legal basis on which the United States itself was acting.

Both the White House and the state department declined to amplify the newest turn in American policy or to explain the legal background of the President's decision or its future implications.

There remains a question which American officials either could not or would not answer tonight—exactly what part of Palestine is under control of the new government.

The understanding of officials here had been that the new Jewish state would establish itself in approximately the same areas as the Jews would have received un-

der the United Nations partition plan. However, in the absence of formal and legal commitments on boundaries it appeared that the issue of exact territory might provide one of the big new disputes in Palestine in the weeks ahead.

Speed Unexplained

The speed with which President Truman proclaimed recognition of the new Jewish state was, like

other aspects of the action, unexplained.

There seemed to be little doubt that while the United States would win the acclaim of the Jews for its policy on recognition it would gain new enemies from the Arab nations. The Arabs were opposed to the partition plan of the United Nations and insisted that the most they were willing to agree to was a federal government for the Holy Land comprising both Jewish and Arab political units in one nation.
