



Or at least, if they know themselves, they're doing a good job of hiding it from the electorate. The only impression I can get from their speeches and propaganda is that Kelly thinks Williams is a socialist and Williams thinks Kelly is too good a friend of big business.

Kelly is accusing Williams of being supported by A.D.A. which, in Kelly's opinion, is a nasty old bunch of radicals. Williams doesn't deny that he has A.D.A support but says that it is a non-partisan outfit which picks candidates from either side of the political fence.

Personally, I'm not concerned with who is supporting

Personally. I'm not concerned with who is supporting whom or whether one candidate thinks the other is a so-cialist or a member of the Bull Moose party. All I want is a good man to administer fairly and adequately. He should have a constructive program, clearly presented and sifficiently explained so that voters don't go to the polls in the state of confusion they do now. 




