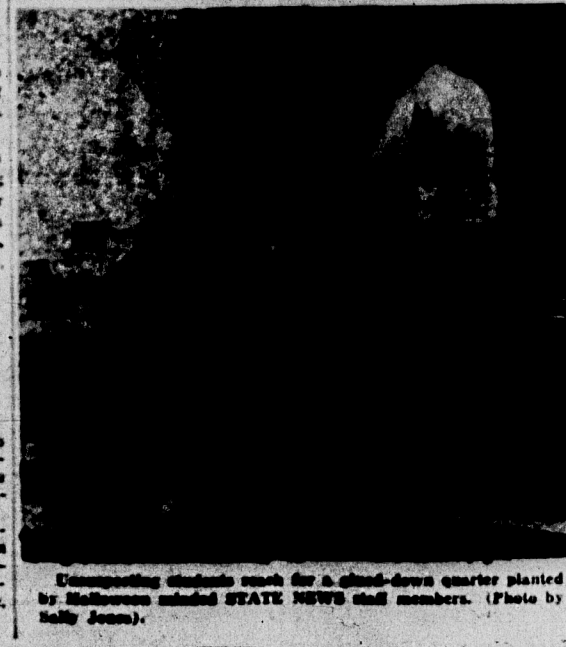

Family Drama 'S' Campus Opened To All Cleaners, Rebate Fought

'Death Of Salesman' Set For Nov. 8

Cleaner Protests Kickback As Taking Too Much Profit

Any cleaner will be able to operate on the MSC campus under college regulations it was decided yesterday.

The 23 1/2 percent rebate which cleaners must pay to the inter-dormitory council out of funds collected at dormitories was violently objected to by members of an East Lansing cleaning firm.

At a meeting between representatives of the inter-dorm council, the administration, and the Lansing chapter of the Michigan Association of Cleaners and Dyers, the request that all cleaners be able to do business at State dormitories was agreed to.

However, under college regulations the cleaners must pay 23 1/2 percent of money collected at the dormitories to the inter-dorm council.

Rebate Takes Profit

Earl E. Hicks, of Hicks Cleaners, said that the rebate takes too much of the cleaner's profit. "We would be operating too closely to go into the college successfully," Hicks said.

Mrs. Hicks said that the cleaners didn't have much choice in accepting college terms. "It was three dry cleaners against a gang of students and college officials," she said. "There wasn't much they could do."

According to Mrs. Hicks, the cleaners of Lansing, who she said were going to raise their prices this week, have the lowest rates in the vicinity.

The clothing passes through the hands of eight employees at the cleaners, Mrs. Hicks said. "The cleaners have to pay the wages of these employees and overhead expenses out of the 23 1/2 left to them by the college. Do you think that makes sense?" she said.

One Expense

Mrs. Hicks said that the only expense the college takes is one girl who merely writes invoices supplied by the cleaners. Yet they say that they are running in the red with the 23 1/2," she said.

Fred Newberry, an inter-dormitory representative, said that if the cleaners didn't think they could operate under the rebate, they don't have to.

"We think they can," Newberry said. "That's why we designed the program."

Newberry said that it was correct that the inter-dorm council was in the red under the present set-up. "The volume of business done by the cleaners so far hasn't covered inter-dorm expenses," Newberry said.

However, he added, that he doubted very much that the rebate would be lowered when the expenses could be met.

Arthur Twitchell, one of the cleaners now operating in the college, said that he was "quite agreeable" to the present plan.

Expect More Profit

Twitchell said that at present he wasn't making any profit but that

Council Expenses Jump; Yearly Budget Half Gone

Administration Expected To Help Pay For Rallies

Student council has already spent about 44 percent of its yearly appropriation with six weeks of fall term remaining, Council President Bob Rombouts revealed yesterday.

Expenses thus far have reached \$550. The council annual receives \$1,300 from the college administration.

Rombouts termed the budget "the lowest, or one of the lowest in the Big Ten."

Student government at the U. of M. operates on at least \$4,500 per year, Rombouts said. Other college governments have as much as \$10,000 at their disposal, he added.

Those amounts are raised largely through promotional activities such as dances, Rombouts said.

Wash' Raised Money
"We've kept away from raising money because we thought the council should be a legislative branch of student affairs. But if expenses keep up we will have to raise the money some way."

"I don't think anything which is just given to you is worth much anyhow."

The council has already spent more than twice as much as it spent during the entire fall term last year, Rombouts said.

Pep Rallies Expensive
He attributed the greatest expense to pep rallies, which have cost \$187 so far this term. The administration will help pay for remaining rallies, Rombouts said.

"Dean King has agreed to help us out," Rombouts said. "I told him that we couldn't afford the pep rallies." The administration helped pay for rallies last year, too.

Other Expenses
Other expenses include \$80 for hiring the Roller rink, \$85 for freshman welcome letters, \$50 for calendars, and \$49 for "supplies which we can't locate," Rombouts said.

Rombouts said expanded activities in the organizations bureau, the displaced persons board, and the campus chest had added to council expenses.

In addition, the all-college band committee and school elections will have to be financed by the council, Rombouts said.

Annual Novice Debate Meet Moved Ahead

MSC's novice debate tournament, originally scheduled for Nov. 30, has been moved up to Nov. 18, Prof. Frederick G. Alexander, debate coach, announced yesterday.

Professor Alexander said the date has been moved up because no rooms were available in Berkeley hall on Nov. 30.

Open only to novice debaters, the tournament will consist of three rounds—the first from 10 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and the other two continuing after lunch. Professor Alexander defined a novice debater as any undergraduate student who has had no previous experience in tournaments at college level.

Debate teams are asked to bring their own judges, but judges will be furnished for a fee. The judges will evaluate the teams, but will not declare winners.

Professor Alexander asked freshman debaters or inexperienced debaters in other classes to contact him as soon as possible.

The debates will be held in Berkeley hall.

Constitution Amendment On Ballot

Would Change Voting Rules

Editor's Note: This article concerns the first of four proposals to be presented to Michigan's voters Nov. 7. Proposal number two on the \$65,000,000 mental hospital bond issue was explained last week.

Proposal number one on Michigan's referendum ballot is an innocuous measure that has been paid little attention in comparison with the other three issues that voters will decide on Nov. 7.

The proposed amendment would change the city and township residence requirement from 20 to 30 days and remove some antiquated phrases from a somewhat verbose state constitution.

Favorably Backed
In unanimously presenting the resolution for the voter's approval of the state legislature was responsive to the request of municipal election officials.

They stated that the 20 day residence requirement does not allow sufficient time for the completion of registration records before election day.

Constitution Requires
Article III of the state constitution now requires the voter to have "resided in the state six months and in the city or township in which he or she offers to vote 20 days preceding such election."

Reference to those living in Michigan prior to June 24, 1833 would be deleted. All mention of the voting qualifications of foreign born citizens would also go, as would those relating to "civilized Indians."

The proposal was introduced in the legislature by Representative Patrick J. Doyle, Dearborn Democrat. It is endorsed by the Michigan Municipal League.


