LONDON—Now that the smoke has cleared from American election battlefields, British observers are waiting to see what effect the results will have upon the mist-bound little island and its 50 million inhabitants.

Commission Adopts New Preamble

Student Government Planning commission broke ground for a new constitution Saturday by passing a tentative preamble.

The commission adopted the first article of last spring's unpassed "little Hoover" constitution for the preamble. It provides for an official and representative student organization with powers to investigate student problems and to participate in decisions affecting students.

At Saturday's meeting the commission agreed to have the new constitution ready for approval by Feb. 28. If passed, the student government will incorporate executive, judicial, and legislative branches.

Landmark Goes Removal Of MSC Weather Tower Completed Soon

Another landmark is disappearing from the campus. The old ninety foot weather tower located behind the personnel office is being torn down. Albert H. Eichmeier, U. S. Weather Bureau announced the sale of the tower yesterday.

The old tower erected in 1928 was used for observations and as a direction tower. Workmen stated that the purchaser intends to use the tower as a television antenna.

Fresh Council Names New Members

Sophomore and eight freshmen were named to the council this week. Fifty petitions were received, Bob Forman, class president said. Petitions were checked by the committee of class officers with the names of the freshmen appointed.

Asks Relief Of Gopher Grid Duties

Poor Season Ends
Career Of Mentor

MINNEAPOLIS — (AP) — Grey-haired, taciturn Bernie Bierman today asked to be relieved of his football coaching duties at the University of Minnesota, thus ending an 18-year career that included the highest era of Gopher gridiron history. He will stay until the end of the year.

His request came in the middle of the poorest season ever endured by a Bierman-coached team. The Gophers haven't won a game this year, losing six and playing a 7-7 tie with Michigan.

Bierman took over as head coach at Minnesota in 1932, succeeding Fritz Crisler who moved to Princeton and later to Michigan as head coach. Crisler now is the Wolverine athletic director.

In the years that followed, Bierman's teams achieved the top position among the nation's squads five times and captured the Western Conference championship six times. They have enjoyed five undefeated years during which they put together two undefeated strings of respectable duration—one of 21 victories from 1933 to 1936 and the other 17 games in 1939 to 1941.

Bierman's formal statement, handed out at an early-morning conference, said in his usual word-thrift style "I have requested that I be relieved of the football coaching duties at the end of the year."

He added that the poor showing of this year's team had nothing to do with his decision and that he had no offers to other jobs under consideration.

Speculation that started immediately after the announcement took two courses. One concerned a possible successor and the other was whether Bierman would remain at Minnesota in some other capacity.

As to a successor, persons close to the athletic department indicated there was no one particular person being considered yet because of the suddenness of Bierman's decision.

However, fans have speculated over possible successors. Chief of these was Bud Wilkinson, popular and successful coach at Oklahoma University, who played under Bierman in 1934 and 1935.

Other names mentioned were those of Win Brockmeyer, now coaching at Wausau, Wis., high school; and Clarence "Biggie" Munn, whose Michigan State team drubbed the Gophers, 27-0 Saturday. They too, are Minnesota graduates and Munn, an all-star performer during his collegiate career, was freshman coach under Bierman in 1932.

President Hannah could not be reached today to confirm the additional holiday he promised to tack on to Thanksgiving vacation. The promise rested on the conditions that MSC win two of the remaining football games (including Indiana and Minnesota) and the student body remain "grown up."

Hannah left for Washington Sunday to attend the annual Land-Grant College association meeting. He will remain there for the rest of the week. The final word on the proposed holiday must come from the president's office.

The office revealed today that the president was expected to call from Washington this week and would be asked what he has decided on the holiday.

When questioned last week Hannah said, "We still have another game to win."

AAUP Plan Politics Ban Rewrite Job

Group To Alter
Ag Board Rule

The MSC chapter of the American Association of University Professors will consider alterations tomorrow in the State Board of Agriculture policy which prevents them from campaigning for a major political office.

Last Oct. 20 the State Board of Agriculture suggested that AAUP rewrite that part of board policy which it had protested.

The dispute grew out of the July statement of Board policy which stated that "staff members who desire to take any active part in partisan political campaigns or to interfere directly in partisan issues obtain a leave of absence without pay, or resign their positions."

An AAUP protest to the Board of Agriculture said this restriction might be construed as a denial of the constitutional rights of professors, federal and state legal rights, and the stated position of the AAUP.

The Board reply to the AAUP contained a qualification of its earlier policy. It insisted that "any employee campaigning as a candidate for a major political office is expected to do his campaigning on his own time, not on time for which he is compensated by the Board."

The Board added that the paragraph which contained the disputed policy be rewritten and submitted to the Board for consideration.

Tomorrow's AAUP meeting will be closed—Victor H. Noll, president of the State chapter of the AAUP, said any AAUP revisions would not be made public until the Board had a chance to act upon them next Monday.

Directories Sales Started Friday

CARACAS, Venezuela—(AP)—The acting President of Venezuela, Lt. Col. Carlos Delgado Chalbaud, was assassinated yesterday. Delgado had ruled this country since 1948.

Kidnapper Freed On Bond
SANTA FE, N.M.—(AP)—Dr. Nancy Campbell, woman doctor, was freed on bond yesterday in the kidnaping of a Santa Fe contractor's daughter and sped to Albuquerque to enter a hospital. Her attorney and friends have said that the 43-year-old Yale-trained physician is dangerously near a physical breakdown.

Coast Guard Rescues Men
DUNKIRK, N.Y.—(AP)—Five Cleveland, O. men, the oldest 25, were hauled off a capsized yawl in Lake Erie after drifting helplessly in a heavy sea for more than two hours. The U.S. Coast Guard cutter "Tupelo" rescued the men after attempts to reach the distressed boat from shore failed.

Canadian Airliner Crashes
MARSILLE, France—(AP)—A Canadian DC-4 plane with 58 persons reported aboard crashed yesterday near Mount Othmos, an 8,500-foot peak about 30 miles south of Grenoble in southeastern France.

To Seek Recount

DETROIT — (AP) — Michigan's hectic gubernatorial scramble took another odd twist today when Democratic incumbent G. Warren Williams moved up into the biggest lead since Republican former Gov. Harry F. Kelly was considered elected five days ago.

Williams' lead was built on a recount of 887 votes.

The official canvass was completed in its own four-day run of 82 counties. But the 200-vote margin was not enough to win the office.

Thomas L. Niokes Lively Fight

WASHINGTON - The Congressional election results portend a lively fight within the Republican party. The stakes are control of the party and the 1952 Presidential nomination. The leaders of the conflicting factions within the party all obtained a new lease of authority and enhanced prestige by triumphs in the election - Senator Taft of Ohio and Governor Dewey of New York and Warren of California.

The outcome of this intra-party battle will affect both the 1952 nomination and the party's platform. The new vitality pumped into the ambitions of these professional political leaders probably will have another effect not to be overlooked. This is to diminish to a degree, depending upon developments between now and the 1952 convention, the prospects of nomination of an "outsider" which, at this stage, means General Dwight D. Eisenhower. This, despite the fact that Governor Dewey espoused the General's candidacy in the heat of the recent campaign. That endorsement was discounted by cynical critics who pointed out that it came from Governor Dewey's off-hand, in a radio interview just on the eve of publication of the now famous Joe Hanley letter. They claimed this gesture was designed to mitigate the effect of the Joe Hanley political indiscretion which subsequently caused Republicans so much trouble and required so much explaining.



Nick's Niche The Good Word

Last week a story came out of Korea telling of the three surviving members of one of the first infantry companies to fight in that war. These three were all that remained of the more than 150 men in the outfit when it landed in June. They had been through the toughest battles of the campaign and suffered all the hardships and miseries of modern war. They had seen the rest of their unit carried to the rear; some dead and others only half alive. And yet, according to the correspondent writing the story, when the men were asked what they were going to do when the fighting was over, they replied in unison, "We'll re-enlist."

A VIEWPOINT

Many people in Germany the author among them, do not believe there will be another war in Europe. Nevertheless, the participation of German units in the European defense forces may be necessary and inevitable. This participation should not be done on the basis of the Marshall proposal which would degrade the Germans to second class soldiers, just available for the most dirty and dangerous jobs. Not even if it is done in the American way according to Marshall's proposal, some other steps seem even more urgent.

100 Concerns

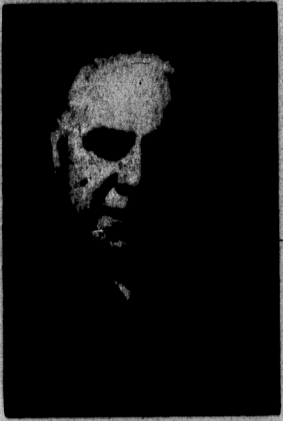

are both opposition parties. It would be more realistic to compare the Conservatives with the Democrats for both are on record as favoring many of the schemes that go hand-in-hand with a planned economy.

If Churchill was returned to power tomorrow he would leave a large part of the Labor government's nationalization work untouched. The nationalization of medicine and government ownership of the coal mines and railroads have proved very popular moves and woe-be-it to the political party that advocates their denationalization.

Issue Forecast

So what will be the issues in the next general election? Well, in the words of a popular song of the day, it will be a case of each political party saying, "I can do anything you can do better."

During the past month, the Conservative, Labor, and Liberal parties have trotted off to their annual conventions to build the platforms on which they will stake their political futures. The result got everyone excited but the English voter.

The Conservatives promised to arrest the upward movement of the cost of living, ease the housing shortage by building 300,000 new homes a year and repeal plans for nationalization of steel. The Liberals said that their program was about the same as the Conservatives but that they meant what they said while the Conservatives did not, and the Socialists said that they would stand on their record.

Press Whips Up

The British press, largely Tory in politics, started whipping up a new crisis for the Government each day, the new chambers of the House of Commons echoed with calls for a vote of confidence, and while politicians and editors pull their hair the unperturbed voter keeps locked in his breast the secret as to how he will vote when election day finally arrives. Today, the best guess is that the Conservatives would be re-

turned to power but with a majority as weak as the Labor government has now, and that would mean another general election would be only months away.

Campus Jobs Still Available For Students

Men students in need of a few extra dollars aren't finding it difficult to land a job with the college these days.

Tom Dutch, in charge of student placements, said today that there is definitely no scarcity of jobs for eager young men. At present there are 40 vacancies in the cleaning division of building and utilities.

The jobs run Monday through Friday and the hours last anywhere from 5 a.m. until 9 p.m., Dutch said. The wage is the standard campus student rate of 75 cents an hour, which may go toward a student's room and board.

The placement office said that unless students sign up for the jobs outside employment will be sought. In the event these jobs are filled with outside help they will be closed to college students. Students interested in finding employment may contact the placement office located in Morrill hall.

Summer Job Forms Available Soon

Students may obtain applications for summer resort work at the Placement Bureau beginning Dec. 1. These should be filled out and turned in by Dec. 15.

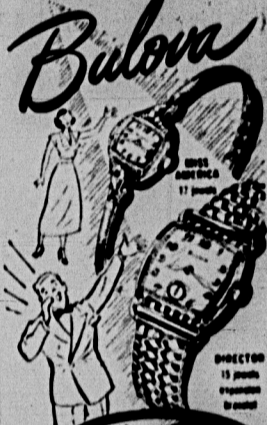

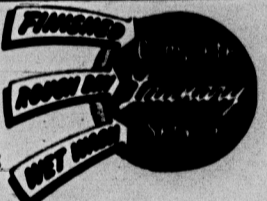

The police department, which could be compared with the FBI in this country, should be strong enough to handle unlawful acts of subversion quickly and efficiently. To avoid any abuse of the power granted to this institution, this police department should be controlled and supervised by a committee of members of the German House of Representatives ("Bundestag").

Though this institution cannot and shall not replace a German military formation, it would be an efficient step in preventing riots and uprisings, which are more likely to be provoked by the communists than a hot war.

The man in the street of Germany is frightened by the eastern danger even if he does not believe in a hot war. To get him ready for taking an active part in the western defense program he probably needs even more and than you have given him until now, in the economic, political and military field. He must see a chance.

Civil Service Lists New V.A. Job Openings

Graduate students in social work may find positions with the government with salaries ranging from \$3,825 to \$5,400, the U.S. Civil Service Commission, announced recently.

Requiring a master's degree, the positions are located in regional offices of the Veterans Administration. To qualify, a student must have studied courses in case, psychiatric, and medical work.

A student must have had experience in a social work program of a health or welfare agency to the equivalent of one year plus the degree qualification. The experience must have been within a 10-year-period prior to application, the commission announced.

Frosh Officers Plan To Stimulate Class Interest

Freshman class officers announced plans to choose one representative from each living unit to stimulate interests in class functions at a meeting of class officers held Saturday.

Each representative will appoint four assistants to help him keep class spirit alive. Representatives will meet with class officers each week. Results of these sessions will be reported to the living units.

Farmers Study Course In Cattle Insemination

Thousands of calves born each year in Michigan never see their papa... and papa never sees them. Not only that—but papa never sees mama, either.

This isn't the story of a wayward bull. It's the story of artificial insemination as practiced on livestock.

Twenty years ago, a bull, doing what came naturally, could sire but 30 or so calves a year. Today, with the help of artificial breeding, he can father 5,000 a year.

Michigan State College is doing its part in furthering this mass breeding. Farmers from all over the state come to MSC to take "Insemination - Manager Training," a week's extension course offered by the Agricultural department.

The 28th class of 15 students left State recently armed with the knowledge of how to inseminate a cow artificially.

George Parsons, an MSC Extension Dairyman, is a member of the staff conducting the course.

He said students are instructed in sanitary methods on handling livestock and in insemination methods. They are also shown how to keep an accurate set of breeding records, he added.

The Dairy department works in cooperation with the Michigan Artificial Breeders Co-operative,

which has a bull farm on the college campus.

Co-op Operates

The co-op has 145 breeding associations scattered over the state. Three times a week it supplies each of these with bull semen. The associations must have trained men to inseminate cows with this semen. That's where the alumni of the Insemination-Manager course come in, Parsons said.

"Good bulls are fairly scarce, he said, and that's why artificial breeding is so important. By diluting the semen, an average sample can be spread over 250 cows. One part of semen is used to 40 parts of diluter, with no loss in potency, he said.

Diluter Consists

The diluter consists of egg yolk and citrate.

You can tell a good bull by its grandchildren, Parsons said. If the bull's daughter produces better stock than its mother did, then that bull is a good candidate to be used in artificial insemination.

Ask Vets Leaving To Report Drop

All veterans enrolled in school under Public law 346 not intending to return winter term should notify the counselor for men's office before the end of fall term.

Earl A. Howell, supervisor of veterans affairs, announced this yesterday and stressed that it was "very important for all 346 veterans to make this notification," so an assumption can be sent to the Veterans' Administration.

A safe containing \$783.30, a quantity of whiskey and a pair of canvas gloves was taken from the Popoff grocery in Lansing early Sunday morning, according to Lansing police.

The empty safe was found on Stoll road later Sunday.

Police stated the robbery apparently took place after 4 a.m., since a check at that time found the store locked.

The crime is now being investigated by Lansing police, although they have no definite leads.
