The Good Word

Last week a story came out of Korea telling of the three surviving members of one of the first infantry companies to fight in that war. These three were all that remained of the more than 150 mes in the outfit when it landed in June. They had been through the toughest battles of the campaign and suffered all the hardships and miseries of modern war. They had seen the rest of their unit carried to the rear; some dead and others only half alive

And yet, according to the correspondent writing the story, when the men were asked what they were going to do when the fighting was over, they replied in unison.

That doesn't quite settle with me. With all due respect to the three G.I.'s; I can't imagine three physically mentally exhausted soldiers sitting at the edge of a Korean rice paddy, scratching their lice bites and dreaming of that good old recruiting station back home on Main Street

But more than that, it emphasized something that's bothered me ever since this ruckus in the Far East started. When I read reports of our forces, both the ones in Korea and the ones in Washington and Lake Success, I have the feeling sometimes that someone is trying to sell me a bill of goods.

I'm just as convinced as the next guy that we're right, but I resent very strongly the tendency by some people to picture us as starry eyed crusaders carrying the good word to people who may not want it. Reports such as the one cited seem part of the campaign—a campaign that falls flat on its face sometimes when you try and be entirely impassionate in viewing the whole thing.

If called on, I would certainly fight, but I'd leave my

white horse at home. I'd be fighting on foreign soil not to shove capitalism down someone's throat but only to give that country the right to choose the kind of system the majority wants. I don't need reading diets filled with hoopla and cliches to convince me I'm doing the right

A friend of mine recently said, "The trouble with us is that we are trying to fashion Korean Americans. Chinese Americans and Japanese Americans out of countries whose cultural and physical characteristics are not in the least like Americans.

Democracy and capitalism are fine but they should be sold with an understanding of the people on the receiving end of the sales message. It just might be that people overseas want rice more than thy want rifles to kill offtheir fellow countrymen in a civil war. The crusade for Freedom and the Voice of America are fine if the information given is more realistic than how many bathtubs per capita there are in the United States.

It's our duty in this age to provide the leadership in restoring men to some measure of individual dignity. I hope it can be done intelligently and fairly. I don't relish the thought of shooting people who believe just as sin-cerely in their cause as I do in mine.



Farmers Study Course In Cattle Insemination

By JIM PITZGERALD

Thousands of calves born each year in Michigan never see their papa ... and papa never sees them. Not only that

but papa never sees mama, either.

This isn't the story of a wayward bull. It's the story of

This isn't the story of a wayward bull. It's the story of artifical insemination as practiced on livestock.

Twenty years ago, a bull, doing what came naturally, could sire but 30 or so calves a year. Today, with the help of artificial breeding, he can father 15,000 a year.

Michigan State College is doing its part in furthering this mass breeding. Farmers from all over the state come to MSC to take "Insemination - M a nurger-Training." a week's extension course offered by the Agricultural department.

The 28th class of 15 students left State recently armed with the knowledge of how to inseminate a cow artificially.

Conducts Course.

George Parsons, an MSC Extension Dairyman, is a member of the staff conducting the course.

He said students are instructed in sanitary methods on handling livestock and in insemination methods.
