Munn Silent On Rumored Gopher Call

'Red' Dawson Also Mentioned

Clarence "Biggie" Munn and Lowell "Red" Dawson, Spartan grid mentors yesterday declined comment on possibility that one of them might be chosen as successor to Bernie Bierman. Munn, head football coach at State, and Dawson, backfield coach, have been mentioned among others as candidates for Bierman's job as Minnesota head coach.

Munn said he had nothing to say on the matter. "They could mention anybody," Munn said. "Just say we're interested in the Pittsburgh game — period."

President John Hannah has been quoted as saying that Munn would definitely be at Michigan State next year.

Dawson said only that he knew nothing about the possibility that he might replace Bierman.

Ralph H. Young, director of athletics said that he was ignorant of any move to take either coach to Minnesota. "Successful coaches are always mentioned for other coaching positions," Young said.

"It's no news to me that they would like to have Munn, but they would like to get him for the same reason that we want to keep him here."

Young said that Dawson also would make a "dandy" Minnesota coach, but again added that MSC would like to keep him.

Both Munn and Dawson expressed interest in the position. See DAWSON, Page 6

U.N. Forces Defy Cold, Hit Power Reservoirs

SEOUL—(AP)—U.S. forces, defying frigid early winter conditions, clamped a squeeze on two big power reservoirs in northeast Korea Tuesday and mounted a new drive toward the frontier.

U.S. Marines in the bitter cold seized Hagaru, at the southern tip of the giant Changjin reservoir, which provides the power for so many industries in Chinese Communist Manchuria, a field dispatch reported.

Fifteen miles to the northeast, the U.S. Seventh Division sent patrols Tuesday to the east shore of Pujon reservoir without contacting communist forces, a Tenth Corps spokesman said.

Other Seventh Division troops further north jumped off in the biting cold for an objective only 23 miles from the Manchurian border.

On the main front in the north, battle action was largely frozen to a halt by near zero temperatures and icy winds. However, South Korean Second Corps troops on the right flank advanced slowly against fairly stiff opposition from Chinese Communist troops.

Williams' 1,152 Margin Closest Win In History As Kelly Asks Recount

Williams First Democratic Leader Re-elected In 36 Years

DETROIT—(AP)—With the official canvass showing Democratic Gov. G. Mennen Williams re-elected as Michigan's chief executive, Republicans last night called for a recount.

The official canvass of the state's 83 counties showed that Williams won the hotly-contested battle with former Gov. Harry F. Kelly by a margin of 1,152 votes — narrowest margin in the state's history.

An unofficial tabulation of the county-by-county canvass gave this final figure: Williams (D), 935,152; Kelly (R), 934,000.

Kelly Statement
Kelly, in a statement, said he was in accord with the decision of Republican leaders that a recount should be made. Republican headquarters said the Republican party would foot the bill for the statewide recount, estimated to cost \$20,000.

At the same time, Williams issued a "victory" statement in Lansing, pointing out the people of Michigan have for the first time in 36 years re-elected a Democratic governor.

Pointing out that the situation that exists in some parts of Michigan today is an unusual one, Kelly said "we would be remiss to our responsibility to the people of Michigan if we did not ask for a full recount."

Select Precinct
Kelly said it was "unfathomable" for the political party and candidate requesting recount to select the precincts that they believe would be most advantageous to them, but the wartime governor called for a recount of the entire state. See CANVASS, Page 3

Coeds are urged to see counselors now, and also during winter term rushing. Pan-Hel will have complete information on each sorority which all rushers may use, Miss Class stated.

Armistice Day Forgotten

Last Saturday was Armistice Day, but it managed to slip by us unnoticed. Looking back on our oversight it seems that this bypassing of the traditional holiday is a symptom of the times.

Armistice Day commemorates . . . for those who are a little hazy . . . the day in 1918 that a general armistice was declared between the Allies and the Central Powers of World War I.

Now this country is tending to forget that dramatic day of some 32 years ago simply because we're loaded with other military dates to remember.

What veteran at Michigan State who forgot Armistice Day, will forget December 7th? Who doesn't know what V-J represents? D-day, when our troops pushed onto the beaches of Normandy, has a vivid meaning to MSC students as well as the rest of the nation.

We have all these new days to remember, but significantly, no new Armistice Day to celebrate. There are lots of military victories from World War II to recall but no single day that, at least theoretically, signals a reign of peace.

As political and military leaders have pointed out, we are still at war. There has been no peace treaty signed between the Axis nations and the victors. And, at the rate world forces are now moving, there may be no other Armistice Day before there are more military events to commemorate.

This trend of forgotten or unwritten armistices leading toward more days of battle has a vital significance at Michigan State. It's at this college that many of the thousands of officers, who will be the ones to commemorate, are now being trained.

Armistice Day has slipped by. By remembering it now and the many recent war days that have crowded it out, we can all learn one lesson.

A treaty easy to forget is an open invitation for more fighting.

Pat On The Back

The Man in Blue with a big College police badge on his coat usually doesn't get a quick smile from MSC students. It's not that they don't like him, but shhhh—he's a cop.

College police here deserve a pat on the back. Not because we think all they do is right, but because what they feel is their public duty has been well carried out.

Doing a difficult job well was the case with before and after-game traffic. Cars could easily maneuver onto the Michigan State campus and more important, were quickly cleared from the area after the football games.

This was no accident. Careful coordinated planning between the college police, East Lansing, and State Police was carried out. Latest techniques in traffic control were used. All these resulted in the commendable traffic situation.

Another step forward was the college police purchase and use of the lie detector. It's understood that the machine has and will continue to cut down crime on the campus.

Other examples of good police work include the auto registration system which, although not perfect, allows for priority ratings for cars, and thoughtful handling of student pranks that could have resulted in punishment out of proportion to the act.

The job the college police have done thus far has been a good one. When the whole student body can be made to appreciate this fact, the job will be easier.

The Pendulum

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WASHINGTON — Periodically and with almost the regularity of the swing of a pendulum there has been, since 1932, an expansion and contraction of that vague and indefinite conglomerate of cross purposes which is the Democratic party.

In Presidential elections it has expanded victoriously from its traditional Southern base outward North and West, with the single exception in 1948 when four states in the Southern base were yanked out of place. In off-year elections such as the recent one it has contracted to its more orthodox "outlines" and its strength in Congress has been reduced, most sharply in 1946 when it lost control of Congress.

The customary recession every two years, when the people seem to make a survey in the middle of an administration and apply certain correctives, is of itself a sort of check-and-balance, a fourth check-and-balance in our system. That has been true, indeed, as a general rule whatever is in power.

While the emphasis will be on that big, overwhelming consideration—the organization of ourselves and our friends against the encroachments of international Communism—this does not mean that President Truman will not, at frequent intervals, call up for reminder his own Fair Deal domestic program to keep that issue alive and constantly before the public.

For he believes in it and, furthermore, it is politically his strongest appeal to rank and file, including labor. He must rely heavily on labor in 1952 since the farmers did not come through this year as hoped for, and as they did two years ago.

In off-year elections, such as that the other day, the continuing nucleus of the Democratic party, which is the South, enhances its power in Congress. Since its representatives have an over-all conservative complexion, with exceptions, of course, there has been a recurring check on the New Deal-Fair Deal program.

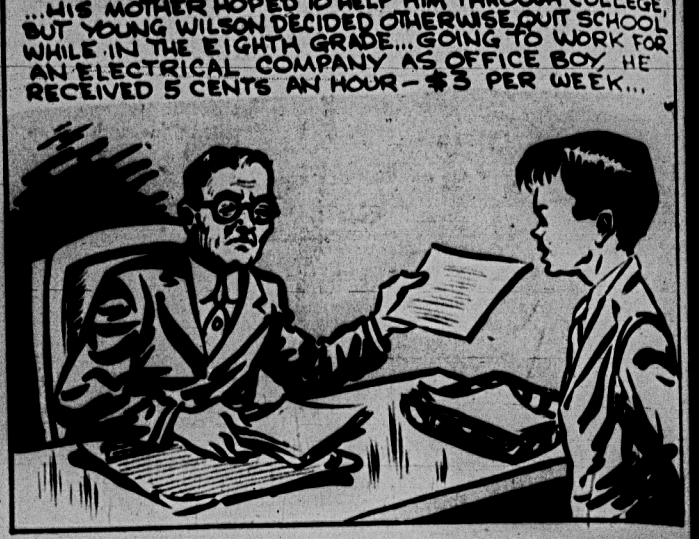

(Continued From Page 2) eign policy. He attacked the whole concept of defending Europe against possible Russian aggression.

Taft has always been doubtful about Vandenberg was active in about aid to Europe, but went along fairly well as long as Semi-partisan policy. But Taft was a born isolationist who learned only late in life of the inevitable involvement of the U.S. in world affairs.

He goes along hesitantly and with a wary eye for the slightest sign that anyone will go beyond the most obvious American interests. With Vandenberg playing a small role now because of ill health, and Taft's overwhelming ascendancy in the party due to his smashing victory over a tremendous opposition coalition in Ohio, his caution will likely set the Republican' pace in both houses of Congress.

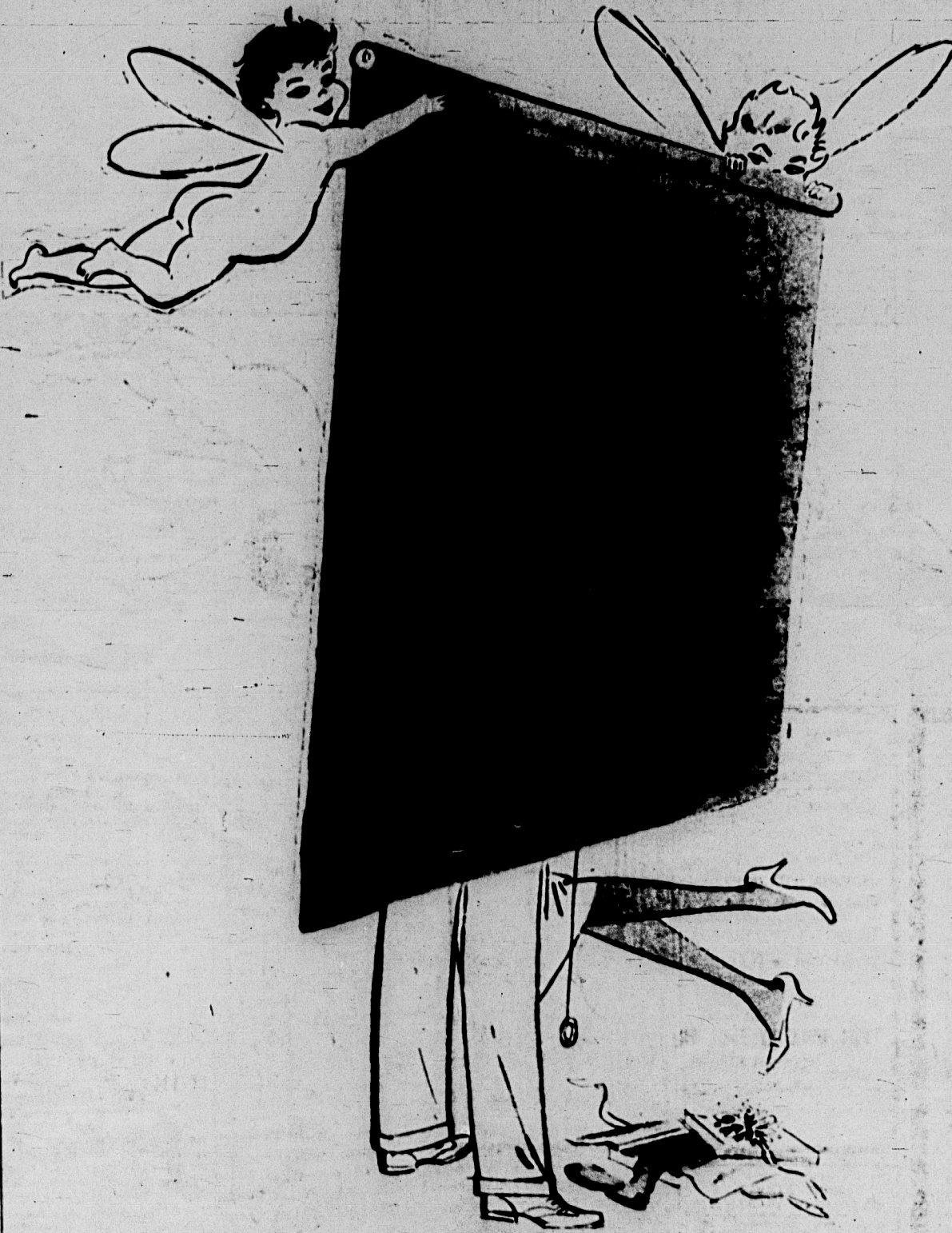
Marshall plan aid will be threatened, not only in the last years of the current operation, but especially in planning for some form of extension on which the administration already had decided, and upon which western Europe has based many of its plans for rearmament.

Taft also indicates that the rearmament program itself is in danger.

The Republican hue and cry over Communists in the administration also can be expected to continue, along with the sniping at Secretary Acheson on this and other scores. Administration miscalculations on Korea in the first place, and on Chinese Communist intervention in the second place will be taken as grounds for questioning its judgment on other situations as they arise.

All of this tends to create a feeling of unease among America's allies, weakening their will to resist—which in some cases is not too strong anyway—and encouraging those elements which are thinking wishfully about the possibilities of neutrality in the cold-hot wars.

Yet Taft's record, and that of his party in general over the past several years, suggests strongly that in any given emergency the Republicans will go along, since administration policies have been and are being forged to meet outside forces over which it has no control. Post-election exuberance can be expected to settle down into sober acceptance of the responsibilities of increased power. The quicker that is done, the quicker uncertainties are removed, the better it will be for American relations with the anti-Communist allies.



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
