Apathy Toward MSC Student Government Reaches Peak

Apathy toward student government became self-evident Sunday, when only 46 out of an invited 150 attended the student leaders convocation. The convocation was sponsored by the student government planning commission to enlist advice and support for the constitution now being drafted. Chairman Disappointed Gaylord Sheets, chairman of the planning commission, said he was disappointed in the turnout, but that it was about what the planning commission expected. "Those who did attend were of the opinion that something had been accomplished," Sheets said. At the meeting, apathy was presented by the commission as the first block to efficient student government. Members of the commission also told student leaders that undefined student government authority made planning difficult. Other problems facing the commission were representation, communication between governing groups, and how to establish a student judicial system, members said. After discussing the problem, the student leaders gave suggestions on how student government could be improved. The most general opinion seemed to be that student government be given enough authority to command the respect of the students. Favor Judicial System A practical suggestion for group representation on a student government was that group leaders be seated on the proposed student senate as ex-officio members. The convocation also learned toward a judicial system with "full judicial powers."

Truck Driver Held For Questioning

An automobile accident east of Howell at 9 p.m. Sunday proved fatal to one MSC coed and left another in critical condition as the car they were riding in struck the rear end of a truck parked without lights on highway 16. Both coeds graduated from Central high school in Detroit last June and started at MSC last summer.

Heads Map Defensive Strategy

Advisers Present At First Meeting

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman and Prime Minister Attlee of Great Britain today started an extraordinary strategy conference hurriedly summoned in an effort to map joint British-American moves to check Communism's sudden new menace. The British leader, grim and grumbling, sat down with the President and top American foreign policy and military advisers in the White House cabinet room after 3 p.m. CST. Talk Ended The talk, the first of a series, ended after an hour and 45 minutes. Attlee and his party left by a rear door. Reporters could not question them. It was understood a statement would be issued at the White House. President Truman was flanked by Defense Secretary Marshall and Secretary of State Acheson as he began talking to Attlee and his advisers. Attlee was accompanied by a seven-man delegation, including British Ambassador Sir Guy Franks, Field Marshal Sir William Slim, chief of the imperial general staff and Air Marshal Arthur Tedder. Meeting Concealed The meeting was concealed only four days ago in the face of Communist China's undeclared war on the United Nations force in Korea and the grave emergency it posed. Informed officials in London said before Attlee took off for Washington yesterday that he had agreed during an extraordinary conference with French Premier Plevin to: 1. Press for an early settlement of the Korean war based on an agreement with Communist China. 2. Stress that Britain and France plan a Big Four conference with Russia attending to see if they can reach some sort of East-West agreement. Despite Setbacks Despite the setbacks suffered in the past few days by United Nations forces in Korea, American officials indicated that the United States has no intention of supporting Chinese Communist membership in the United Nations. Nor, they said, does the American government contemplate diplomatic recognition of the Chinese Communist regime.

Draft Scare Stabilizes ROTC Group

There has been an increase in advanced ROTC applications due to the draft scare. Colonel Charles E. Deisinger, military science adjutant, said yesterday. The biggest increase in enrollment over the past several years came last spring before the draft laws were added. The MSC ROTC quota was increased last spring by the 1st Army district headquarters. Six hundred and forty advanced cadets were enrolled, exceeding the quota. This term the number is approximately the same and will be next term also. A student must have passed standing and a two-point all-college average in order to be accepted for advanced ROTC. He must also pass a physical examination.

Red Forces Threaten Citadel

Suspect Capture Without Fighting

TOKYO — (AP) — The Allies quit Pyongyang today as spearheads of a mighty 1,000,000-man Chinese Red army threatened to flank that one-time Korean Communist stronghold. It was quite possible the surging Red forces would recapture the former northern capital without firing a shot, reported AP correspondent Tom Lambert. He left Pyongyang at 1 p.m. Tuesday (10:45 a.m. EST) and flew to Seoul, the southern capital. Troops Withdraw The last American and South Korean troops north of the city of 300,000 withdrew shortly before Monday midnight. Their way was lighted by several large fires as material of military value went up in flames. Demolition squads touched off thunderous explosions as the troops moved north. The main section of Pyongyang north of the Taedong river was left intact, however, just as it was found Oct. 19-20 when the Communist United Nations troops took the first Communist satellite capital. The British 29th brigade covering the withdrawal of the Americans and South Koreans, then itself began moving south through Pyongyang in a center across the ice-choked Taedong. Blow-Up Bridge U.S. engineers blew up a newly rebuilt railroad bridge leading out of the city as the retreating Eighth Army traded space for time to avoid entrapment. There was little fighting on the northwest front. Overwhelmingly outnumbered, Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker, commander of the U.S. Eighth army, was intent on keeping his force as intact as possible. Correspondent Leaf Erickson reported from Eighth army headquarters that the pullback might go as deep south as Seoul, 125 air miles to the southeast. There a perimeter could be thrown around the republic of Korea capital and the escape port of Incheon. Must Decide AP Correspondent Don Whitehead, with the retreating army, said a decision must be made soon whether to stand and fight or quit Korea altogether. Whitehead reported that most military men in the field believe the Chinese were determined to destroy the Eighth army. Significantly, Gen. J. Lawton Collins, army chief of staff, flew to the war zone for conferences with top commanders after a meeting with General MacArthur in Tokyo. A top-level decision must be in the making.

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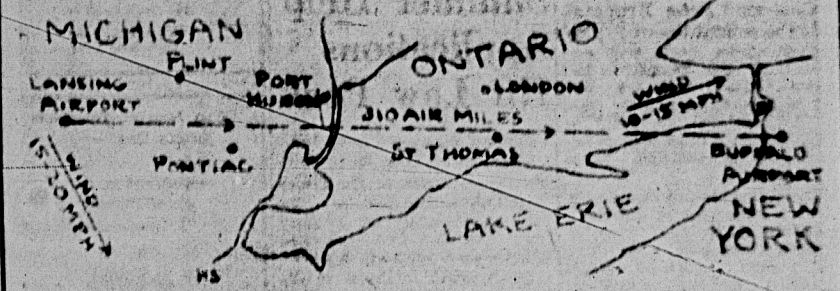

Spartan Spirit Group Plans Winter Project

A three-point winter term project was decided upon yesterday by the Student Council Spartan Spirit committee. The plan calls for publicizing hockey, boxing, and wrestling, half-time entertainment at basketball games, and coordination of school spirit groups.

Chairman Peter Krupczak said the committee will "play up" all winter sports, with emphasis on the combatives and hockey. "These teams are growing in importance, and we want to call attention to them," he said. Posters will be used to advertise winter athletics, Krupczak said.

The committee will also seek to provide some kind of entertainment for the half-way break in basketball contests at home. This will probably consist of musical selections by the varsity or marching band, the chairman said.

The final aim of the group is to co-ordinate the MSC cheerleaders, the bands, and all entertainers for athletic events and pep rallies. This combined group would facilitate Spartan Spirit arrangements.

Krupczak said the project will get underway next term.

New X-Ray Aids Study Of Atomic Structures

A new x-ray diffraction machine, used to study the atomic structure of metal and crystalline substances, is the latest addition to the Physics, Chemistry and Metallurgy department.

The machine takes four pictures at once. After studying the pictures the students assemble a structure representing the atom using colored spheres and rods.

Dr. Austin J. Smith, Metallurgy department head, says these structures make it easier for the student to see how the different molecules are composed. They then can figure out how to change the properties somewhat by various processes.

Dr. Lawrence L. Quill, head of Chemistry department, stated the machine is used in all divisions of the department. However, it is used chiefly in studying inorganic materials.

Parking Lot Work Halted By Winter

Work on a \$75,000 parking lot in East Lansing has almost halted for the winter, according to John Patriarcho, city manager.

The lot, planned to hold 65 to 70 cars, is being constructed on Albert street just west of M.A.C. avenue. The city planned to black-top it soon, but bad weather halted these plans.

It will be covered with gravel and put in use for the winter, Patriarcho said.

Spartan Publishes Anniversary Copy

A flamboyant horse and wagon driven by Santa Claus promoted the sales of the 14th anniversary edition of the Spartan magazine today. This is the Spartan's biggest year with a 2,000 increase in sales over last year. The magazine has grown from a 14-page, 400 circulation journal to 48 pages with 5,000 circulation.

Summer Help Applications Hit Low Peak

Summer resort and camp work applications are "coming in slow," Thomas A. Dutch of the Placement Bureau, said yesterday. To date approximately 150 applications have been filed contrasted with the usual 500 made in a year.

Dutch urged students to file forms before the Dec. 15 deadline. Jobs are still available for waitresses, bell boys, desk clerks and camp counselors.

Each year the bureau contacts approximately 600 resort centers in the country. It then refers the names of two or three prospective employers to students applying.

The bureau also conducts a follow-up at the end of the season to air employer opinions on student help.

Chief employer criticism centered around the fact that students disobeyed resort rules, broke contracts early for a vacation and showed little interest in the welfare of the business.

Council Discusses Cost Of Cafe Inspection Plan

The cost of the Student council's plan to inspect and approve East Lansing restaurants is now under discussion, according to chairman Milton Elishewitz.

Elishewitz and Arthur Alm, Ingham county health department sanitarian, made an inspection tour of two East Lansing eating establishments recently.

Explains System

Co-operating with the council, Alm explained the state sanitation inspection system, Elishewitz said. All restaurants must have a state license to operate. They are regularly inspected to determine any infringement of laws and practices of operation. If approved, they are issued a health department shingle.

This does not mean unapproved places are unsanitary, Elishewitz hastened to add. These places are given time in which to remedy the faults. If they fail to comply, the inspector may order them to close up.

Look For Sign

"The Student council health committee encourages all students to look for this approval sign," Elishewitz stated. "If it is not displayed, we want people to inquire the reason of the proprietor. By exerting this social pressure, the customers can raise the standards of local eating establishments up to and beyond the health department's standards of excellence."
