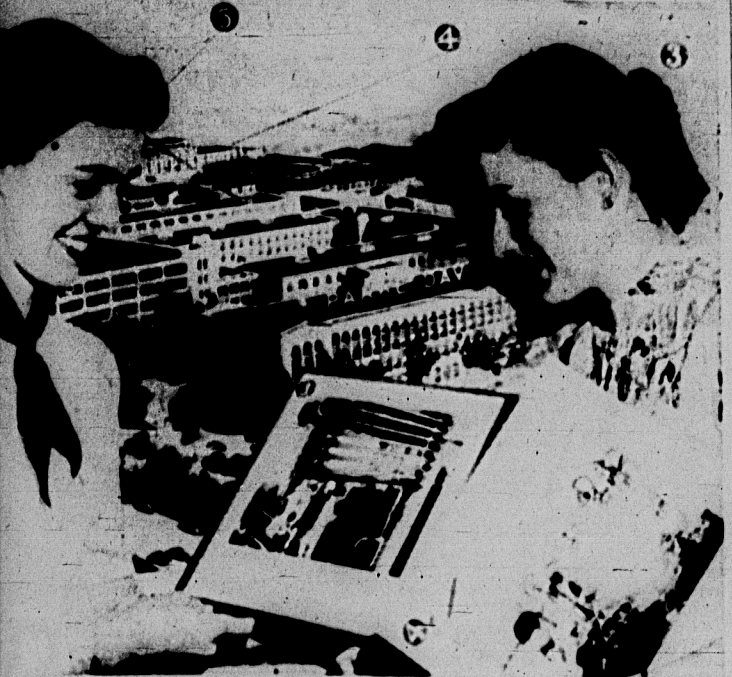

Bad Weather Halts Spartan Trackmen

Hit hard by the lack of good practice weather and eligibility troubles, Michigan State's track squad had their outdoor season opener in the Austin, Texas relays Friday and Saturday canceled.

Coach Karl Schludeman withdrew the Spartans from the relays yesterday. He stated that he didn't think his squad had the practice they needed outdoors to make any kind of a showing.

The nucleus of the team competed in the Purdue relays last Saturday, giving most of the team only a week to make the hard transition from indoor to outdoor competition.

Eligibility woes also hit Schludeman. Bill Williams, fast-improving sophomore sprinter who looked impressive in indoor running, was declared ineligible to run in the outdoor season.

Additional strength in the short and middle distance events which the Green and White show a glaring weakness, failed to materialize when Bob Carey, top State contender in these events last year, did not go out for the squad this year.

Thomas Depended On — Most of the scoring punch, as in the past indoor season, is expected to be contributed by versatile Jesse Thomas, hurdler, sprinter, and broad jumper.

Unless new talent is uncovered in the team trials now being conducted, Schludeman stated that the Spartans would fare about the same as the indoor squad.

Schludeman will get his first look at the 1951 team Saturday weather permitting, when the tracksters go through their paces in practice runs for the state track prep coaches meeting. The trials are scheduled for 2:30.

U S Troops, Tanks Cross Parallel on West Front

TOKYO — (AP) — U. S. troops and tanks rumbled north of the 38th parallel yesterday along a 10-mile sector in western Korea and met little resistance from vanguards of nearly one-half million communist soldiers.

The crossing was made in force. It was the first time this year that U.S. troops had entered North Korea in more than patrol strength.

Across the mountainous peninsula where two Republic of Korea divisions already were, north of the 38th in force, General MacArthur made a surprise inspection within 500 yards of the front. It was his fifteenth flying visit to the war zone.

There MacArthur gave what amounted to a reply to the communist high command which had flatly rejected his March 23 offer to negotiate a truce in the field.

Our strategy remains unchanged in Korea, he told top air, sea and ground commanders who accompanied him. It is based on maneuver and not positional warfare.

He made clear that the vastly outnumbered United Nations army has no intention of yielding the initiative if necessary.

By nightfall MacArthur was back at his Tokyo headquarters where he appraised fighting conditions as still favorable, his trip had taken him by jeep from Kangnung on the east coast to beyond Yangyang, seven road miles north of the 38th parallel.

Earlier, MacArthur's headquarters had estimated the Chinese and North Korean communist forces had a potential strength of 63 divisions on the battlefield—the largest number yet estimated.

The second Lansing man arrested was Elmer D. Phillips, 18, of 2706 E. Kalamazoo street. Phillips pleaded guilty to charges of reckless driving and was fined \$50 by Justice Henry Schram yesterday.






