Aptitude Testing Starts on May 26

With the addition of aptitude tests MSC students now have three methods of securing draft deferments.

1. Taking the college aptitude exam for which MSC has named a testing center by selective service authorities.

2. By having sufficiently high scholastic standing in the respective classes.

3. By enrolling in advanced ROTC.

The aptitude tests will be given at MSC May 26, June 16 and June 30, 1951.

Eligibility Limited

Eligibility to take the test will be limited to students who have begun and who plan to continue their college studies and are of draft age.

Application and admission card forms for this test have not yet been received at state headquarters but should be available within ten days.

The nation's top collegiate boxing talent comes to Michigan State for the three-day NCAA boxing tournament which begins at 2 this afternoon and winds up Saturday night.

Jenison fieldhouse has been prepared to seat approximately 11,000 persons and a special ring has been installed for the meet.

There will be 63 of the best college mittmen on hand to participate in the 33 bouts. There are to be four sessions this afternoon, tonight, Friday and Saturday night.

All the evening matches began at 7:30.

Spartans Enter Most

Host Michigan State has the most men entered. The Spartans will have six men trying for honors. There are 29 schools represented in all.

Three national champions will attempt to repeat again this year but only one of the three will be defending his title.

Everett Gentry of Washington State will put his 135-pound championship on the block but both Len Walker of Idaho and Ed Thomas of Gonzaga have moved up to a higher weight class.

Gained Weight

Walker, twice NCAA champ at 145 pounds, will fight in the 152-pound bracket and Thomas goes up to 165 pounds.

The 145-pound class appears to be the most crowded. All entries in this division have exceptional good records.

Jed Black of Michigan State received the OK signal from the NCAA boxing committee Monday and with him in that weight are such good men as Joe Ramsey (W, L, D) of Minnesota, Emmett Furney (W, L, D) of South Carolina, Bill Sappis (W, L, D) of California who faces Black Thursday afternoon, Norm Walker (W, L, D) of Idaho and his brother Len.

State's Entries

Entered for Michigan State are Black, 145; Pearce Lane, 135; Leon Hamilton, 165; Ed Waggoner, 130; Hank Arnes, 125; and Chuck Spieser at 175 pounds.

providing he has the time to arrange them. Because of the weather, the carillon is not played every day. It has been playing the carillon between 45 and 60 minutes each evening.

By opening Beaumont Tower to the public, Wescott has brought the carillon to the attention of the campus. Visiting hours are from 8 to 8:15 a.m. and 5 to 5:15 p.m. during the week. On Sunday, spectators may see the carillon in operation from 2 until 2:30 p.m.

Michigan State is one of the 15 colleges in the world to have a carillon. Mr. Wescott is one of the 40 carillon players in the country.

Besides being a carillonist, Wescott teaches piano in the music department and plays the organ for the Central Methodist church in Lansing.

During the warm weather, Wescott has approximately 10 visitors during the day. During the winter months, attendance falls off, but more than 30 years.

Basketball Backboard Takes Off

Phenomenon Still Remains Unsolved

The case of the exploding basketball backboard still lies unsolved. The phenomenon which occurred while workmen were carrying the board to storage over spring vacation, has been partly attributed to a sheet of glass which lies in the interior of the board.

"The explosion sounded like a 12 gauge shotgun blast," Foreman Ken Richards said. "Fortunately, nobody was hurt. A few of the boys got minor scratches as bits of glass flew out all over the place."

Coach Pete Newell had warned us that these glass boards sometimes exploded, Ervin Kapp, equipment room manager, said. "It really took off."

Because of some substance in the glass, it has been observed that any unnecessary strain upon it can cause it to explode. The glass company is trying to find out just what substance is causing the mishaps.

According to Richards, most of the glass from this company seems to be perfectly normal. There has been only one other similar explosion, which occurred at the auditorium when a glass showcase blew up.

An experiment was conducted with the glass in which it was heated up to such a degree that it was hot enough to fry an egg upon it. As soon as the egg was dropped upon it, the glass shattered into tiny bits.

On the basis of this experiment, the glass company is looking for the substance which disintegrates when heated.

Graduate Makes Survey Of Mason Dining Room

Don Johnston, Saginaw graduate student, is in the process of making a time and motion study of the operation of the Mason Hall dining room.

During the past term, Don has spent many hours in collecting the data as an "efficiency expert."

His efforts consist of a series of graphs and charts that indicate the number of times that dishes and silverware are handled in the process of transporting, inspection and storage. It was discovered that a single saucer passes through nearly 25 operations during the course of a meal. He asserts that if these operations could be reduced to a minimum, the result would be a notable decrease in labor and expense.

"All handling is subject to some criticism," Don maintains. "Approximately 20 percent of the busby's time could be saved if he'd use both hands in clearing tables, instead of balancing the tray in one hand and clearing with the other." He reached this conclusion after a "micromotion study of the time implement involved in hand movements."

One of the pet gripes of his fellow students is the slow moving line into the dining-room. Don attempted to undermine the cause for this delay by posting himself by the entrance door as a kind of "traffic counter." He discovered that breakfast served as an incentive to very few early risers.

At 7 a.m., when the line opens, hardly more than 15 people are in line and the line spent at breakfast is never more than 20 minutes. As 8 a.m. rolls around, everyone docks to the dining-room and the students without 8 o'clocks remain at the tables nearly 30 minutes after going back for "that second piece of toast."

'Heart Wasn't In It' Prof Finds Flagstad Lacking

For this auditor, Tuesday night's concert in the college auditorium was a most strange experience. Whatever lies behind the unfortunate circumstances of the last dozen years of Kirsten Flagstad's personal life, and whether or not we agree with the way she lived those years, cannot concern us here. However, for those who knew her splendid artistry of the years before the war, comparisons with that standard must come to mind on hearing her now.

Although her very presence commands attention and although last night's performance knew moments of exquisite beauty, something was obviously lacking. Her voice is there in all its former glory—(she surely left us no doubt of that!) Also, her excellent musicianship and deep devotion to musical values was convincing as ever. What then could be lacking?

Perhaps many will disagree, but we must say that her heart

just wasn't in it. She seemed to be lacking in enthusiasm and surely that would be understandable in view of the past. Indeed, certain songs (Ungeduld, Blaabaerit, and Du meines Herzens Kroenelein, to mention a few specifically) showed much of the fire that still burns brightly


