# 42nd Anniversary

Wanted-one birthday cake!

One birthday cake with 42 candles, Today ends the forty-second year of State News publi-cation. This newspaper hasn't always been called The State News. In 1909 it was founded as The Holcad. That was before MAC was changed-to MSC. A daily student

newspaper was still unknown. The Holcad started out as a bi-weekly, but jumped to a weekly the next year. In 1925 it became The Michigan State News with three issues every week.

In the fall of 1942, The State News began to publish five days a week and claimed the title of "student daily." At the same time it was elected to membership of the Associated Press.

The paper was a five-column tabloid size then. Its pre-sent eight column page appeared in the fall of 1946. Today The State News takes its place among the ten top

college newspapers in the nation. Growing pains have been an occupational hazard.

But many one-time staff members of The State News have profited by these pains after graduation

There are outstanding newsmen in publications all over the United States who are MSC graduates. On campus, extras have figured in State News tradition. Roberts **UN Backs**

M rate of 1998 a rout-page extra was published the high MSC entered the Big Ten. A tabloid extra on legislature appropriations was issued the next spring. These special issues took effort and careful planning. But they brought home the aim of this newspaper: to get news to the students as quickly and neurntely as possible. This will continue to be the policy of The State News.

For the future, The State News has embarked on a long term effort to maintain and increase its prestige among the newspapers of Michigan. It wants to be known not only
