## Tiger Home Runs Blast Browns

DETROIT (AP)—The Detroit Tigers, who had hit only one home run previously this season, opened up with a home run barrage by Joe Ginsberg, Pat Mullin and Vic Wertz to trip the St.

Louis Browns 7 to 4 here yesterday.

Only 2,125 fans, one of the smallest crowds in Briggs stadium history, saw Wertz rife Fannin's first pitch to him in the ninth inning into the right field stands to break a 4-4 deadlock. Steve Souchock and Jerry Priddy scored ahead of him.

The victory, Detroit's second in six games, was credited to rookie pitcher Ray Herbert, who gave up only two singles after relieving starter Dizzy Trout at the start of the sixth inning.

Rookie catcher Ginsberg's home run, his first in the major leagues, opened the Detroit scoring in the third.

Mullin, pinch-hitting for Trout in the fifth, smashed the ball into the right field stands to score

Johnny Lipon and Ginsberg and tie the score 4 to 4.

Souchock opened the ninth inning rally with a single to left field. Priddy laid down a sacrifice bunt and both runners were safe when Souchock beat the throw to second.

Then Wertz, who had only 3 hits in 21 times at bat this season, broke his slump with a soaring homer to the lower right field stands.

But the real battling hero was Ginsberg, who played only briefly for the Tigers last season.

### Students Vie for Honors in Writing

Students vying for prizes offered in the MSC creative writing contests will have their entries judged April 30. The contest is divided into three fields: fiction, poetry and essay, according to Miss Clara Laidlaw, of the English department.

Winner of the fiction contest will receive \$40, poetry \$20, and winners of the two essay contests will receive \$25 respectively.

Any undergraduate may enter a manuscript of any length in the fiction contest. Poetry entries should consist of one long poem or several shorter ones.

**May Enter Contests**

Students may enter both contests, but should present only one manuscript in each field. Anyone who has previously won first prize in either contest is ineligible to compete again, but may enter the other, Miss Laidlaw said.

The essay contest is divided into the Lawton essay contest for undergraduates.

Contestants may submit one essay of not more than 2,500 words. Former winners of the contest will be ineligible to compete in the essay contest.

Manuscripts should be submitted by April 30 to 213 Morrill hall. They should be typewritten in triplicate, titled, but without the author's name. Name of the author and title of his work should be submitted on a separate card.

**Fiction Judges**

Judges for fiction will be novelist Virginia Chase Perkins, author of "American Home" and "Discovery," Iola Fuller, author of "Loon Feather" and "The Shining Trail," and Eileen Davis, short story writer.

Poetess Bernice Slate, Evelyn Scholl, professor of English at MSC and George Peck, professor of English at Wayne university will pick winners of the poetry contest.

Essay contest judges will be John F. A. Taylor, head of the department of literature and fine arts; Eldon Robbins, essayist and short story writer and Leslie Hanavalt, chairman of the Wayne university English department.

**Dance Co-Sponsored**

The dance is co-sponsored by the classes and Union board. The freshmen and sophomores will get 25 percent of the profits after while Union board collects 50 percent, Bowne said.

If the dance is not a success, the classes must foot the entire debt.

"The council was unwise in scheduling the dance under those conditions. We are trying to make money on the event," Bowne declared.

**Vernon Contracts**

Vernon, who contracted with Union board to hold the dance, said that it would have been impossible to have had it at all unless in collaboration with Union board. There was no available place other than the parlors used for the weekly record dances.

Bowne contended that sophomore council members also hired a band against the freshmen's wishes, and over-ruled them in doing so.

**Council Doesn't Know**

"The people on the council don't know what's going on," he said, and declared that "the sophomores were doing too much of the work without consulting the whole group."

Vernon denied this, pointing out that as chairman he is a sophomore while the other two officers are freshmen. There are an equal number of both classes on the council, he said.

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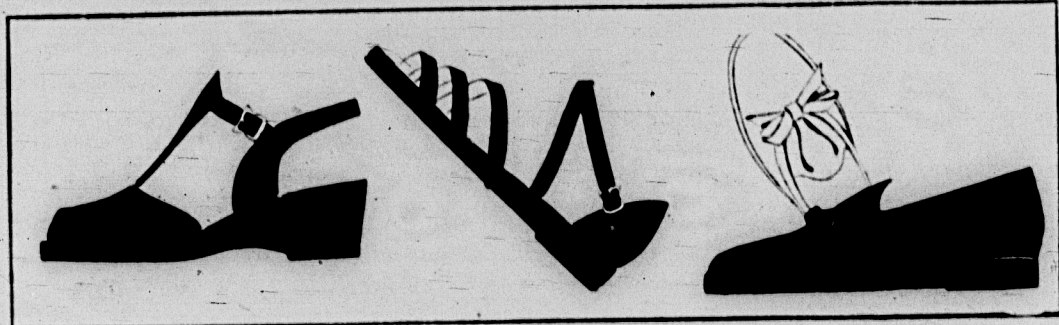
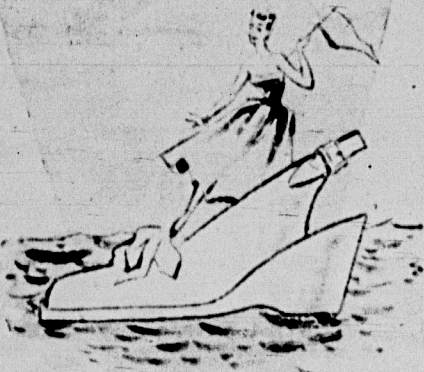
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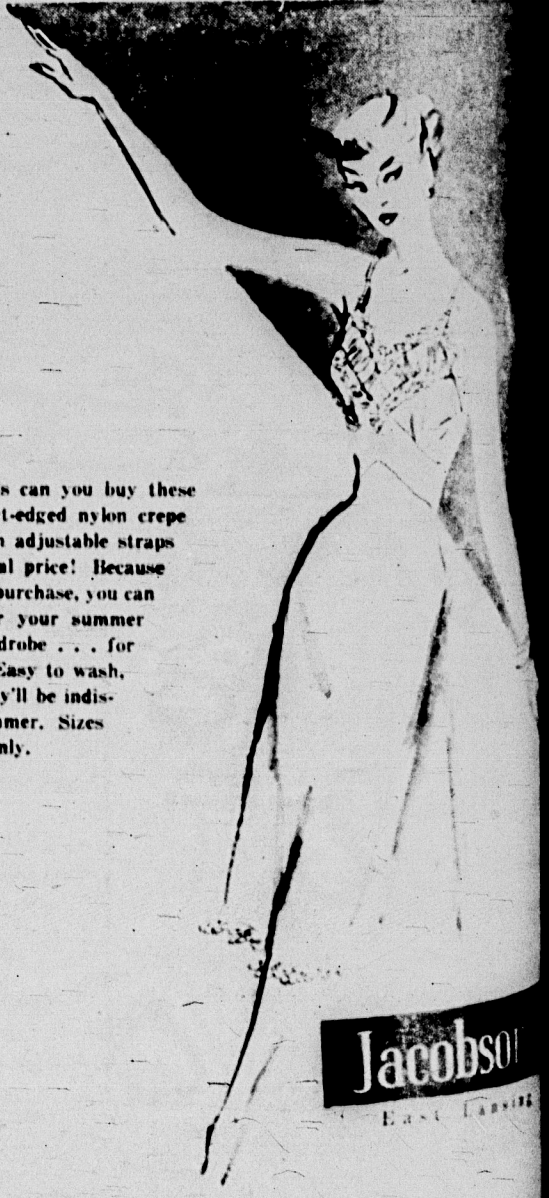
