

Dale Rhoades, Dave Miller, Norm Poplawski, Richard Dorais, Joe Barzotti, June Anderson and Beverly Balsey will serve on the Student council next year. This is not a prediction; it is a fact. These seven stu-

dents are unopposed in the coming elections for Student council representatives. They will represent five council districts—one-fourth of the Student council.

Married housing and trailer village will have no representation at all on next year's council.

This is not a new situation. It happens every year. It is usually followed by an election where 30 per cent of the student body casts ballots.

Perhaps it wouldn't make any difference in a "normal" year. But this spring there will be something added to elections: the new student government constitution.

This constitution demands attention from every student. It won't work any other way. Candidates should read it carefully and make it one stout plank in their platforms.

No one can consider the constitution intelligently without Amendment I, which proposes a student tax to support student government. Although it won't be voted on next week, this tax is controversial, it will affect the constitution

There is no incentive to stand for anything if the electorate isn't interested. Student apathy still appears to be the greatest single force in seating council members. result it has become fashionable to have no beliefs whatso-. ever for campaign purposes.

There are several pertinent questions that all Student council candidates should answer before the primaries: What is your attitude on the new student government constitution

Why?

De you favor Amendment 1?

Why ? in Bevan from the British Do you think the new standing rules for Student council cabinet removes perhaps the procedure are desirable greatest enemy of America

What limits should be placed on Student council jurisdiction

If a candidate can answer these questions intelligently, he is on the road to responsible student government. If he can't there might just as well be no election, no Student council, and no new constitution.

They are only the instruments for good student government. They can never take the place of student partici-Taiation.

A whopping student vote in the primary and final elections is the number one step toward the answer to MSC's governmental ills. Interest and investigation are needed before yoting can be done intelligently


The handbook is revised during spring term each year. to allow coeds with gripes to present their views.

"We realize that an article about the short comings of an organization unfounded as it may be, seems good copy and has more readership than an article which brings to view some of the accomplishments of the group.

That's a quote from the leading paragraph of their letter. Gentlemen of the Improvement committee, let me assure ou The State News does not depend on the shortcomings of the fraternity system to find sufficient matter to publish each morning. Ask the fraternity members who belong to

the staff . Another excerpt from the letter is highly significant.

"Fraternities are not a service organization. Do not expect more from them than any other living unit. The projects that they have deemed fit to shoulder are actually beyond the purposes of their organization, and for this they should be commended not condemned.

Just preceding this the IFC group listed some of these projects. They included aiding the Red Cross, Christmas parties for needy children, and participation in campus activities.

Gentlemen of the IFC Improvement committee, why don't you read your own constitution?

Let me quote parts of Article II for you.

The object of this organization (IFC) shall be: (e) To be a recognized force in the consideration of stu-

dent life and college problems. (g) to promote all-college activities.

Has the IFC refuted these objectives?

Or does the Improvement committee need improvement?

Reading the constitution further the committee may find trouble glossing over Article XI on Initiation. Section F reads :

'No requirements shall be made of pledges out of the fraternity house or off the grounds, or be of such a character as to attract notoriety

What about the Delta Upsilon pledges who paraded about campus last week with white mice on their heads ?
