# Budget Cut Recommended by House Committee

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A 10 percent cut in the 1952 fiscal year budget of 27 federal agencies was recommended yesterday by the house appropriations committee.

The committee asked the house to give these agencies—whose budgets are lumped in to a single bill—\$6 billion for the 12 months starting July 1. This is \$665 million less than President Truman requested.

More than \$5 billion of the bill's total is earmarked for the atomic energy commission and the veterans administration which along with most of the others, took a cut in budget requests.

The house itself may cut deeper when it votes on the bill next week.

The largest allotment of money in the bill is for the veterans' administration, which also took the biggest cut. The committee recommended that the VA be given \$3.9 billion instead of the \$4.5 billion it wanted. The committee said the \$483 million cut wouldn't hurt the VA because benefits for veterans under the GI bill are tapering off.

Likewise, the committee said a \$69,982,250 cut wouldn't hurt the atomic energy commission, which still would have \$1,140,017,750. The reduction was aimed at the AEC's huge construction program.

Other agencies financed in the bill include the Tennessee valley authority, the office of the President, the civil service commission, Federal communications commission, federal trade commission, federal power commission, general accounting office, general services administration, interstate commerce commission, national advisory committee for aeronautics, securities and exchange commission, and the housing and home finance agency.

# Churchill Talk Canceled for Policy Reason

LONDON—(AP)—Winston Churchill yesterday cancelled a planned speech in the United States—presumably to avoid getting embroiled in the American political dispute over General MacArthur.

The conservative leader explained that "events have happened" which make it difficult for him to fulfill an engagement to speak on world affairs at the bicentennial of the University of Pennsylvania library May 8.

Churchill did not specify what the events were. Obviously however, there could only be two: The dispute in the United States centering around President Truman's removal of MacArthur from the far eastern commands and the developing split in Britain's labor party, which increases the possibility of an early general election here.

As the political experts of the British press association pointed out, it would be difficult for Churchill to make a speech on world affairs in the United States "at the present juncture without getting involved in issues that are causing much controversy in the states."

Members of Churchill's staff declined to amplify his brief statement. They explained he and Harold Stassen, president of the University of Pennsylvania, had agreed in an exchange of letters upon what they would say about the postponement. Stassen had invited Churchill to make the speech.

The 76-year-old former prime minister counted himself out of the MacArthur controversy by saying no one outside the United States "has the slightest right to interfere between" President Truman and his officers.

# Will Jail Suspects if War Comes, Says FBI Head

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Congress has been notified that at least 14,000 persons will be rounded up in the United States and placed in political detention camps in the event of full-scale war.

The figures were furnished by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and James M. McInerney, assistant attorney general, at a recent hearing of the house appropriations committee. Their testimony was made public yesterday.

Hoover and McInerney said the justice department has a list on 14,000 individuals "already designated as being a threat to internal security in the event of a national emergency." Federal agents are ready to pick them up within a few hours if necessary.

But McInerney said the internal security act requires that political prisoners be kept separate from criminal convicts.

So the appropriations committee is considering a proposal to spend \$775,000 to prepare four abandoned military camps as places of detention for suspected subversives.
