**A Decade of Sports**

"FROM DEMOCRACY TO GREATNESS" — that's the story of Michigan State athletic fortunes since John Hannah became president in 1941.

In the pre-Hannah years the Spartans had good teams and some great ones . . . they had standout individuals and players of all-American caliber. But it wasn't until this last decade under the guidance of John Hannah that Michigan State began turning out the consistently winning teams that are now synonymous with "Spartan" throughout the country.

Let's glance back at some of the highlights in Michigan State sports in the past 10 years.

**1941: BASKETBALL.** . . . the sport . . . all-Americans Chet Aubuchon and Joe Gerard . . . and a won-lost record of 15-6. Three individual champions and a second to Oklahoma A & M in the NCAA wrestling tournament . . . twin brothers "Cut" and "Bo" Jennings, both repeaters as NCAA champs and Bill Maxwell.

**1942: FOOTBALL.** . . . Dick Kieppe leads the way and the Spartans upset the then-great Great Lakes team, 14-0. **Boxing.** . . . "Chuck" Davey came to MSC and with him came national recognition in boxing . . . Davey and Bill Zurakowski took individual championships and the Spartans were second in the team race. **Wrestling.** . . . the NCAA's were canceled so "Cut" Jennings and Maxwell went to the NAAU to annex individual championships.

**1943: THE WAR FINALLY** took most of MSC's civilian enrollment so President Hannah announced that intercollegiate sports would be discontinued for the duration . . . but John Kolas fielded a baseball team in the spring of '44 . . . their record: 3 wins, 5 losses.

**1944: FOOTBALL.** . . . rumors were flying . . . Rose Bowl consideration . . . Jack Breslin and mates racked up six wins in seven games. **Basketball.** . . . a poor start . . . then Sam Fortino, Robin Roberts and Bill Rapschak began to click . . . eight victories in the last nine games for a season record of 10 wins in 17 tries . . . highlighted by a 66-50 win over Kentucky, who was the nation's top "five" at the time.

**1945: BASKETBALL.** . . . Fortino sets new Spartan scoring record of 241 points . . . State wins 12, loses nine. **Baseball.** . . . hitting of Jack Breslin . . . pitching of Joe Skrocki and Robin Roberts . . . 21 victories, five defeats. University of Chicago decides to drop from Big Ten.

**1946: FOOTBALL.** . . . Charley Bachman resigns as head coach . . . Clarence "Biggie" Mann named as replacement . . . Spartan fans cry for Bachman . . . rejoice for Biggie.

**Boxing.** . . . Chuck Davey returns from armed forces . . . garners second individual NCAA crown. State has two other individual NCAA titleholders . . . Gale Mikles in wrestling . . . George Hoeserhyde in swimming. **Baseball.** . . . Robin Roberts' hurling great . . . team scores 17 wins in 24 contests.

**1947: FOOTBALL.** . . . George "Dynamite" Guertle, Lynn Chandross . . . seven victories, two losses . . . one loss a 7-6 heartbreaker to Kentucky. **Indoor track.** . . . undefeated dual meet season . . . beat Western conference champs, Ohio State.

**Wrestling.** . . . undefeated dual meet season . . . second in NCAA . . . Dick Dickenson individual NCAA champion . . . **Boxing.** . . . another second in the NCAA's for the Spartans. Davey wins an individual crown for third time . . . Ernie Charbonneau also blasts way to individual title. **Tennis.** . . . 12 wins in 13 matches . . . Indications of things to come?

**1948: THE NEW MACKLIN FIELD** is ready and the University of Michigan is also . . . Spartans lose dedication game 13-7 . . . finish season with six wins, two losses and two ties. Dec. 12 . . . Can you forget the date? . . . State makes Big Ten . . . a dream is realized. **Indoor and outdoor track.** . . . the names of Jack Dagnetti, Warren Druegtler, Tom Irmen, Bill Mack . . . IC4A indoor and outdoor titles. **Boxing.** . . . Davey wins fourth individual NCAA crown . . . first time in history . . . Spartan team again second. **Cross country.** . . . it couldn't happen — no team could take the "big three" . . . State did . . . the IC4A, the NCAA, the Senior AAU . . . and in the space of 15 days.

**1949: FOOTBALL.** . . . Lose to Michigan, 7-3 . . . getting closer . . . season ends with six wins in nine games . . . Chandross All-American. **Hockey.** . . . a newcomer to the Spartan sports scene . . . a tough first-year schedule . . . no victories in 14 games. **Swimming.** . . . "I wouldn't trade my team for any in the nation" — Coach Charles McCaffree . . . Beat Michigan first time in 27 years . . . Clark Scholes, NCAA and AAU champ in the 100-yard freestyle.

**1950: FOOTBALL.** . . . Greatest team in State history? . . . Michigan is beaten . . . Notre Dame is beaten . . . ev'ryone — but Maryland . . . Grandolious named all-American. **Tennis.** . . . Big Ten champions . . . Len Brose leads way to undefeated season . . . Coaches Frank Beeman and Tom Martin smile happily.

**Baseball Coaches' Choices Have .375 Batting Average**

**Richards First in Decathlon Championship**

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — The Rev. Bob Richards of the Illinois Athletic club captured the 1951 National AAU decathlon championship yesterday, amassing 7,834 points for the fourth highest total in world history.

The 25-year-old pole vaulting preacher from La Verne, Calif., takes the crown which went undefended by the three-time champion, Bob Mathias, Richards firmly established himself in his first year of Decathlon competition as a top candidate for the 1952 Olympic games.

Veteran Decathlon performer Floyd Simmons of the Los Angeles A.C. finished second with 7,561 points. Richards' score was shy of the world record total of 8,042 set by Mathias last year.

Richards started off yesterday with a 15.3 seconds clocking and 879 points in the 110 meter high hurdles. He collected 751 points in the discus with a throw of 135 feet 7 1/2 inches, and 750 in the javelin with a toss of 185 feet 2 inches.

On the final event, the 1500-meter run, he struggled gamely around in 4:56.1 for 437 points. All his efforts yesterday were better than he scored in the sectional meet in May when he scored 7,544 points.

The 1951 all-American baseball team, boasting the strongest hitting and best pitching of any of the annual collegiate all-star aggregations, was announced last week by the American Association of College Baseball Coaches.

The selections were released through John H. Kobs, Michigan State College baseball coach and secretary-treasurer of the association.

The first team, exclusive of the pitchers, carries a collective batting average of .375. Three first stringers have marks over the magic .400 figure for the season, top being Utah's Jim Cleverly, second baseman, who hit a stratospheric .494. Lou Manis, Ohio State's Stewart Hein with .394 but the fleet Buckeye outfielder was a sensation defensively and hit well in the clutch. He batted .644 for his team in the recent College World Series at Omaha.

The pitching is terrific. First stringers Don Barnett of Fresno State, and Pat Hubert of Texas A & M, lost but one game between them during the regular season. Hubert dropped the one game while winning 12 and accumulating a great 1.99 earned run average. Barnett doctored one of the greatest collegiate hurlers in years, won 11 in a row and made a 2.26 earned run average. He fanned 140 men in 96 innings.

The first string is rounded out by California's Sylvester McNinch at first base; Dick Great of Duke, at shortstop; Dick Rahlovic of Illinois, at third base; Earl Averill, Jr., of Oregon State, in the outfield, and Joe Burk of Oklahoma A and M, behind the plate.

Michigan State's sensational sophomore outfielder, Darrell Lindley, landed a berth on the third team.

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# Deane Thomas Quits Grid

## Ace Tackle Drops Sport Under Doctor's Advice

A recurring illness has forced Michigan State defensive lineman Deane Thomas to give up his promising football career.

Thomas, first string tackle in the 1950 Spartan defensive unit, has been hospitalized since March in Olin Memorial hospital, suffering from chronic colitis. He was released last week and doctors have advised him to give up his desires for athletic participation.

The loss of the 230-pound junior will leave a gaping hole in the MSC defensive line this fall. Thomas was counted on heavily in the plans of Coach "Biggie" Munn. Finding a replacement will be a major task for the Spartan coaching staff when practice resumes in the fall.

"The loss of Thomas will leave a real hole in our defensive line," was the description of the news given by line coach "Duffy" Daugherty. "We felt that Deane was great during the latter stages of last season and looked to him for some great play this fall," he added.

Thomas came to Michigan State after a brilliant high school career at Leo in Chicago, where he received all-city and all-state honors.

Terry Sawchuck, goalie with the Detroit Red Wings in the National Hockey League, once was offered a tryout with the St. Louis Cardinals. Terry plays a lot of baseball in the off season.

# Chicago, Tigers Split, Sox Retain AL Lead

## Detroit Gets 6-3 Win in Opener; White Sox Take Nightcap, 5-1

DETROIT (AP)—A dead game bunch of Chicago White Sox battled their way back into first place in the American league race yesterday as they beat the Detroit Tigers, 5-1, in the nightcap of a doubleheader after losing the opener, 6-3.

The White Sox split, coupled with a double loss by the New York Yankees to the Washington Senators, put Chicago back in first place by a half game over the New Yorks. A crowd of 38,024—at least 10,000 of which was pulling for Manager Paul Richards' surprising Chicagoans—saw the Tigers sparkle at bat and ahead as they won the opener behind Hal Newhouse's steady pitching.

Paul (Dizzy) Trout was the victim of the second game White Sox opening, which saw four runs stream across the plate in the opening inning while Trout was able to get only one man out. Al Zarilla's seventh homer was the big wallop which scored two runs and sent Trout to the showers.

Veteran righthander Joe Dobson guarded that lead jealously. Dobson, who chalked up his sixth win as against two losses had a four-hit shutout through six innings.

He weakened in the seventh, giving up three successive singles for Detroit's lone run before Mar-

# MSC's Brose Loses

The Michigan State College tennis ace and this year's Big Ten individual champion, Len Brose

had his troubles yesterday in the Michigan men's tennis championships held at the Saginaw Tennis club.

Brose was upset in the semi-finals of the singles play by Andy Paton, former University of Michigan star, and Big Ten champ. Brose dropped the first and last sets as he lost 6-1, 6-8, 6-3.

The 25-year-old Paton, fourth-seeded in the tournament, went on to display near perfection overhead and volley shots to dethrone last year's champion, Bob Dixon, University of Michigan assistant professor.

The scores in the final match were 6-2, 6-4. Dixon disposed of Dick Lincoln, a U. of M. graduate student, 6-1, 6-3, in the other semi-final match.

Paton teamed with Dixon to win the doubles title, defeating Lincoln and George Livesay, of Ann Arbor, easily in the final, 6-3, 6-2. Dixon and Paton defeated Clem Hopp, of Detroit, and Rex Norris, of Lansing in the semi-final, 7-5, 6-4.

Lincoln and Livesay upset second-seeded Brose and John Sharaton, a Spartan doubles team that captured the Western conference doubles title. Brose and Sharaton seemed off their game as they lost, 6-3, 6-2.

# Homemakers Use Leadership as Contention Theme

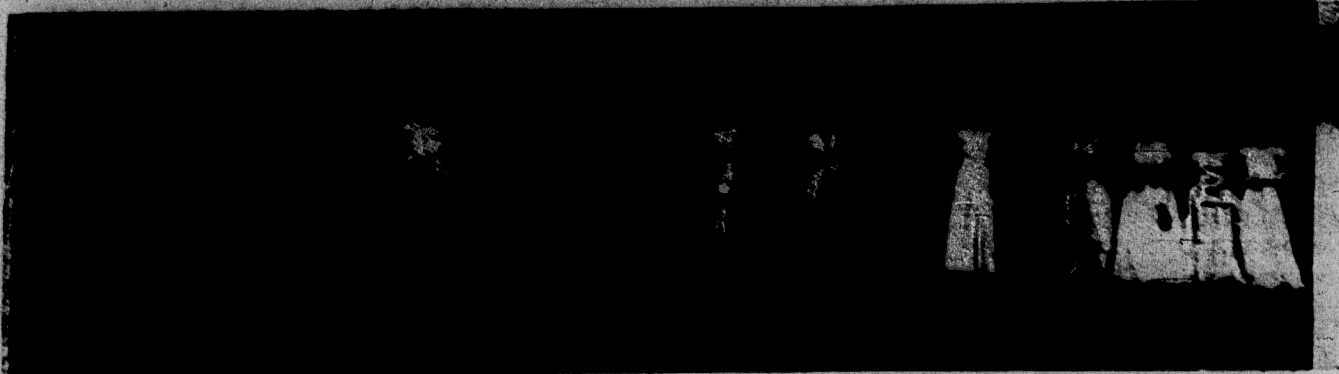

Abroad, Americans everywhere celebrated the holiday.

In London, British bobbies quashed a communist attempt to displace memorial services for 25,000 American soldiers, sailors and airmen who died in Britain during World War II.

British Reds pushed through the crowds, shouting "send back the Yanks," and tossed out leaflets asserting that England has become a U.S. atom bomber base. Police jailed three.

American troops staged their biggest parades in Europe since the end of World War II, celebrating the truce, they are there to defend.

The display reflected the growing strength of U.S. forces in Europe.
