## Men Transfers From Dorms Limited to Two

Students for each organization may be released from dormitory housing contracts for fraternity or cooperative housing. Emory G. Foster, manager of the dormitories and food service department announced today.

The men may move from their dormitories into fraternity housing before 5 p.m. of Sept. 28. Any fraternity or cooperative housing must be made no later than the last day of classes. The housing organization must have a release from the dean of men, Foster said.

Each organization must furnish a list of all members living in men's residence halls to the housing office by Sept. 28. From this list organizations may take two releases for winter term and two for spring term.

## King Explains Parties Cause Social Pro

Beta fraternity was placed on social probation Tuesday after unauthorized parties held in their house during the week of September 24-25. Dean of Students, J. H. Thompson, said Wednesday.

Previously announced parties had been placed on probation without reason. No one was involved in the parties, but said the house was responsible for all parties, even though no one was involved or none were members.

## CAMERA Student TVers Learn Operations in MSC Courses

Something new in the field of education was added at MSC this term when 56 students, including five graduate students, enrolled in the college's five television courses.

The courses are designed to teach production, lighting, directing, scenery design, as well as other phases of television operation, according to Dr. Wilson Paul, head of the Department of Speech, Dramatics and Radio-Television Education.

MSC is one of the few colleges in the nation with a TV setup which enables students to carry on the regular program of the station, Dr. Paul said. Closed circuit telecasts will be made from the studio to other buildings on the campus.

## Clinics Assist in Decreasing MSC Dropouts

Dropouts through Wednesday afternoon number only one-half the figure at this time last year, according to Lyle Thorburn, counselor for men.

He said 14 new students, mostly freshmen, have left school since they registered. After a week of school last fall, about 30 students had dropped out. A total of 281 left MSC last fall term.

Thorburn said clinics sponsored during the summer by the MSC counseling service contacted about one-third of entering freshmen, and were probably responsible for the low drop rate.

## Pep Rally Slated for Friday Night

A spirit-packed pep rally is scheduled Friday night at the band shell to back the Spartans for the big tangle with the Wolverines.

Under the supervision of the Spartan Spirit Committee and Chairman, Steve Poplawski, the rally will spotlight such dignitaries as Lambert "Chop" Martin, voted the Ugliest Man on Campus in 1950.

Other speakers and entertainers have not yet been announced, according to Stan Brown, publicity chairman of the Student Government.

## New Uniform Committee Appointed

Costs Covered  
by Appropriation

Gaylord Sheets, Student Congress president, and Max Guenther, will head a committee working with a faculty group to choose style of new band uniforms.

Complete appropriations have been made by the administration and approved by the Board of Agriculture covering the cost of uniforms. The exact amount of the appropriations was not disclosed.

Lloyd C. Emmens, dean of science and arts, will head the faculty committee.

Suggestions from students are welcome, Sheets said, and can be made to any student government representative or member of the student congress.

The final choice, which will appear in the State News, will be approved by the State Board of Agriculture, the administration and a music faculty committee.

Although there is no certainty as to when the uniforms will be in use, committee representatives said that they may be ready for the last home football game, November 24.

Commenting on the work of the committee, Sheets said:

## MAY DROP ARMS LIMIT

## Big Three 'Welcome' Italy

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Big Three countries yesterday declared their willingness to wipe out peace treaty restrictions on rearming of Italy.

The joint statement, and an accompanying pledge from President Truman to back Italy for an equal place in support of United Nations principles, amounted to a formal welcome to Italy as a full partner in the West's defense lineup.

At the same time, Secretary of State Acheson, indirectly warned Moscow against misjudging the reason for this and similar moves to build up "situations of strength" in the Western world.

"Our purpose is peace with freedom and justice," he said. The move to change the 1947 Italian peace pact came as a grand climax to Italian Prime Minister Alcide De Gasperi's three-day conference with President Truman, Acheson and other top American officials.

High American officials told a reporter the United States favors knocking out a total of 29 articles in the Italian treaty. Scrapping these would permit Italy to build up its skeleton army, navy and air force far beyond the present 300,000 maximum.

## Reds Throw New Jet into Air Battle

Allies Report No  
Losses in Fight

UN COMMAND HEADQUARTERS, KOREA—(AP)—Communists Wednesday threw a new high-wing super MIG into the greatest jet battle in history in a day that saw 256 jets in action.

American fighter pilots returned with the news that the Reds had introduced the swift new fighter in a blistering challenge of Allied air supremacy.

The Communists lost possibly two jets and suffered damage to 12 others, the U.S. Fifth Air Force said. It did not report any Allied losses.

Two major battles were fought Wednesday. One, the largest single jet engagement, involved 197 planes.

Reports in Tokyo indicated the new Red plane might be the Russian-made MIG-19.

High sources in Tokyo said the new daring and eagerness of Red pilots seemed to presage a challenge all over the Korean peninsula. They said the Reds now may have the air strength they had lacked to conduct all-out war.

The number of planes involved dwarfed the 117 which fought history's longest jet battle Tuesday. In that scrap, 37 American Sabre jets whipped 80 MIGs, shooting down five and damaging five. The Allied Air Force said one Sabre jet was damaged.

Wednesday's biggest battle was the first one, when 77 American and Australian jets duelled with 120 MIGs over "MIG alley," south of the Manchurian border. The Fifth Air Force said one Red jet probably was destroyed and four were damaged. It said no Allied planes were lost.

Allied jets were bombing rail lines near Sinanju, 40 miles north of Pyongyang, North Korean capital, when a horde of MIGs swept out of the north.

## Two New Draft Tests Slated For Students

WASHINGTON (AP)—Selective Service scheduled two new qualification tests yesterday for college students who want to become eligible for deferment from the draft.

The first test will be given Thursday, Dec. 13, primarily for students whose academic year and current draft deferment will end next January.

The other will be given Thursday, April 24.

The tests will be administered at more than 1,000 centers throughout the states and territories by the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, N.J. The service will mail the scores directly to the local draft boards.

## Faculty Members Attend Conference In New York City

Three MSC faculty members and a member of the State Board of Agriculture are now in New York City attending a conference on women in the defense decade, sponsored by the American Council on Education.

Included among the speakers expected at the conference are Mrs. Anna Rosenberg, assistant secretary of defense, and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, wife of the late President Roosevelt and now delegate to the United Nations.

## Three Named to All-College Judicial Group

## Congress Announces Appropriation Boost

Another new note in student government was struck yesterday as the Student Congress announced appointments for its first All-College Judiciary.

Gaylord Sheets made three tentative appointments at the first meeting of the 1951-52 year last night, which were unanimously approved by the Congress. The Judiciary appointments are: Carl Mottek, Cleveland, Ohio, senior, one term; John Ringle, Grand Rapids senior, two terms; and Burton Spurrier, Detroit senior, three terms.

Also announced was a sorely needed financial boost. In the forthcoming school year the Congress will receive \$2,800 in appropriations. This amount is \$1,600 more than the group operated on last year.

To add still more gloss to the relatively short meeting a resolution was introduced and referred to a committee which would postpone freshmen class elections until the eighth and ninth weeks of the fall term.

"The reason for this resolution, as to allow freshmen more time to acquaint themselves with their candidates," said Dave Miller, speaker of the Congress.

The immediate duties of the newly appointed justices will be the drafting of rules of procedure. Also included in the All-College Judiciary are: Mrs. Maurice Gonon, counselor for women; Lyle Thorburn, counselor for men; and two other students, one from the All-College Men's Judiciary and one from the All-College Women's Judiciary. Appointments for the latter two will probably be announced later this week.

Once the All-College Judiciary goes into action it will be their duty to try cases and arrive at decisions which shall constitute the official All-College Student Government recommendations to the dean of students.

Appointments were also made to the Campus Chest and to seats made vacant in Congress. The Student Congress appointments are: Hal Helgeson, Phillips Hall, Bud Lewis, Snyder Hall; Layonne Parker and Bob Forman, Lansing; Nancy Burhans, Gilchrist; Donald Davis, East Lansing; Walt Dienhart, married housing; Henry Hult, fraternities; and Sue Henderson, Williams.

The Campus Chest appointments are: Robert Steric, Lansing junior; Dale Rhoades, Benton Harbor senior; Paul Boggs, New York sophomore; Elin Lu-kach, New York senior; and Nick Pagan, faculty advisor.

Each member stood and introduced him or herself to his fellows at the close of the first meeting of the first session.

## New Gamma Phi House Going Up

Construction work started yesterday on a new \$125,000 Gamma Phi Beta sorority house. Contractors are the Francis J. Corr corporation of Lansing, according to sorority officials.

The building, which will be located at 340 N. Harrison road, East Lansing, will be ready for occupancy next September.

## A Step at a Time

With the approval of the Counselor for Women and the Dean of Students, AWS lengthened Sunday closing hours to 11 p.m. and Saturday closing hours to 1 a.m. for this term.

On the surface, this isn't much of a change. It means only that coeds have one hour more per week to spend outside their houses or dormitories.

This new ruling does represent a step forward toward greater freedom of choice for MSC women.

This newspaper has always advocated less restriction in the rules which govern women students on this campus. We are glad to see that AWS and the administration are open to discussion and legislation in this area.

However, closing hours are only a part of the rules which govern MSC women. There is the late minute system, the shower hours, typing hours, laundry hours, and a thousand rules which every coed must observe or else.

These rules are not entirely the fault of those who govern MSC coeds. Many of the women themselves would rather have these regulations than a greater freedom of decision. It is the easier way.

And, because it is easier to make rules than repeal them, a dogma of restriction has been built up which robs coeds of their freedom and self-reliance.

The world today needs men and women who can think clearly and decide for themselves on a mature course of action. It is the job of any educational institution to guide its charges toward maturity.

Too many and too strict regulations serve only to keep the immature in check and out of trouble. They do nothing toward giving them a feeling of capability and confidence in their own decisions.

AWS and the college administration can do much in encouraging coeds to conduct themselves with wisdom and foresight. But, the problem would not be solved if AWS relaxed all rules immediately.

Instead it must help MSC coeds to see that petty regulations offer no real security. Nor must it be put off by the vocal and insecure few when a majority of coeds decide that there is no longer a need for some of the rules which they had previously favored.

Maturity must come a step at a time. Such a step has just been taken, but the goal is still ahead.

## Sports Editor Urges Return To Amateurs

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — (AP) — "Athletics and student cheating mimic the rest of our society at its worst," says a sports editor.

The sports authority declares elimination of admission charge for athletic contests is "the only sure means for a return to complete amateurism" in intercollegiate sports.

These are among views expressed in a symposium on "College Sports: A Moral Issue" in the October issue of *Motive*, national student magazine published here by the Methodist Church Board of Education.

Sports Editor Fred Russell of the Nashville Banner suggested — short of the drastic step of not charging admission — "Two definite moves for de-emphasis would be the elimination of spring football practice and the prohibition of post-season games."

Jerrold L. Scheeter, editor of the University of Wisconsin's *Daily Cardinal*, added this comment: "Football is no longer a sport. It is an occupation, a varsity player, told me last fall. As to cheating, with the competitive cut-throat criteria we set on marks and making good in a material sense, these pressures produce their logical conclusions."

Two other student editors joined in the symposium. Allen Hoffman, editor of the Pacific University Index, said "Proletarianism of athletics is, without a doubt, one of the major troubles in the present college setup."

However, Joan Turner, editor of the MacMurray College *Greetings* (Jacksonville, Ill.) doesn't believe "the college conscience is gone."

Most students, she said, come from high schools where "cheating is prevalent and smart." That honor does become a part of their lives at college amazed her, she said.

"It leads me to doubt that honor died with southern gallantry or with the West Point class of '18, or that it now rests solely with Congressmen, as the cries which arose out of Washington during the recent West Point scandals would indicate," she said.

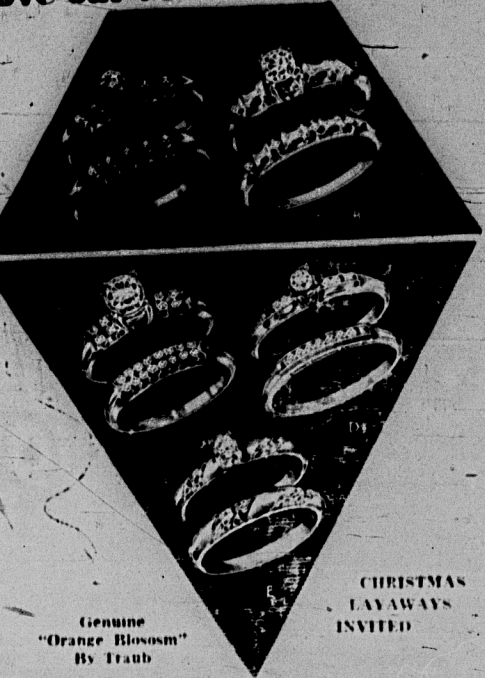
## Coop Members Build Addition
