

Funeral Set Today for W. K. Kellogg, ISC Benefactor

Philanthropist Dies in Hospital After Long Circulatory Illness

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. today for W. K. Kellogg, world renowned philanthropist who took the corn and built it into a multi-million dollar cereal industry at Battle Creek.

Mr. Kellogg died at 3 p.m. Saturday in Leila Hospital, Battle Creek, at the age of 91 after a prolonged circulatory ailment. Private services will be held at his home at Gull Lake. Burial will be at 10 a.m. Thursday in Oak Hill Cemetery, Battle Creek, after cremation.

Mossadegh Arrives for UN Hearing

Iran Premier Blasts 'British Pillagers'

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.—Exhausted after a long ride, Iran's frail Premier Mohammed Mossadegh arrived yesterday with fresh energy that the British want to "pillage" Iran's oil resources.

He immediately went into session on the 18th floor of the New York Hospital in preparation for the present-day efforts to settle the British-Iranian oil dispute. He flew from Tehran to present his country's case to Security Council, which is to meet Thursday.

Mossadegh issued a statement from the New York Hotel in which he called to Americans their support against the British in the fight for independence. He said there are great similarities between the present-day efforts of Iran and the efforts of their ancestors "to release themselves from the fetters of economic and political imperialism." He wound up with this:

"The sole reason for the lack of development, the deprivation and the misfortune of Iran during the last 50 years are due to the fact that a cruel and imperialistic company, under the pretext of extraction and export of oil, has been trying to give large annual profits of hundreds of millions of dollars. The natural resources of a needy and naked people have been robbed more and more on a progressive scale through all sorts of intrigue and the use of puppet governments."

The only difference that we have with the former Anglo-Iranian oil company crystallizes around this one point."

Egypt Voids Agreements With Britain

Move Calculated to Drive out Troops

CAIRO, Egypt — (AP) — Egypt announced last night she is cancelling her treaties with Britain in an effort to drive the British out of the Suez Canal area and the Sudan.

Prime Minister Mustafa Pasha, leader of the Wafdist (Nationalist) Party, introduced in a cheering Parliament the bills to carry out the cancellations less than a week after British oilmen were forced to leave Iran, another country in the unstable Middle East.

"Long live King Farouk!" shouted the deputies. "From now on King Farouk will be called 'King of Egypt and Sudan,'" Nahas Pasha declared.

Egypt "isn't going to wait any longer" for the British to withdraw from the Suez Canal zone, he shouted.

The Foreign Office in London said Britain would refuse to recognize the one-sided cancellation of treaties providing for mutual defense and for joint rule of the Sudan.

The Foreign Office showed signs of shock that Egypt had acted before receiving new proposals which Britain promised over the weekend would be forthcoming. These proposals were believed based on decisions reached at the recent Ottawa Conference of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to create a new Middle East defense command.

This plan envisaged a compromise by which a garrison from several nations might hold the Suez, the extremely important link between the Mediterranean and the Orient.

Nahas Pasha indicated Egypt is not without means to force the British out.

He said heretofore British troops would be "deprived of all privileges stemming from the 1936 treaty" pledging mutual defense for 20 years, or until 1956.

21 Gun Salute Canada Gets First Glimpse of Princess

MONTREAL — (AP) — Smiling Princess Elizabeth landed here yesterday with her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, and boarded her special train for a month-long tour among the people of Canada who one day may come under her rule.

The train moved leisurely through the Quebec countryside for a stop at an unnamed siding last night. It will push on to Quebec city today for the formal beginning of the tour.

The thousands who gathered at the airport and along the route to the 10-car royal train on a nearby siding, got a sample of the charm which Canadians will see as the party proceeds across the country.

As Elizabeth stepped down the gangplank amid a jarring 21-gun salute—she looked very much like any other well-groomed young matron. She wore light makeup, a mink jacket, a blue-green wool dress, with low cut V-neck and tight-fitting skirt, a small velvet hat of matching color, and small earrings.

Scholarships Still Available for 200 in Foreign Studies

Twenty-five students have obtained Fullbright Scholarship application blanks, according to A. T. Cordray, counselor of foreign studies.

The scholarships are for graduate study in Europe and the Middle East. They are effective beginning the academic year in autumn 1952. About 230 scholarships are available.

Applicants are urged to have all information including reports by professors, transcripts, recommendations, health reports, language proficiency certificates and personal data completed and turned in to Mr. Cordray by Oct. 15.

Applications for Fullbright Scholarships in the Pacific area will be available this spring because of a difference in academic time schedules.

Blood Typing Team Starts College Drive

The first all-college blood typing drive started yesterday at West Shaw Hall.

This week the blood typing team will visit East Shaw, Snyder, Phillips, and Mason dormitories. The schedule for the rest of the dorms and other living units has not yet been announced.

Miss Shirley Johnson, registered nurse who heads the team, reported that 251 men had their tests taken on the first day. This was one over the minimum daily quota required by the Office of Civil Defense, which is in charge of the all-state drive.

The team is able to handle 350 to 400 persons a day. This number should be more than met in a heavily populated area such as MSC, according to Miss Johnson.

The five members of the team are donating 45 hours a week to type MSC personnel. Miss Johnson, a junior, has had to drop her night classes to work on the team.

Only one casualty was reported for the first day. One man, whose name was not revealed, fainted. This happened before the test was taken. After the test was made he felt no ill effects. Nurses said the "weaker sex" are less likely to pass out than men.

The same hours will be in effect throughout the week, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., and 3 to 8 p.m. The clerks urge faculty members and off-campus students to take advantage of the slack hours 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. and 3 to 5 p.m., to have their tests taken. "This way they will miss the rush when the team moves to the Union in the last days of the drive."

Ridgway Okays Future Site for Peace Parlays

General Favors Panmunjom Area; Denies Extension of Neutral Zone

TOKYO — (AP) — Matthew B. Ridgway agreed yesterday to the Panmunjom area as a site for fresh Korean cease-fire talks, but disagreed with a Red proposal to extend the old Kaesong neutral zone to include Munsan, site of the Allied truce camp.

Instead, in a brief message to the Chinese and Korean Red commanders, the United Nations Commander suggested a small neutral area around Panmunjom, "with Kaesong, Munsan and the roads to Panmunjom from Kaesong and Munsan free from attack."

Panmunjom is a tiny roadside village six miles east of Kaesong and 12 road miles northwest of Munsan.

Ridgway did not mention a further Red proposal that both sides be responsible for policing the neutral zone.

He said he would send his liaison officers to Panmunjom Wednesday at 10 a.m. (7 p.m. Tuesday, CST), to discuss the details with the Communists.

How the Red leaders would react was problematical. Aside from the neutrality and policing questions, they have insisted in the past that the full armistice negotiating teams meet to create "appropriate machinery" for resuming the conferences.

Ridgway, in turn, has insisted that liaison officers settle all the technicalities before the main negotiators meet again.

Meanwhile, the South Koreans got into the act. Pyun Yung Tai, South Korean Foreign Minister, issued a statement saying the Red suggestion to enlarge the neutral zone would extend "the Red sanctuary within South Korea."

The South Korean Government spokesman, said such an extension "would be dangerous and we don't like it."

Nevertheless, the latest exchange of messages was the nearest the opposing sides have come to agreement since the Reds broke off the conference at Kaesong Aug. 23.

Harriers Open Sked Saturday

The Michigan State cross-country team heads into its last week of practice before meeting Purdue University here Saturday in the Spartans' home opener.

The untried Spartan squad is expecting tough competition from a Boilermaker team that already has one meet under its belt.

Although Purdue lost its opener to Iowa, 25-32, they present a formidable foe. Leading the team is Denis Johnson, outstanding Finnish runner, who set a new Purdue course record in taking the individual honors against the Hawkeyes.

On the MSC side of the picture, Coach Karl Schladehan reports that prospects appear brighter for a successful season than previously anticipated.

Last Saturday, the Spartan mentor sent his team through a trial run, and was pleased with the 58 1/2. Of the 18 runners starting, eight finished within 40 seconds of each other.

The remainder of the group finished in commendable time. Coming in together in 21:08 were Capt. John Kepford, letterman Mickey Walter, and numeral winner Lyle Garbe. Running behind this trial at 21:20 were Jerry Zerba, a returning letterman and Jim Arnold, freshman.

Leo Durocher will try to send the Giants back out in front with Larry Jansen on the mound. Jansen was the losing pitcher in Lopat's game.

NEW YORK (AP)—Rogers Hornsby yesterday signed a three-year contract as manager of the St. Louis Browns and immediately declared "there'll be some changes made."

A group of American and Canadian officials to be presented at a special ceremony include Gov. G. Mennen Williams, Detroit Mayor Albert E. Cobo and Selden B. Daume, chairman of the Detroit 250th birthday festival.

Population Up in Some Areas

NEW YORK — (AP) — A spurt in population in large areas of the world has occurred in the post-war period, according to Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. statisticians.

In the U.S. the annual excess of births over deaths has averaged better than 15 per 1,000 population. This is above the level in the post-World War I period.

France, which had almost no population gain in a century, has shown an annual increase of 7 per 1,000 since 1946.

The population of Asia is increasing fastest. In Ceylon the excess of births over deaths per 1,000 is now 28.

Bombs Could Ruin Canadian Grain

REGINA, Sask. — (AP) — The greatest civil defense threat in Saskatchewan would be an incendiary-bomb raid on grain fields, says John Probe, civil defense director.

Wheat fields extending for miles across the prairies would be vulnerable to air attack by an enemy wishing to cut Canada's food supply.

Probe said in an interview that in early fall—when grain all over Saskatchewan ripens at the same time—a single bomber with 5,000 one-kilogram magnesium bombs similar to those used on London during World War II could drop a bomb a second at 150-yard intervals for 500 miles.

Canadian Students Offered Foreign Service Exams

A competitive exam for Canadian students interested in jobs as foreign service officers, grades 1 and 2, will soon be offered, S. C. Lee, head of the Department of Foreign Studies, announced today.

The competition is held so that university graduates or undergraduates of Canadian nationality can apply for positions in the Department of External Affairs of the Canadian government.

Those interested may see Professor Lee, Room 222, Morrill Hall, for qualifications. Date of the examination will be announced later.

TV Employs Mast Erected by Smith

NEW YORK — (AP) — The dirigible mooring mast that the late Alfred E. Smith had built on top of the Empire State Building is paying off in a way probably never envisioned by "Al."

The television broadcasting mast surmounting this world's tallest building is bringing in \$500,000 a year in rents, according to George A. Hammer of the Charles F. Noyes Co., agents.

Five local TV stations pay \$70,000 a year each to use the mast, plus \$30,000 a year for space for control equipment. In addition, the observation tower brings in \$500,000 a year in admissions.

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
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
