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## Ellis-Travis Hearing Set for Oct. 20

### Jealousy Prompts Lansing Shooting

Hearing for an Oldsmobile employe, who was charged with assault with intent to murder after police said he shot down another man in the company of his wife, was set for Saturday.

J. W. Travis, victim of the shooting and whose wife is employed at Shaw Hall, was reported Sunday as in "fairly good condition" by St. Lawrence Hospital officials. He is suffering from two bullet wounds, one in the left side of his back which penetrated his body and another in his right chest.

The shooting took place shortly before 3:54 p.m. Thursday in a parking lot at the north gate of the Fisher Body factory in Lansing. Walter C. Ellis, who police said fired the shot in a jealous rage when he saw his wife with Travis, was released Saturday on a \$3,500 bond.

Ellis, of 216 E. Sheridan Rd., told detectives that Travis broke into his home and "took" his wife last year. "I came over here to tell him to leave her alone," Ellis said.

Police said that Ellis left the Oldsmobile plant at 2:30 p.m. Thursday, an hour and a half early. He said that he went home, got a .38-caliber revolver and drove to the Fisher Body factory.

The 40-year-old factory worker carried his lunch pail and walked with a group of Fisher employes to the parking lot, he told police. Standing back of an automobile out of sight, Ellis saw his wife leave the factory where she was with Travis, also a Fisher Body worker.

Mrs. Ellis and Travis, 46, of 218 Jerome St., got into Mrs. Ellis' car with Travis. Ellis walked up to Travis' side of the car, the jealous husband told police.

Travis said that when he tried to get out Ellis slammed the car door on his ankle. Ellis went around to the other side of the automobile and tried to force his wife back into the car.

When Travis went around to the back of the car, he told police that Ellis pulled out a gun and shot him in the chest. "When I turned around he shot me again," Travis said.

"I know that if he got away he would empty the gun into me," Travis added. "I grabbed him and we fell to the ground where I got the gun from him and threw it away."

While the two were fighting Mrs. Ellis tried to separate them. She was kicked by her husband and fell to the ground. Suffering from shock and fright, she was taken to St. Lawrence Hospital.

Several Fisher employes standing near the light, held Ellis to the ground but finally released him. The frightened husband started to hurry away but was overtaken near the Osborn Rd. entrance to the lot by a plant protection officer, Robert J. Morgan, 47, of Grand.

## Red Rocket Barrage Hits U.S. Troops

### Allies Score Gains Along Central Front

U.S. Eighth Army Headquarters in Korea—(AP)—The Reds hurled their first full-scale rocket attack of the Korean War in the Yonchon area 35 miles north of Seoul yesterday.

They fired 300 rounds of Russian-made rockets within one hour against a Western Korea sector held by the U.S. First Cavalry Division.

Meanwhile, along the 28-mile central front, the U.S. 24th and the Korean Second and Ninth Divisions forged ahead against only moderate Chinese Red resistance.

Up to three miles were gained by the Allies in the third stage of their summer and autumn offensive. The section involved embraces the old Communist iron triangle build-up area.

Eleven Red counter-attacks shook the Allied lines in West-central Korea and at latest word from the Eighth Army, some of these attacks were in progress.

Fighting has tapered off in the Eastern hills. The Eighth Army says the U.S. Second Division attacked and secured high ground on the Northern part of Heartbreak Ridge.

## Egypt's Press Dubious of Bid

EGYPT—(AP)—The Egyptian Press predicted yesterday that the Egyptian Government will turn down a bid offered by the Big Three and Turkey to join a Middle East defense project centered in the Suez.

Egypt wants British troops withdrawn from the Suez Canal area and to have the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan joined with Egypt.

British sentry posts have been tightened and military leaves cancelled in the Canal Zone.

The threat of flare-ups between Egypt and Britain has spread from the Suez to the Sudan where Sir Robert Howe, Governor-General of Sudan, has announced he will resist any attempt to change the present Anglo-Egyptian governmental set-up.

## Blood Typing Program Moves to Union, Women's Dorms

MSC's blood typing team under the direction of Miss Shirley Johnson, Lansing nurse and MSC junior, will continue to test students in the dormitories during the next two weeks.

After finishing the men's dorms at Mason Hall today, the team will move to North Williams tomorrow. The hours on these days will be 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 3 to 8 p.m.

From there it will go to London, Mayo and Gilchrist Halls in that order. The hours at the last three dorms will be from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

A second team has been made available by the Michigan Office of Civil Defense. This team will be at the Union Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday on the second floor. The hours will be 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 6 p.m.

Faculty and Administration members and off-campus students will be typed by this team.

On Friday the team will move to Quonset 94 for the convenience of married students and their families.

Competition has been increasing as the team has moved around campus. The percentages in the dorms to date are: Abbott, 64 percent; Snyder, 61 percent; Phillips, 57 percent; East Shaw, 59 percent and West Shaw, 43 percent.

According to Miss Johnson, the percentages may change if the men from the dorms will have their blood typed at one of the other dorms or at the Union. The cards they fill out will credit the proper dorm with the test.

## UN-Communist Truce Talks Fail Again

MUNSAN, KOREA—(AP)—Yesterday's brief Korean cease-fire talks between UN and Communist liaison officers produced no results.

The two factions met in an attempt to settle the one remaining issue—the extent of a security zone around the site of the talks. The meeting held in Panmunjom was interrupted abruptly by the Reds after lasting only a half hour.

An official Allied release says the Reds showed what was termed an unyielding attitude over the issue of setting up a neutral zone.

On the other hand, Communist newsmen said the Red delegation had demanded immediate admission by the Allies that their planes had strafed the Kaesong-Panmunjom area Friday.

Despite the abrupt ending of the latest conference, the officers agreed to meet again. A feeling still persists in the Allied camp that the Reds are eager to resume the truce talks, which they broke off last August.

## Cross Country Squad Downs Purdue, 20-11

Showing fine early season form, Coach Karl Senlademan's cross country squad successfully opened its 1951 season Saturday by beating Purdue University, 20-11.

The meet's individual winner was Purdue's great Finnish runner, Denis Johansson, who led the field with a creditable 26:22. This compares with the course record of 19:52.3, which is held by Bob Black of Rhode Island State, and set in 1943.

Nearest to Johansson, and heading the Spartan finishers was Capt. Jim Kepford, Muskegon junior, who took the runner-up position with a time of 31:00.

Close behind Kepford were Spartans Mickey Waite, Ron Barr, Jim Arnold, and Jerry Zerbe, finishing in that order. This group completed the scoring for MSC as only five men from each school are scored.

Running seventh was Purdue's Gene Matthews, while Ed Townsend of MSC came in eighth. Ninth place went to Jack DeLong of State, followed by John Yoder of the Boilermaker's in the tenth position.

Spartans Wayne cutt and Ken Harley finished in eleventh and twelfth places respectively.

Johansson led all the way in the 1000-yard race.

## Pony Backs Save MSC From Defeat

### Wells, Bolden Spark Spartan Grid Victory

Michigan State's football Spartans surged to life Saturday in the final quarter to down an upset-minded Marquette 20-14. It was the second such nerve-racking finish in two weeks.

The Hilltoppers, four tough-down underdogs, played super-spirited football before 39,000 fans at Mackin Field Stadium to come dangerously close to dumping the team rated tops in the AP poll.

With the score standing 14-6 in favor of the Hilltoppers at the start of the fourth quarter, Michigan State repeated their breathtaking performance of the Ohio State game and exploded for two TD's for their tenth straight win.

Right Halfback Billy Wells and Freshman LeRoy Bolden, left half, gave the Spartans the touchdowns.

Wells ran 69 yards through the left side of the line in the second quarter to go all the way for his first of two TD's. Gordie Serr's try for the extra point was no good.

Wells' other touchdown came in the fourth quarter on a 31-yard pass from Quarterback Al Dorow.

Bolden made the last touchdown on a 14-yard run around right end without being touched by Marquette tacklers.

Both dressing rooms after the game were quiet. Spartan Coach "Biggie" Munn expressed admiration for the Marquette spirit.

"It was a tough game," Munn stated, wiping his brow at the steamy dressing room, "and my kids aren't super-human beings. They did a great job of coming back again this week after proving their mettle against OSU last week."

Marquette Coach Little W. Blackburn was disappointed, but not downcast about the result.

"We did not realize the position we were in, on the verge of beating the top team in the country. Probably the touchdown made by Wells on a pass in the last quarter was the greatest single psychological blow we received. We were lined up to stop their ground game and the pass caught us off."

Marquette's first tally came on a pass from Donald Leahy quarterback, to End Jack Tobias just three and a half minutes in the first quarter. The extra point attempt was good and Marquette was ahead, 7-0.

At the start of the second quarter, Halfback, Ronald Drazewski punted out of bounds on State's 31-yard line.

On the next play, Wells brought the Spartan fans to life with his 69-yard scoring sprint.

Just before the end of the half, Leahy again passed to Tobias for Marquette's score. The conversion was good and Marquette led 14 to 6 at halftime.

Michigan State's Junior Varsity squad capped its second straight football win Friday afternoon by handing a strong University of Michigan team a 20-7 defeat at the Old College Field.

Three seat halfbacks, John Watson, Bernie Raterink and Red Zigars, did the scoring for the Spartans. Raterink's TD run was a sensational 90-yard gallop.

Defensive back Art Ingram set up the first Michigan State score when he intercepted a pass thrown by Michigan's Don Evans in the opening minutes of the game. Ingram took the pass on the Wolverine's 35 and raced to the ten before he was knocked out of bounds.

Fullback Vic Poutala moved the ball down to the seven where Quarterback Al Francesca tossed a pitch-out to Watson who rounded his own right end for a touchdown. Jerry Luzzader converted to give the Spartans a 7-0 lead.

Michigan State's second touchdown came late in the third quarter. With the ball resting on the MSU 10-yard line, Raterink hit his own right tackle and then outraced the Wolverine defensive back for a 30-yard touchdown point. Luzzader's place kick made the score 14-0.

MSU scored the next time they got their yards on the ball, marching 57 yards in a sustained drive.

That time it was Jayvee's top scorer, Zigars, who scored the touchdown. The Cadillac right halfback took the ball on the State and Husk 27-yard line and raced off his own right tackle all the way.

### Psychologist-Author to Speak Here Oct.

The author of a best-selling true story of six convicts in Leavenworth Penitentiary will appear on the MSC lecture-concert series Oct. 23, at 8 p.m.  
Donald P. Wilson, a psychologist who spent three years at Leavenworth studying the relationship between criminality and drug addiction, will speak at the Auditorium.

His book, "My Six Convicts," concerns the personalities of the convicts whom he chose to assist in his experiments.

It was Wilson's job to gain the confidence of the six inmates, and through them the confidence of the other 2,000 inmates of the Federal prison.  
The 51-year-old psychologist conducted his research at Leavenworth as a project for the U. S. Public Health Service.

Students will be admitted to the lecture by presenting ID cards at the door.
