Congress to Investigate Housing Requirements

Two Charge MSC Breaks State Law

Inadequate Space Say Snyder Critics

Student Congress decided last night to investigate further college housing requirements.

Jean Warren, representative from Lansing, reported a charge by two Snyder Hall residents that the state law on multiple dwellings was being violated in men's housing. The law requires that rooms have 500 cubic feet for every person living in them.

Dormitories with three men to a room do not have the required 500 cubic feet, Warren said. College officials said that the state law does not apply to MSC because the State Board of Agriculture has complete authority over rules governing MSC.

Off campus housing must have the required 500 cubic feet per resident in order to be approved by the college, Warren added. The first edition of the Congress newsletter is slated for publication next Tuesday. The Congress announced it will be called, "The Statesman."

In discussing the purpose of "The Statesman," Bob Bolo, Student Government president, said, "Our side should be presented to the people." He explained that the main story in the first issue will be a pro and con discussion of the housing question. He urged everyone in Congress to contribute copy to future issues.

To cut down expenses Bolo suggested the possibility of getting one or more classes to help in financing the purchasing of the shoes. At the moment this bill has been tabled pending the outcome of a student poll.

Under consideration by the finance committee is a bill to appropriate \$120,000 in connection with the public address system. At the present time \$38 has been suggested for a field microphone and \$10 for additional cable. The bill would allow spending \$15 for a protection case for the system, \$35 for a supply box, and the balance of \$120 to cover physical depreciation.

The rules of procedure for using the public address system were also announced. Any organization wishing to use the system must first petition Congress in writing. The petition must include the date and approximate time that the system would be used. A contract must then be signed a week prior to the system's intended use, agreeing to the \$80 an hour charge of the operator. An additional one hour charge to cover the time that is spent installing and taking down the system would also be included in the contract.

against the three world evils on which Communism thrives—hunger, disease and ignorance.

Through technical assistance in these areas to help nations with the basic problems of producing food, reducing disease and providing rudimentary education, Point Four is—in spite of what the critics say—making progress, he said.

Hannah concluded that military aid is essential to victory over Communism; but added that we cannot expect lasting peace unless we can win the goodwill of the millions of hungry, sick and uneducated people in the world.

He offered Point Four as the solution for that basic human problem.

Registration topped the 500-mark at the conference, which concludes its sessions Thursday evening. Forty states and seven foreign countries were represented at the four-day conference.

Study U. S. Government Ryukyu Officials at MSC

Three high government officials of the Ryukyu Islands are visiting the MSC campus.

The Department of Political Science has set up a two week program for them to study the form of American government. During the first week, they will receive lectures and instructions from professors of the Political Science Department. The following week they will tour the state and study the functions of our state, county and local governments. They are also scheduled to visit farms in the area to see the life of the American farmer.

Primary purpose of this mission is to study the American form of government, with stress on executive and legislative branches of our state government.

Secondly, they are to study the workings of the county and local government and such functions as our budgeting, banking, taxation and maritime systems.

The three hold very high posts in the Ryukyu central government. Masaru Miyasato is director of the Department of Finance, Masayoshi Harakune heads the Maritime Department and Gempo Hirayama is a member of the legislature.

Michigan State has a special interest in the island where five MSC professors are now teaching. Three Ryukyu professors are now studying at Michigan State.

The Ryukyu Islands are a former part of the Japanese Empire, south of Japan proper. The U.S. has a large airbase there, and now occupies the island, although it has a democratic form of government.
