Game Sidelights

Besides the convincing victory over Notre Dame, there are several other factors that should assure State the retention of its No. 1 rating in the polls this week.

State's closest rival last week, Georgia Tech, narrowly edged out Alabama, 22-14. Since the Ramblin' Wreck has not been held to one touchdown in 13 games, it is in no position to take over the top spot.

Maryland, third last week, was dropped from the unbeaten rank by twice losing to Mississippi, 27-14. The loss broke a 22-game unbeaten string for the Terps, which extended all the way back to October 4, 1950.

Fourth-ranked UCLA, the West Coast powerhouse, was idle and meets Southern California next week for the Pacific Coast crown.

Quarterback Tom Yewic didn't gain much in his bid to break the Spartan total offense record for one year. In fact, he lost yardage. Yewic's two completed passes netted only five yards and the fast rushing Notre Dame line lost him 25 on the ground. It all adds up to a negative 20 yards.

For the first time this season, Willie Throder was calling signals on a majority of the Spartan touchdowns. He was running the team when they scored the first TD from the 12. He also called the spot that propelled Earl Stone around right end for the final State rally. Willie was described by some as "the coolest quarterback on the field."

Texans Still Winless After Meeting Lions

DETROIT (AP)—The winless Dallas Texans, homeless orphans of the National Football League, received a cruel welcome when they barnstormed into Detroit yesterday and were slapped down 43-13 by the championship conceiving Lions.

The victory kept the Lions in a first place tie in the National Conference, with the San Francisco 49ers who squeaked to a 23-17 victory over the Washington Redskins. The leaders each have a 6-2 record.

Pat Harder kicked a 13-yard field goal and Vale Lary ran a punt back 58 yards as the Lions started the rout in the first period. Later Bobby Layne, Cleve Boy, Ollie Cline and Harder scored touchdowns. Harder also kicked a 26-yard field goal.

The 49ers, a badly beaten team with only seven minutes to go, got two quick touchdowns to win over the surprisingly tough Redskins, 23-17.

Tamburo Plays Best In Crucial Contests

Butly Dick Tamburo has made a habit of reaching his peak for crucial contests.

But never has a game been more crucial or Dick's peak any higher than the Notre Dame encounter last Saturday.

The senior linebacker recovered three fumbles, one of them setting up the first Spartan score. He was the direct cause of at least two other fumbles through his bone crushing tackles. Time after time he broke through the Irish defense to down Notre Dame's speedy backs before they could break loose or to rush the passer into inaccurate tosses.

His great performance has increased his stock as an All-American candidate as well as a possible rating as "linebacker of the week." He was awarded the game ball for his play.

A sterling indication of Tamburo's pressure play occurred during the 51 season, when his alertness in recovering fumbles set up two TD's in the all important Indiana encounter.

Dick's performance in this year's Purdue game caused some observers to remark that along with Ed Tamburman and Doug Weaver, the trio formed the most deadly combination of linebackers in the country.

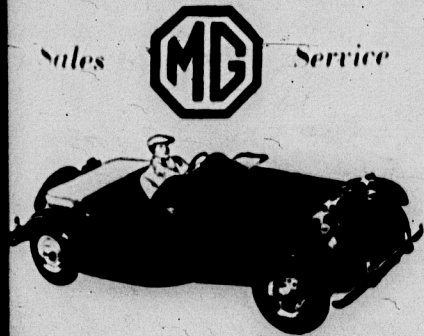

UN Truce Debates Bogged Down

Assembly May Extend Into 1953

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Korean truce debates were bogged down yesterday as hopelessly as the deadlocked truce talks at Panmunjom, and extension of the UN Assembly in 1953 was being discussed as a possibility.

The session began Oct. 14 and was scheduled to end Dec. 20. The Assembly is near the end of five weeks of meetings, and four weeks of debate on Korea and thus past the scheduled half-way mark of its 1952 session.

Some delegates were already talking of recessing for Christmas and holding over the Assembly through the early part of next year.

UN Secretariat officials, who delayed the Assembly opening for a month to escape some of the heat of the U.S. presidential election, said no decision on extending the Assembly will be made until about Dec. 10.

Three times during the first half the Irish defense averted disaster after fumbles by holding the Spartans on downs.

"Although the Irish led in yardage and in first downs, they never were able to get a sustained drive going. In the first half they never moved past their own 46."

In the bruising defensive battle of the first half, State was almost stopped cold. The Spartans showed only 23 yards overland against the tough Irish defense.

State's passing attack, which usually clicks when the ground-work fails, was bottled up all afternoon. A fast-rushing Notre Dame line held the Spartan aerial attack to five completions in 21 tosses.

After the Spartans kicked off to open the game, they got a break that could have broken the game wide open, but couldn't capitalize.

Quarterback Tom Carey fumbled on Notre Dame's first play from scrimmage and Weaver recovered on the Notre Dame 34.

Running plays picked up a first down but two five-yard penalties shoved the Spartans back again. On fourth down Slonac tried a field goal from the 35 but it fell short to turn the ball over to the Irish.

Early in the second quarter, Serri recovered a fumble on the Irish 15, but the surging Notre Dame defense again threw back the Spartan threat.

Later in the same period it was Dohoney's turn to pounce on the bouncing pigskin, but four incomplete aerials passed the ball in Notre Dame possession.

Billy Wells fumbled on the opening play of the second half and Johnny Lattner recovered for Notre Dame on State's 13. On fourth down with three yards to go for a first down, Rob Arris booted the ball through the uprights from the 13 to give the Irish a 3-0 edge.

State wasted one more Irish fumble before converting one on the scoreboard. Tamburo recovered on State's 34. Lattner intercepted a Willie Thrower pass on Notre Dame's 10 to stop the drive.

On the next play the Spartans had the ball again. Tamburo recovered Joe Heap's bobble on the Irish 13, and McAuliffe and Wells moved down to the 6. A timely holding penalty gave State a first down on the one, where McAuliffe bulled over for the game's first touchdown. Slonac converted his first of three to make it 7-3.

Five minutes later, McAuliffe piled over from the one again and was 14-3. Bullock recovered a fumble on the 21 to set up this tally. Another holding penalty hurt Notre Dame as it shoved the ball from the five to the one.

On the first series of plays in the first quarter, Notre Dame moved from their own 31 to State's one, but the stout Spartan defense kept the Irish within inches of a first down and State took possession.

Later in the fourth quarter Jim Ellis intercepted a stray aerial and ran it back to Notre Dame's 24.

Then came the picture play of the game. Slonac skirted right end, cut back, and scored behind key blocks by Serri and Lelloy Holden. The scoreboard flashed a final 21-3.

Erickson Studies Nuclear Course

Dr. A. Earl Erickson, MSC soil science professor, has concluded studies at the atomic energy center in Oak Ridge, Tenn.

He was enrolled with 52 other research workers in an advanced course given by the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies. The course was designed to show how radioactive isotopes can be used in biochemical research.

Dr. Erickson is interested in tracer work on iron migration in soils, efficiency of nutrient uptake and other problems dealing with organic matter in soil.

This concentrated course began Nov. 3 and terminated last Friday.
