



It's Your Money

Student congressmen last week approved unanimously a budget that will require students to pay a 25-cent tax both winter and spring term

Ever since the two-year trial tax amendment was approved it has been under heavy fire. A lot of promises filled the air at the time of its approval. Some of these were hastily and unsoundly made and will probably never be kept. Others will have to be carried out if the tax is to be reapproved a year from next June.

The budget approved last week was for \$5,800. A contingency fund of \$1,300 will pay for a secretary (at 80 cents an hour), office supplies, repair work on the government's equipment (mimeograph machine, public address system, typewriters, postage, long-distance-calls and telegrams.

This \$1,300 fund will also pay government travel expenses (4 cents a mile by car), advertising costs for publicizing all-college functions, election ballots and check lists, Spartan Spirit enthusiasm-building projects for seasonal sports and hospitality;

Hospitality includes possible convocations and picking up the tab when dining with visiting student government officials from other areas. Four pages in the Wolverine account for some more. A \$100 general fund-a catchall to draw from if the budget is exceeded on other items-brings the total to \$1,300.

Add to this a \$250 unappropriated fund-set aside so the \$4,250 student fund-will never have to be dipped into, except "to benefit the students."

Now we get to that whopping big \$4,250 student fund. It is planned for use on "any direct benefits to the student body" upon which the Student Congress decides.

The student fund was set up with no strings attached. Congressmen were unwilling to commit themselves thisterm to spending the money for definite projects. They had several in mind, but refused to appropriate money now from the student fund for them.

Under this budget Cougress will have \$4:250 with which to sell the idea to students that the tax amendment should beimade a permanent part of the constitution. A new Congress next year will have another chance to try to sell the idea before it comes up for a final vote.

Should the project congressmen now have in mind fall through or prove unpopular, student opinion could force a lower tax rate spring term or eventually kill the student tax entirely. If the amendment is voted down in 1954 it. will not be entirely the fault of the Student Government

* Students indicated their approval of the tax last year in an all-college plebicite. It is their money, to be spent as they want it spent. It is up to students as individuals and in organizations to let Student Government officials know how the students want their tax money spent.

When the job of gathering ideas for spending tax money came up this term, practically no one showed up for the open meeting. Yet students have not been desitant in criticizing the way tax money was spent.

A quarter each term isn't much It won't break any. body. But the principle of a student tax-supported Stodent Government is vitally important.

Students should spend their own money and not have it spent for them. They can do it by telling the congress men how they want the tax money spent.

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Fuller's Follies **Tutoring** Business

Looking over old issues of the State News, I came across an item about some enterprising Harvard graduates who put the four years they spent in school to incrative use They set up a teaching bureau for truant students needing assistance before exams.

For the trifling sum of \$5 an hour the Harvard men guaranteed at least a "gentlemanly C" for graduates of the bureau and in most cases provided B's. Under the tutoring plan the text and lecture notes for any course at Harvard were provided. Student customers were drilled until they had mastered enough material to pass the test

The business was started in 1940 but squelched by university authorities and newspaper publicity. It was started up again after World War II.

At one time more than two-thirds of the students made use of the cram bureau's facilities. The average outlay was \$18 per student.

Advertising for the tutoring service was the financial backbone of the university's publications," according to an editorial in the Crimson, Harvard student newspaper. "Students who tried to get an education the hard way were subject to the disdain of their wealthier or less scrupulous associates.

As a sideline the bureau provided a service for preparing term papers and occasionally even a thesis. Proprietors of the bureau made an effort to ease the conscience of the more reluctant students. Papers were dictated and the customers were required to write them in longhand so it would not be so much like buying a ready-made paper. A Crimson reporter was told; It's good for your soul to copy it down."

Maybe Harvard students have found the answer to the problem of midterms, final exams and term papers. They are at least facing the problem realistically, if not intellectually honestly and to their best advantage in the long Y 31 21.

One thing the cram bureau obviously indicates is that most students study for grades, not with the idea of learning anything or for retaining knowledge. Perhaps some enterprising students in East Lansing

could make a fortune by starting a tutoring bureau

This College Council would consist of seven faculty and nine student members, including the president of the college, the dean of the college, the faculty ad-visor to the Student Government Association, the chairman of the Honor Committee, an ed-itor of the student newspaper. one senior, two juniors, two sophomores, and one freshman. One of the student members would be elected by the council
