CIO Attempts To Repair Rift Over Election

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — The CIO worked yesterday to repair a deep rift in its ranks over choosing a new CIO president, a scrap not yet over but apparently won by 45-year-old Walter Reuther.

The dynamic, red-haired Reuther, president of the big CIO auto workers union, was widely credited as having whipped together enough votes to get the CIO presidency in any convention showdown.

Top officials were trying to get forces backing CIO Executive Vice President Allan S. Haywood, a 64-year-old veteran union leader who came up from the coal mines, to back off and concede to Reuther.

But Haywood and his chief supporter, David J. McDonald, president of the big CIO steelworkers union, were still pledging a finish fight that could spill over on the convention floor. Selection of officers is due tomorrow.

The Haywood group was considering forcing a test on a proposal to change the CIO Constitution so as to require the CIO presidency to be a full time job. Approval of such a plan would mean Reuther could not fill the job as long as he retained the presidency of the auto workers.

But it was not expected any such plan would get the convention approval, since Reuther appeared to have a clear voting majority on his side.

CIO officers sent a message today congratulating Martin P. Durkin, president of the AFL Plumbers' union, upon his selection by President-elect Eisenhower to be secretary of labor.

The CIO was obviously pleased that a man from labor's ranks had been selected even though he came from the rival AFL.

Appointment Of Durkin Draws Fire

'Affront to Labor,'
Says Ohio Senator

CINCINNATI (AP) — Sen. Robert A. Taft yesterday fired a blistering criticism at President-elect Eisenhower's appointment of Martin Durkin, a Democrat, as secretary of labor.

Taft said it was an "incredible appointment" and an "affront" to millions of union members.

Political observers said that harsh as the words were, they were gentle compared to their real import.

Early reaction from Washington and elsewhere indicated a startled Republican viewpoint, with some of the party stalwarts so cautious they hesitated at saying anything.

Taft, head of the GOP Policy Committee who was defeated for the Republican presidential nomination by Gen. Eisenhower, minced no words. He said:

"The appointment of Mr. Durkin is an incredible appointment. This is no reflection on the character or ability of Mr. Durkin. I had a number of talks with Mr. Herbert Brownell who has been the key man in cabinet appointments, and made several recommendations of qualified men."

"It was never even suggested that a man would be appointed who has always been an ardent Truman Democrat who fought Gen. Eisenhower's election and advocated the repeal of the Taft-Hartley law."

It is an affront to millions of union members and officers who had the courage to defy the edict of officials like Mr. Durkin that they vote for Stevenson. This appointment leaves without representation in the Cabinet those millions of Democrats, North and South, who left the party to support Gen. Eisenhower, and give representation to their most ardent opponents.

It blew the lid off what some members of the party thought were cured political injuries—those which occurred before the general was chosen over the Buckeye senator for the presidential choice.

Gen. Eisenhower was not available for comment.

It indicated a political rupture unless new medicine can bring a quick cure.

It also opened another sore spot some observers believed, in that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York still seems to be in the better position to take a right hand hand of Eisenhower.

Brownell, named in Taft's statements, was Dewey's campaign manager in 1948 when the New Yorker was defeated by President Truman for the presidency.

Newell Eyes New Talent

While Saturday's basketball opener with Marquette holds Pete Newell's chief interest at the moment, he's also keeping check on the improvement shown by the freshmen squad.

Newell's chances of improving Spartan fortunes in basketball depend mainly on the flow of new talent to the campus.

Under the direction of assistant coach, John Benington, this year's 20-man frosh squad is being indoctrinated with Michigan State's basic offensive style.

"It takes a long time to get the new players familiar with our system," Benington stated. "After all, they're all used to different offenses."

Benington has been pleased so far with this season's team, which includes a number of all-state players from three different states.

"I think there are several play-

ers on the team that will aid us on the varsity next year," Benington said.

One of the best prospects is Julius McCoy, a 6' 5" forward from Farrell, Pa. McCoy, a left hander who wears glasses, was one of the outstanding high school players in Pennsylvania last year. A deadly shooter, McCoy also helps the rebounding crew with his jumping ability.

FRid Corbus, an all-state center from St. Louis, Mich., is being converted into a forward here at MSC and has shown up well in practice so far this year.

Two of the top guard prospects on the frosh team are Walt Godfrey and Jim Raymond. Godfrey hails from Detroit Cass Tech, while Raymond attended Lansing Sexton, where he graduated at mid-term last year.

Duane Olson, a teammate of Godfrey's, and Glen Stuart from

Grand Rapids Union have both shown improvement at the forward positions they play.

At center, Duane Peterson and Bill Hillmeyer may aid the varsity next season. Peterson comes from Elkhart, Ind., while Hillmeyer is from Harvey, Ill., full-back Wayne Benson's home town. Benington singled out Harry Koustik, Dave Raspler and Dan Morrissey as three other members of the freshmen team who have shown improvement in adjusting themselves to Michigan State's style of basketball.

This year's frosh will play preliminary games each night before the varsity basketball game, either meeting a make-up team or playing an intra-squad contest.

For Saturday's opener, the frosh will meet a team headed by Bill Bower, last year's "most valuable player" on the Spartan quintet.

Mat, Gymnastics Meets Start Today

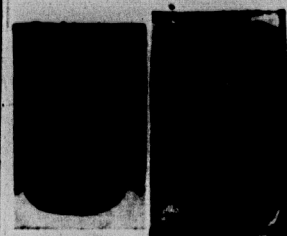
Assistant wrestling coach Gayle Mikles and Olympic team member Dale Thomas will assist at the tourney.

Show Similar Careers

Raterink, Zagers Form Dynamic Duo

When Coach Biggie Munn begins to fret about replacing 19 seniors on the gridiron next fall, he can quickly turn to two of his problems by glancing toward halfbacks Bernie Raterink and Bert Zagers.

Most experts will agree that Michigan State's success this season was due to its tremendous depth. And with the graduation of Capt. Don McAuliffe and Vince Pisano, Munn needs two capable backs to bolster LeRoy Bolden and Billy Wells.

Raterink and Zagers are ideal candidates to form the nucleus of a new "pony" backfield next season. As backfield coach Steve Sebo says, "Both of them are excellent prospects, possessing good football knowledge and great speed."

"They show a tremendous desire to become a part of the Spartan winning system," Sebo continues.

An interesting feature about the two backs is that their careers somewhat parallel each other.

In 1951, as freshmen on Dan Post scoring honors with 24 points, Raterink was elected Co-Captain along with Carl Nystrom.

This season they have put in about the same amount of time in Spartan games. Running with the "Pepper Four," which is usually led by quarterback Willie Throver, they gave Spartan fans plenty of thrills to match those of the veterans.

Raterink scored one touchdown this season, while Zagers scored two. They both registered in the Texas A & M contest, snaring Throver aerials for tallies. Zagers also crossed the goal-line against Syracuse on a one-yard plunge.

Bert, who runs from right half, has gained more yards than left half Bernie, but Raterink has the better average. Zagers shows 65 yards on 18 attempts for a 3.6 av-

erage, while Raterink has 51 yards on 16 carries for a 3.2 average.

Even as far back as the Spartans' first year, the backs of the Spartans were rated as college caliber. In 1949, Raterink and Zagers were named All-American backs in 1950 and 1951.

Raterink had the team's first rushing touchdown in 1951, a 15-yard run in the first quarter of the game against the University of Michigan.

Zagers, who is a halfback, was named All-American in 1951, and was named to the All-American team in 1952.

Williams May Demand Aid for Schools

Legislature Faces Special Session

LANSING (P)—Gov. Williams yesterday told a group of educators and parents that "in all probability" he would call a special session of the Legislature this month to give schools broader money borrowing powers.

The 80 representatives of education groups who attended the meeting at the governor's invitation, unanimously urged that the lawmakers be called to permit school districts to borrow on anticipated receipts of state aid.

Williams told the group that he had a letter from Rep. Wade Van Valkenburg (R-Kalamazoo) reporting that many legislators would be in Florida for December and that there was doubt of gathering the necessary two-thirds to give the emergency legislation immediate effect.

Williams said that since legislative attaches insisted the present Legislature automatically goes out of office Dec. 31, it appeared that the session, if held at all, would be called for the week of Dec. 15 to Dec. 22.

Dr. Lee M. Thurston, state superintendent of public instruction, repeated to the group an earlier report that some 300 school districts need \$3,500,000 in advance state aid payments immediately to meet payrolls and other expenses.

William Emerson of Pontiac, chairman of the legislative committee of the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers, said all school districts in the state would be in financial difficulties by next June if the situation is not remedied.

The schools have not been collecting their usual advance payments of January state aid, because the state treasury is nearing depletion.

Asked to explain this in simple terms, Dr. Robert F. Steadman, state controller, said it was all due to the sales tax diversion amendment.

The amendment, he said, fixed the state school aid payment, which alone could have been paid by the state without difficulty.

The amendment also, however, he said, took one-third of the total sales tax and gave it to schools and municipalities. This loss, which totals about \$80,000,000 annually, he said, has never been made up with new taxes by the Legislature, and for six years the state has been spending more than it takes in.

Winding up the meeting, Williams made a strong plea to the school group to assist him in persuading the Legislature to pass a corporation profits tax to bridge the gap.

"The final result," he said, "will be a lot more sure and better if we all work together."

The governor said he agreed heartily with Mrs. Jessie Baxter of Detroit, representing the Michigan Federation of Teachers, who said she "would dislike to see the temporary measures postpone the remedying of the long range problem."

Ad Man to Speak To Retailing Club

Fellowships Available for MSC Students

MSC's School of Graduate Studies has available "Opportunity Fellowships" for graduate study, according to Dean Thomas H. Osgood.

"Opportunity Fellowships" financed and sponsored by the John Hay Whitney Foundation, New York City, are designed to give opportunity for advanced study to persons who otherwise might not be able to reach their fullest development, the dean said.

Competition for the awards is open to any U.S. citizen who has given evidence of special ability and who has not had full opportunity to develop his talents because of such barriers as racial or cultural background, or region of residence.

The fellowships are open not only for graduate study but for any kind of training or experience which may be most useful in developing varied talents and varied forms of leadership. Applications for industrial and labor apprenticeships will be welcomed, the dean added.

Applications for the one-year award should be addressed to "Opportunity Fellowships," John Hay Whitney Foundation, 30 Rockefeller Plaza, New York 30, N.Y. Deadline for this year's awards is already past and announcements will be made in April of May, 1953.
