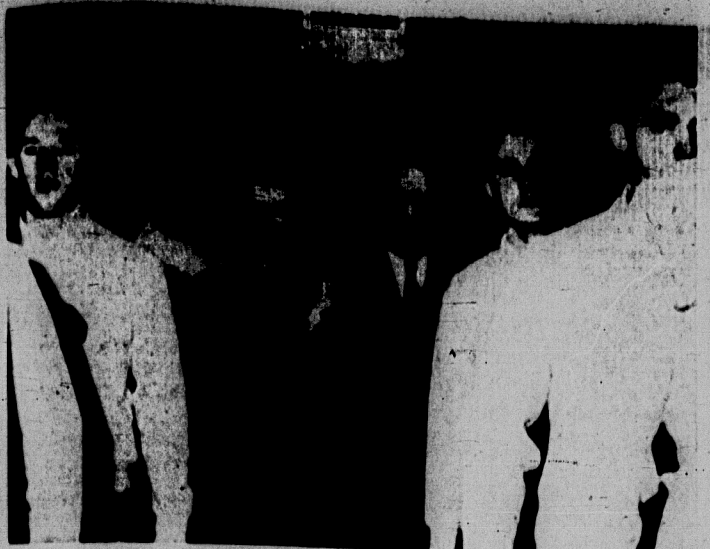

He said he had not taken the matter up with the President in their Friday meeting. Dr. Hannah added that he had not been called to Washington for an interview with the Senate Armed-Service Committee, who must approve his appointment, and that he doesn't expect to be called.

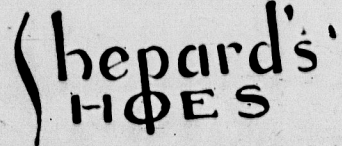

Labeled Great Competitor Ferrari Earns New Cage Title

One of the greatest compliments that can be paid to any athlete is to say that he is a great competitor.

Such a distinction has been placed upon the Spartan's high-scoring forward Al Ferrari by his coach, Pete Newell.

As proof of this statement, Newell points to the games with Kansas State, Illinois and Indiana, all of whom are in the top 10 in the national cage rankings. Ferrari ran up a total of 68 points against these renowned opponents.

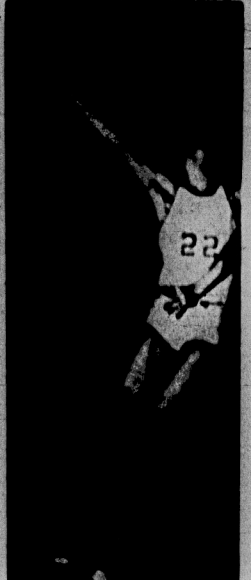
Ferrari is what coaches call an "impossible shooter." They mean he has so many ways of throwing the ball into the hoop that it is almost impossible to guard him.

Such basketball ability has led the New York City sophomore into such a threat at the basket that he can become State's highest scoring forward in the history of the sport on the Red Cedar campus.

In 10 games, Ferrari has hooped 167 points for a 16.7 average per game. With 12 hits remaining on the season slate, the aggressive forward can reach Sam Fortino's mark of 251 points, which was set in the 1945-46 season.

State's high water mark as far as scoring is concerned, was set in the 1947-48 season by Bob Bramum, a center who totaled 344 points.

In addition to his chief attri-

but (that of placing the ball within the hoop) Ferrari has also been State's top rebounder for the season. The 6'2", 185-pounder leads with a total of 76 rebounds compared to Keith Stackhouse's mark of 51, which places the Hoosier in the second spot in this important department.

He is one reason why the Spartans out-rebounded the bigger, more rugged Kansas State Wildcats in the Spartan Classic. In the Illinois game, Ferrari on one occasion out-jumped the 6'9" Johnny Kerr three times and finally netted the basket on the third try.

Al is an extremely tough customer under the boards when he tries to grab a good position in order to reach the basketball. Therefore, it is no wonder that he leads the squad in personal fouls with a total of 40.

It was at Richey Ayala's persistence that Ferrari decided to attend State. You see, the two cagers were teammates at Brooklyn Tech. Then Ayala, loved State while Ferrari still had another year of competition for Tech, but Al never had that final season of prep ball because of a city-wide teacher's strike which forced the cancellation of basketball games.

Now the two former Brooklyn teammates are starting on the same college squad, which promises to be better as time goes on because of their presence.

As a freshman Ferrari played in seven Spartan varsity games and then he rose to great heights with a 22 point spurge in this season's third game with top ranked Kansas State.

The University of Vermont football team, in losing all seven games last year, scored only four touchdowns.

Spartanettes, Michigan State's coed swimming squad, opened the season with a 66-64 victory over the Bowling Green splashers, Saturday in the Women's Gym.

High individual scores for State was Pat Swaney with first in the individual medley and the 60-yard breaststroke in addition to a second in the 30-yard breaststroke.

Bowling Green won the 80-yard medley relay and placed first in the 30-yard backstroke. Its outstanding performer was Sue Mignerey who won both the 30-yard and 60-yard freestyles, breaking pool records made in 1948 by Spartanette swimmers Peg Wedgworth and Dee Weinburg.

Bowling Green's captain, Solie Borch, finished with a first in the 30-yard back crawl and a second in the 60-yard back crawl. The 30-yard breaststroke was taken by State's Mary Cantwell.

Sophomore Nancy O'Rourke placed first in diving, while Barbara Edwards and Dorothy Ripper won the synchronized duet.

The Spartanettes will meet the University of Western Ontario Saturday in the women's pool at 7:30 p.m.

Varsity Swimmers To Face Freshmen

Coach Charles McCaffree will send his swimmers into Jenison pool Saturday afternoon in a meet where defeat, strangely enough, won't be considered too serious.

The reason for this odd situation is that McCaffree's varsity tankers will be swimming against the freshman squad, coached by Roger Miller.

Stated to start at 3, the meet will feature competition in all regular events and will be handled exactly as a regular inter-collegiate dual affair.

McCaffree will have his entire crew with one exception. The exception is freshman John Dudeck, who has captured first in the 200-yard breaststroke in both dual meets for the varsity this year. Assistant Coach Miller will gain Dudeck's services for the meet.

In the sprints Miller will use Russ, Palmer, Bob Kimpton, and Robin Heffe. Swimming in the 220 and 400-yard freestyle events for the fresh will be Jack Beattie and Van Fisher.

Miller has five backstrobers and he is eager to get a look at their performances in competition. Bill Savage, Bill Bromley, Don Stewart, Gibson Smith, and Frank Pasanini form the fresh quintet.

Miller also has five competitors in the breaststroke events. Swimming along with Dudeck will be John Jeffrey, Bob Reams, Paul McCoy and Tom Wilson.

Diving performers have not been selected as yet and an exhibition will probably be given by varsity members.

Leading the varsity will be such stalwarts as Bert McLachlan, who set a dual meet record in the 220-yard freestyle last week against Indiana, Tom Payette, Frank Reynolds, Bob Schumacher, and Chuck Baldwin.

State Hopes to Break Losing Skein at Visitors' Expense

Michigan State's hockey team, rested and at full strength after a 10-day layoff, will attempt to turn over a belated New Year's leaf in the ice arena tonight.

Burdened with a 10-game losing streak, the pucksters will be out to get back on the winning trail as they clash with Ontario Agricultural College at 8 in the opener of a two-game series.

Coach Ann Bessone's charges are rated a good chance to snap the bonds of defeat against the Aggies, but Bessone warned Wednesday that they are not to be taken lightly.

The Aggies have split in only two games this season, but have their own ice rink for the first time and have been working since September in preparation for the ice schedule.

Both of the Aggie opponents have been close to home and this will mark the first time this season that they have ventured outside of Canada.

Waterloo College fell before the Aggies, 3-2, while Toronto Law school beat coach Fred Mason's crew, 12-8.

Bessone pointed out that in both games the Aggies netted eight goals and are capable of presenting a potent offense.

The Aggie lineup will be well-stocked with veteran performers. Guarding the cage will be Ralph Winch, who has been stopping pucks for the past two seasons.

Three tested veterans will skate in the first line, which has Ed Whiteside at center, with Don Murphy and Jim McLean at the wings. At defense, the Aggies will start 200-pound Mary Freeman and 185-pound Bill Dale.

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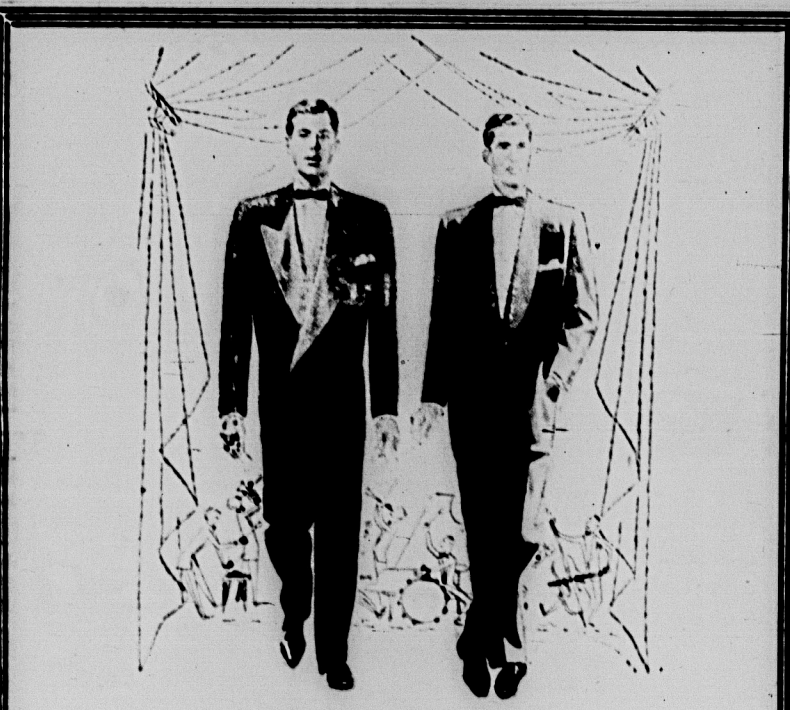

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The Philadelphia Phillies Wednesday came to terms with their pitching ace, Robin Roberts, at a record Philadelphia pay check, reportedly to be nearly \$40,000 for 1953.

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Hall of Fame Adds Dean. Al Simmons

NEW YORK (AP)—Jerome Herman "Dizzy" Dean, older of the St. Louis Cardinals' famed pitching brothers, and Al Simmons, who distinguished himself as a hard-hitting outfielder in the Philadelphia Athletics, were added Wednesday to baseball's Hall of Fame.

This pair of diamond greats whose careers overlapped in the late '20s and early '30s became the 62nd and 64th to be added to the shrine at Cooperstown, N.Y.

For the second straight year Bill Terry, former first baseman and manager of the New York Giants, barely missed the honor. He fell seven votes short of nomination and was third in the balloting of baseball writers.

Terry was also third a year ago when Harry Heilmann and Paul Waner were named to baseball's immortality.

A surprising turn in the balloting was the failure of Joe Mauer to win a berth in his 15th year of eligibility. It had been freely predicted that Mauer, who retired in 1931 after a brilliant career with the New York Yankees, was the most likely to be honored.

But Mauer finished eighth with 117 votes, 81 short of the number needed for success.

A total of 264 writers with years' membership in the Baseball Writers' Association of America participated in the vote. It took 75 per cent of the voters or 198 to elect.
