Hershey Recommends Strict Student Deferment Regulations

Fathers May Get Call While In College

A tightening of deferment regulations for college students was recommended Tuesday by Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey.

Hershey told newsmen in Washington that "eventually a man will be an unusual case if he gets schooling before military training."

As the first step toward drafting fathers, Hershey said he would seek an executive order ending deferments for men who become fathers while in college under deferment, and then seek a second deferment after graduation on grounds of dependency.

He said the proposed order also would require that college freshmen stand in the upper quarter instead of upper half of their class and score 75, instead of 70, on the Selective Service college qualification test.

Hershey does not plan to seek the changes from Congress, but will depend on an executive order.

Tightening of educational deferments is inevitable, Hershey said. "Freshmen would be hardest hit because of the amount of interest earnings they now get from the fund."

This sum, about \$1,200,000 is all that is spent on veterans' interest now.

Conlin previously had proposed the sales tax diversion amendment so that the public schools could get two cents of the three-cent sales tax in return for giving up their mandated state school aid appropriation. The latter is blamed for much of the treasury's plight.

Conlin Tuesday told the supervisors that he would not ask the legislature to give up the \$50,000,000 fund unless the school people agree to his diversion amendment revision.

Meanwhile, the Senate delayed final passage of the Higgins bill to take two corporation franchise tax payments in one fiscal year.

The measure would move the due date of the \$35,000,000 tax from August to May. Thus, corporations which paid last August, the second month of the state's fiscal year, would pay again in May, the 13th month of the same fiscal year.

Denied by Criesler Stadium Lend-Lease Called Just A Rumor

An idea of loaning Michigan State the use of the University of Michigan Stadium so the Spartans could play host at the scheduled football game next fall was virtually killed today by officials of both schools.

The idea was started by a Detroit newspaperman who wrote that Fritz Criesler, University of Michigan athletic director, had made the proposal.

Tuesday, Criesler denied that he had offered any such plan to Michigan State and added that he never would.

Ralph H. Young, the Spartans' athletic director, indicated he didn't think it was a good idea in the first place.

Young said, "We went over this same ground with Michigan several years ago when the game first was scheduled at Michigan State. We have no thought of changing it now."

"Although we can seat only slightly more than 50,000 people in Mackin Stadium, the people who have seen the game at Ann Arbor during past years wouldn't be too bad off because there is a good chance there will be television in addition to radio for the game," Young said.

The story in the Detroit newspaper stated that Criesler has offered to turn over the Michigan Stadium for the day. The story did not mention to whom the alleged proposal had come.

Michigan State authorities had not heard of the proposal until after the story was in print.

"The Michigan-Michigan State football game has been a 97-29 person sellout at Ann Arbor for the past four seasons.

The Detroit article claimed that, "The switch to East Lansing Stadium, Page 1."

Counterspy Describes FBI Work

Tells of Intrigue With Communists

Nine years of Communist intrigue were described Tuesday by Herbert A. Philbrick, counterspy for the FBI.

The 47-year-old, advertising executive told 2,000 farmers, college staff members and students he unwittingly joined a Red spy organization and rose to a top position in the Communist Party, Philbrick said that Communists are few but dangerous.

When he and his family moved to Cambridge, Mass. in 1940 Philbrick joined the Cambridge Youth Council, ostensibly a group for promoting peace.

After being elected to its council he suspected it of being a Communist organization, he said.

Philbrick could not get any facts to verify Philbrick's explanation.

He said he wanted to expose the Reds but was unable because of lack of evidence. Philbrick had to the Federal Bureau of Investigation with his information and received a go ahead to become his party membership in counterspy.

"At no time was I ordered or instructed to do anything by the FBI," Philbrick said.

He denied Communist charges that he was planted in Red Party by the FBI.

The FBI counterspy joined other organizations as he was ordered by the Communist Party to see the Reds' "greatest secret," Philbrick said.

Elon G. Burton, president of the Advertising Federation of America, will address Prof. A. A. Applegate's journalism 100 class today.

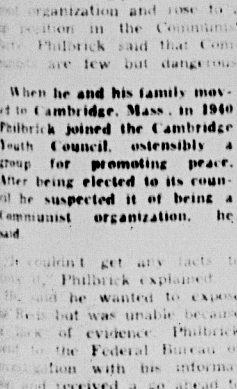
Any students interested in advertising may attend the meeting. It will be held in Room 120 Physics-Mathematics Building at 9 a.m.

Officers Follow Rumored Lead in Sabotage Attempt

KALAMAZOO (AP)—Investigative work around the Black Star train in a widening search for the persons who tried to derail the Chicago-to-Montreal Maple Leaf Flyer Saturday.

There were rumors that officers had a definite lead on those responsible for placing a 1,000 pound rail across Grand Trunk Western tracks near the village of Scotts, in an apparent sabotage attempt.

But Sheriff Otto K. Butler said "We have no tangible clues. We are extending the investigation to include not only the immediate area but surrounding counties as well."

Editorially Sportswriter Fumbles Ball

When the MSC-Michigan football game is played next Nov. 14 there are bound to be some tricky plays involving a "hidden ball" but Detroit has come up with a sports-writer who could give some pointers to Biggie Munn and Bennie Osterbaan.

This sportswriter, who usually can qualify for the title: "Wolverine's Best Fan—Right or Wrong," has reached new heights in baffling people. He doesn't practice sleight-of-hand with a pigskin—he uses football stadiums!

Writing the big sports story for his paper yesterday, this writer stated: "In a bold move the University of Michigan wants to give away its vast stadium, so that 45,467 additional football followers can see the traditional game in November with Michigan State."

He claims that Michigan's athletic director, Fritz Crisler, put forth the proposal that the Wolverines turn over their huge stadium to MSC. Under the plan, State would act as the home team, handle tickets, set prices, and take over the administration of the contest.

There's one catch to our Detroit friend's little day-dream. According to Associated Press reports, Mr. Crisler says, "I'VE MADE NO PROPOSAL AND I DON'T INTEND TO."

He said he merely was asked what his feeling was on an idea like that and he said "fine."

Ralph Young, MSC's athletic director, frowned on the idea.

Said Young, "We wouldn't be disposed to surrender the best game in our schedule any more than Michigan would. The game is played for the benefit of the students. Every time they have to go to Ann Arbor it costs them more money. This puts the dollar sign on the game and we're supposed to be trying to get away from that."

But this wasn't the fumble by our confusing sportswriter. He told of estimates that placed the number of tickets for public sale at 10,000 if the game is played at Macklin Field.

His reasoning for this is that Michigan has 18,500 holders of activity books while State has 13,500 such admission books. If, he says, Michigan's 18,500 and MSC's 13,500 all decided to see the game, the combined 32,000 would take up roughly 60 percent of the stadium.

We don't know where he gets his information but he could use a change of sources. Any student at Michigan State could tell him that students, faculty and employees of the visiting school are considered as "general public." Activity books mean nothing for this game.

He might ask any student at MSC who has paid full admission price at Ann Arbor for the past two years. Or he might ask any State student who couldn't obtain a ticket to the game because of the limited supply allotted to MSC in '51 and '52.

Ralph Young says the game will be played in East Lansing. Fritz Crisler agrees with that arrangement. When Nov. 14 rolls around, more than 50,000 people will be cheering their team—in Macklin Field. The atom bomb crater in which Michigan plays its games will be as empty as an election promise.

And our Detroit sportswriter? Oh, he will probably spend the afternoon figuring out a plan for Michigan and Michigan State to trade football teams.

Editorially Draft Deferments

Freshmen next fall will have to stay "on the ball" so hastily if Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey has his way.

Hershey, in an attempt to boost the supply of draft eligible men, has announced that he will ask President Eisenhower to make deferment requirements tougher.

Not only does he want to crack down on men with college deferments—he doesn't want to go through Congress to do it but will ask for an executive order from the President.

Under the system Hershey is requesting, freshmen must be in the top quarter of their class scholastically, instead of the upper half in order to be exempted. He claims that 1,000,000 to 1,200,000 college men could be drafted under stricter deferment rules.

Fathers will also feel the pinch of the proposed change, says Hershey. He would end deferments for men who become fathers while in school under an educational deferment and they seek a second deferment after graduation on the grounds of dependency.

It will be interesting to see if Hershey will meet any resistance to the plan from Dr. Hannah, who, as assistant secretary of defense, is in charge of manpower. Dr. Hannah has been in favor of deferments for college men in the past.

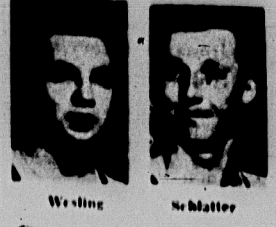

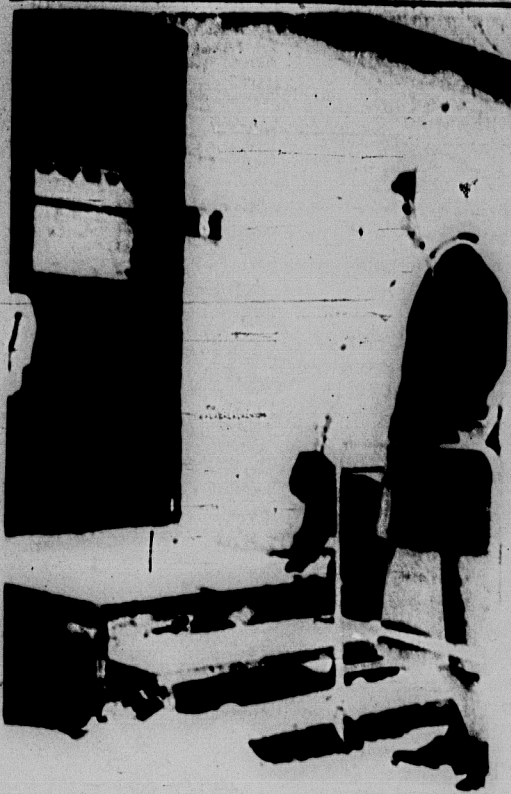

Former Patient Joins Moms' Polio March

Mrs. Gary Heymann, wife of a Michigan State College psychology graduate assistant, has joined the "Mothers March on Polio" despite handicap.

Using a "walker," because her legs aren't strong enough to hold her up, Mrs. Heymann has organized 120 women to canvass housing units on the college campus.

Their unit is one of many that will "march" between 7 and 8 p.m. on Thursday in Lansing, East Lansing and other Ingham county communities to raise funds to further the fight against polio.

Mrs. Heymann and more than 4,000 other women will "hit the sidewalks" in an effort to raise more than \$35,000, according to Mrs. Harold Cutler, general chairman of the march.

In a small way, Mrs. Heymann feels that her part in the effort is a "payment" on the debt she owes the Ingham county chapter for aid given her when she was stricken with polio in November 1951.

For five months, Mrs. Heymann recalls, she was a patient at the east unit of Edward W. Sparrow hospital. It had been a resident of East Lansing for only three months but that didn't make any difference to the polio ravager. It came to her and lingered, and today she walks the paths with the crutches.

Perch lights are few and far between in the quonset and trailer areas on the campus, causing Mrs. Heymann to urge giving of a white cloth around the door knob at each home which wishes to contribute as the "Mothers March." Lighted candles were taped out because they constitute a dangerous fire hazard, she said.

Through her husband and the march, Mrs. Heymann said, she has received more than \$10,000 in contributions. She has also been named as a recipient of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for help of Ingham county.

(Continued from Page 1) weapon" by the House Un-American Activities 1951 report. Communist front groups have collected \$50 million from non-Communists, Philbrick said.

Philbrick was elected treasurer of the Massachusetts American Youth for Democracy group, and said it was the most successful front group the party ever organized. He estimated that 90 per cent of its members in Massachusetts were non-Communists.

An unsuccessful attempt was made at Michigan State College in 1947 to organize an A.Y.D. group on campus.

After going through a training period, Philbrick was asked to drop his membership in the party in 1947 for a short period. He was then promoted to the elite Pro-4 group of the party, a high level organization that operated in secrecy from the rest of the Communist Party.

Pro-4 is made up of 2,000 professional men, including college professors, Philbrick said. He termed it the "most dangerous Communist group."
