Russia Accuses U.S., Britain of Violations

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—Yugoslavia called urgently Monday for direct talks with the United States, Britain and Italy on the Balkan powder-keg issue of Trieste and notified the United Nations a threat to peace exists in that strategic North Adriatic peninsula.

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# Russia Offers Surprise Plan

Russia Monday came up with a new package plan under which she would support the admission of Italy and Finland to the U.N. if three Soviet satellites—Romania, Hungary and Bulgaria—also were admitted.

The surprise proposal was made by Soviet Delegate Jacob A. Malik in the General Assembly's 90-nation Special Political Committee which is seeking to break the log jam on the admission of new members.

It was not immediately clear what the new stand means. Gov. James Byrnes of South Carolina, U. S. delegate on the committee, told a reporter:

"I just thought it on the fly. I don't know why they should do that for me, and I think it is a very good idea."

Until now, the Soviet bloc has backed a package deal to admit 14 new members to the five permanent seats of the Security Council. The package includes Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Finland, Greece, and Turkey. The Western Powers want each case considered on its merits.

The United States and its 16 Korean War Allies earlier Monday night offered to meet with Communist representatives at Paganan Oct. 30 to agree on a line and plan for a Korean peace conference.

A formal note to the Chinese Communist government said the representatives would discuss the makeup of the peace conference only "on the present condition" with a U. N. Assembly resolution being worked.

The "C. N." stand appeared to rule out Communist demands that India, Indonesia, Burma, Pakistan and Russia be given seats at the conference table as "neutrals."

# Bids Due On Library Next Month

Plans and specifications for the new library are in the hands of the bidders, according to information released Monday by Secretary Karl McDonel.

Written into the specifications are a "graduated" list of alterations and modifications designed so contractors may estimate how nearly they can follow the original \$5,473,000 plans and still remain within the four million dollars appropriation of the state legislature.

Secretary McDonel said it is expected that the bids will be returned in time to present them at the regular meeting of the State Board of Agriculture in November.

An outlay of one million dollars has already been provided to cover the costs of initial construction.

O'Connell, Hall and the woman were held by Lt. Louis Shoulters of the St. Louis police after a tip from taxi driver John Hager that Hall was on a speeding spree and was armed.

A mechanical pencil of a type known to have been carried by Bobby was found at the spot of the kidnap. It was one advertised by an advertising agency operated by Robert C. Greenhouse Sr., 71-year-old father of the boy.

One phase of the case still unsolved is what happened to some \$300,000 of missing ransom money. More than \$250,000 of the money, in \$10 and \$20 bills, was in the apartment-hotel room where Hall was seized.

Hall has maintained he was drunk and under the influence of morphine after his arrival here and that he must have lost a suitcase full of money.
