Transmission Suffers Second Blaze Since August

DIT 47—Fire struck Sunday night at General Motors automatic transmission division at Willow Run, where moved only a few weeks ago after a multimillion dollar leveled GM's Livonia transmission plant.

Within an hour after first reports, plant protection men told State Police the blaze had been brought under control.

State Police said they had reports, however, that one employee was hospitalized and three given first aid.

Explosion of cyanide tanks in the heat-treating department was said to have caused the fire. Water was sprayed on them when they overheated.

The plant is some 30 miles west of Detroit.

General Motors had leased a large area of the Willow Run plant and rushed machinery there to resume production of its hydraulic transmissions.

Estimates of loss from the Livonia fire Aug. 12 ranged from \$30 to \$60 million dollars.

That costly blaze, which took several lives, interrupted production of lines of GM cars and also at Packard and the Ford Lincoln-Mercury Division.

The transmission operation was rushed to the Willow Run plant, while the Livonia plant was being rebuilt. In the meantime cars using hydraulic transmissions were equipped with transmissions manufactured for other GM model cars.

Only a few days of GM production, however, that transmission coming out of the Willow Run assembly line.

Lab Fire Causes \$7,000 Damage to Hort Building

College Officials Seek Cause of Friday Blaze

Only cracked plaster, charred walls, and 25 inconvenienced students bear testimony today of a \$7,000 fire of undetermined origin which burned itself out in a large ground floor lab in the Horticulture Building early Friday morning.

A \$500 plant dehydrator was destroyed and \$6,000 worth of building and other equipment damaged by the time a college maintenance man discovered the fire at 6:30 a. m. Friday.

The lab, located directly under the Horticulture Auditorium, is in the southeast corner of the building, a spot inaccessible to passing patrol cars.

The fire did not spread to any other parts of the five-story building.

Twenty-five graduate and undergraduate students use the auditorium as a reading room. It cannot be cleared out satisfactorily within the next few days. Three students will be in the auditorium, according to Prof. C. L. Bedford, in charge of that section.

Damage to delicate scientific machinery is credited for stopping the damage. Prof. Bedford said Sunday he will begin today or Tuesday to contact the two firms concerned with supplying the four damaged pieces.

Replastering work also was begun on the damaged area.

No records were lost in the fire, he said.

Prof. H. D. Tukey, head of the horticulture department, was in Philadelphia and did not know of the fire until Sunday. By that time most of the debris had been cleared away.

"It was just like a fire in a furnace," he said. "If it had been one of those buildings that wasn't insured it would have been gone."

No definite cause has been attributed for the blaze, but the Fire Department inspectors estimated that the dehydrator may have been left on during the night, causing the heat to spread to nearby materials. Cardboard boxes on top of the machine were turned to ashes.

The clock in the room had stopped at 6:27 a. m. and officials estimated the fire had started about an hour before.

Intense heat caused plaster to peel from the walls and scorch the outer south wall of the building above the windows.

The fire damage will not disrupt a horticultural therapy conference set to begin here Tuesday.

Ford Offers Fellowships To Seniors

Foundation Aid Given For Overseas Study

Seniors who are looking for travel and adventure in foreign countries may apply for a Ford Foundation graduate fellowship.

The awards last for one to three years, and the applicant's qualifications, experience and individual program determine the amount given. The foundation also will consider granting limited funds to allow the applicant's immediate family to join him.

Interested students should accompany their applications with a description of their proposed plans of study or research, which may involve work in the U. S. or abroad. It is not necessary to limit the plan to one college or institution and the program may include traveling. The foundation prefers, however, that the applicant have some knowledge of the language involved.

Included in the application should be the purpose of study, the institutions or groups, if any, with which the student hopes to be associated, travel requirements, the relationship of the plans to his intended life work, and an appraisal of his qualifications and proposed plan from five references of his own choice.

Applications may be obtained from the Ford Foundation Board on Overseas Training and Research, 575 Madison Ave., New York 22, N. Y., and should be returned by Jan. 8, 1954.

Editorially

Peace Pow-Wow at Ann Arbor

Inter-collegiate athletic rivalries are like political campaigns. They can be lively and wholesome, or they can degenerate into mud-slinging, damaging demonstrations of hard feeling.

Today, heads of a few of the better-known campus organizations will meet in Ann Arbor with their counterparts from the University. Discussion will be centered on prevention of ill-will in the MSC-U of M rivalry.

In connection with this, we quote from a recent editorial by Virginia Voss, editorial director of the Michigan Daily. Quoting the letter from Ann Arbor published in the State News Oct. 30, which suggested MSC might put more emphasis on education and less on football, Miss Voss said, in part:

"In view of the profuse objections which poured into The Daily office . . . and quite aside from the obviously puerile tone of the Durr-Thorner (writers' names) sound-off, a few explanations need to be made.

"A check with the Office of Student Affairs showed that Arthur Durr and Wayne Thorner are not registered students. The city informed us that 428 N. Ingalls, which Durr and Thorner gave as their address, is non-existent. This leaves endless room for speculation as to who the letter writers actually were. They could be University students who made their irresponsibility apparent in using pseudonyms; they may be Ann Arborites with misguided sympathies toward the resident University; they may be just any irresponsible, misguided persons at all.

"Letters of this type come up often and are shrugged off almost as often—witness past Daily letters on the MSC-Michigan rivalry. We have only one journalistic objection to State's action on this matter: the identity of letter writers who represent themselves as University students should be checked with this campus before publication.

"It seems superficial to point out that opinions of the Durr-Thorner nature are not to be taken as representative of the campus as a whole, just as letters from the MSC end are not to be read as typical of State's attitudes. But it might be an opportune time to note that the business of extending MSC-Michigan rivalry to ribaldry on either side has long since become tedious."

Today we'll see what we can do in the constructive movement to keep a keen rivalry from the point of ribaldry.

Letter To The Editor: Critic Fears Result of Kirk Action

To the Editor:

I think that I may say that one more feeble finger pointed towards scholastic degeneration won't provoke too many. There are a few remarks, and then I'll slide back into obscurity and, to remain congruous with my education, mediocrity.

First, I congratulate the State News and editors for keeping the Kirk debate open. They represent the newspaper spirit in true form. The variety of letters has proven interesting, especially when I note that none of them defend our present day education.

Would it be unreasonable to suggest that those who favor our recent changes lack the courage of their convictions?

Secondly, I hope that none of our professors in the field of Liberal Arts follow Dr. Kirk's example. On the other hand, such an act might only carry the equivalent impact of the loss of a pony backfield or perhaps a ticket to the "Greatest Show on Earth." I admire the man for his principles, but fear the results of his actions.

And last, just a question: Has anyone bothered to compare the intellectual merits of the old Literature and Fine Arts syllabus with the new Humanities syllabus?

By the way, this is the purpose of the letter: It is my belief that the new substitute for the Literature and Fine Arts in the Basic College provides nothing but an accelerated, abbreviated picture of the world, past and present.

In 150 minutes a week, it is their modest proposal to educate the student in history and its aesthetic documents. The Kirk incident merely brought about this thought.

'Rent Reasonable'

Couples Laud New Housing

The new married housing apartments, even at twice the rental of the now defunct college trailers, have received hearty endorsement from students after a week's occupancy. Reasonable rents, efficiently arranged units and convenient furnishings were the most mentioned favorable features.

"To people who haven't looked for an apartment, the rent may seem high," said Allan Wasserman, first man to move in Nov. 1, "but you can't get much in Lansing for \$75. We've looked for an apartment and this is very reasonable."

The partly furnished three-room apartment, rent at \$60 monthly, compared with about \$10 for the unfurnished college-operated barracks apartments of the same size.

Comparing rental with Lansing and East Lansing apartments, graduate student Charlie Wunderlich said, "Relatively speaking I don't think it's at all bad."

Nobody did a lot of planning," Thomas Brauchamp said, commenting on the neutral finishing which permit varying colors and accessory styles. Each apartment is equipped with basic furniture, but students must provide smaller items.

Brauchamp, a two-time veteran who served just after World War II and again during the Korean War, graduated from MSC in 1951. Getting prerequisites now for medical school, he said the inclusion of heavier furnishings is especially convenient for him because he will have to move to medical school in a year.

"It gives us some chance to decorate on our own, instead of having it 100-per-cent done," he explained. "There's some chance for individuality."

The three new 18-apartment buildings are being constructed on an experimental basis to provide information for a proposed expanded development. One building will have unfurnished apartments renting at \$61.50. Each student will be asked to make comments on how to improve the units.

Only minor criticisms on both of built-in closets and no sliding doors above the closets were expressed. All couples thought the apartments were efficiently arranged and spacious enough to accommodate a family of three.

A college regulation prohibits students with more than one child from being assigned any of the new three-room units. Any couple with a child is required to take a first-floor apartment.

The three buildings in the project are located around a central court providing parking space for automobiles. The entrance is from Kalamazoo St. just west of Harrison Road.

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Statistics Show Well for Bolden May Total Largest Rushing Yardage Since Grandelius

Little LeRoy Bolden is well on his way to becoming the biggest Spartan ground gainer since 1950.

The pint-sized Flint speedster, who scored three touchdowns for the second time this season in Saturday's 28-13 conquest over Ohio State, has surpassed his yardage production of last season when he ranked third behind Billy Wells and 1952 Capt. Don McAuliffe.

Every Spartan offensive record in the books is contained in the span from 1945 through 1950. And the most glittering statistic so far is ground gaining in consecutive games from the 1950 season.

That's the year All-American Everett (Sonny) Grandelius was running wild, and Spartan backs will probably be shooting at his records for some time to come.

Grandelius ran for 1,023 yards that season, a performance which was climaxed when the Muskegon halfback ran 184 yards against Oregon State for another record. Grandelius also holds the mark for rushing attempts with 163 over the course of the 1950 schedule.

Another All-American, Lynn Grandelius, holds the mark for total rushing yardage during a career. Grandelius, playing four seasons from 1946 through 1949, racked up 3,100 yards.

National TV Set for Final Big 10 Tilt

Michigan Makes Fifth Mackin Trip

Michigan State will get its last crack at Big 10 football competition for the year next Saturday, when it plays host to its traditional rival, Michigan, in a nationally televised game.

The contest will be played at Spartan Field for the first time since 1948, when the Wolverines beat the Spartans, 13-7, at the old Spartan stadium, which was dedicated. It's only the fifth time in the long, colorful series between the two schools that the game has been played in East Lansing.

Coach Elgie Mann's Spartans playing game number eight of their "Big Game 1951" series, will be running for a fourth straight victory over a Michigan team. Beating the Wolverines four-in-a-row is a feat compiled by Michigan State only once. Charlie Bachman's team of 1924-25-26-27, turned the trick.

The string of Spartan successes began in 1950 when an aroused band of green-shirted athletes upset favored Michigan, 14-7. The following year, State scored its most decisive win of the series, taking a 25-0 decision.

Last year, Michigan State rebounded to exact a 13-0 Wolverine lead to rack up a 27-23 victory and start the count off on its national championship trail.

Over the years, however, Michigan has enjoyed a wide edge in the play between the two schools. In previous encounters, dating back to 1898, Michigan has won 23 times, the Spartans have won nine times and three games have ended in ties.
