Michigan Returns to Franklin Saturday

Wolverines Visit State After Lapte

East Lansing, Mich., Nov. 12 (AP)—

Years have elapsed by Michigan finally invaded Stadium again. Since 1948, the dedication of enlarged Franklin stadium, has the Maize and Blue to the 63-mile bus from Ann Arbor to East Lansing—and the wolverines almost stayed at home year, too.

But the bid to play the Michigan State-Nichols game at the stadium of Michigan was not the only thing that drew the wolverines to the Green and White as a host.

Each Biggie Munn hopes to see a Spartan back as far as Michigan at home is concerned. Michigan State has never lost to the Wolverines at home, and the first home game State the two squads fought

Bill Kress, who has kept the Spartan tradition for consistent backfields in a single-wing attack, ranked sixth in offense in the Big 10 last year and is counted on to lead things Saturday.

Michigan State has been busy the week trying to gird defense against the sloshing of Kress and the pin-pointing of McDonald.

Although McDonald is rated the Wolverine tower, Len Baldwin sophomore has been running fast-string backfield throughout the season.

The KOLEMINE Newell Neglects Towel In Speaking of Season

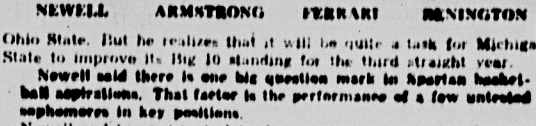
PETE NEWELL WASN'T USING his famous towel. There was no tension—calmness prevailed. With the opening game less than a month away, the Spartan basketball coach was optimistic. "We'll have a better team," Newell said simply.

He wasn't just hoping. Newell boasts nine lettermen—including all five starters—from last season's outfit which tied for third with Minnesota.

Now in his fourth year at the Spartan cage helm, the former Los Angeles Loyola star has made amazing progress. MSC's cages finished seventh in the Big 10 during the 1950-51 campaign. Newell's first here, but pulled up to fifth for the 1951-52 season and finally to the third-place tie last winter.

It was on the subject of the Western Conference that Newell tempered his optimism. "The Big 10 will be tougher," he warned. Indiana, No. 1 team in the nation last season, and Illinois headed the Spartans in the conference. The cages had undisputed third place all but sewed up when they were upset by Wisconsin in the final game of the season.

ACCORDING TO NEWELL, the Don Schluff-led Hoosiers and the Illini still will be right up there again this season. But he figures that four other teams will be serious contenders. In the group he includes the Spartans, Minnesota, Wisconsin and

Ohio State. But he realizes that it will be quite a task for Michigan State to improve its Big 10 standing for the third straight year. Newell said there is one big question mark in Spartan basketball aspirations. That factor is the performance of a few untouted sophomores in key positions.

Newell and his assistant, John Benington, have been holding practice sessions for almost five weeks. Benington has been busy putting down a freshman turnout of more than 100 players.

LEADING THE RETURNERS IS All Big 10 forward, Al Ferrari, who broke the Michigan State season's scoring mark with 351 points as a sophomore last year. According to Newell, the Brooklyn junior has developed a better set shot and is the hardest worker on the team.

Two juniors who reach the 6'8" mark, Bob Armstrong and Bob McCullough, are battling for the center spot. Armstrong, who held down the position last year, has the inside track, but McCullough is still in the race. Another contender is Duane Peterson, 6'7" sophomore from Elkhart, Ind.

Newell said that Armstrong had shown improvement in two departments—both important. He pointed out that Armstrong never played the post previous to last season and that his rebounding has improved steadily, along with his hook shot.

Vying for the forward position opposite Ferrari are several players. DeNeal Hartman, 6'4" senior from Ft. Wayne, Ind., has been making a serious drive and was termed by Newell as the most improved player in spring practice.

ONE OF NEWELL'S SOPHOMES is also in the running for a forward slot. Julius McCoy, who stands 6'11" and hails from Farrel, Pa., holds a very definite place in the 1953-54 cage spotlight.

McCoy led the freshman squad in scoring last season after one of the greatest high school careers a Spartan eager has brought to MSC. Newell says McCoy has the potential to become a top-notch Big 10 performer.

According to Newell, McCoy has the best variety of shots of any player on the team. "His speed and shooting ability should give us increased scoring," Newell said.

Other contenders for a forward position are Duane Olson, 6'5" Detroit sophomore, Paul Hinkin, 6'4" Saginaw senior and Jimmy Harris, 6'3" Ft. Wayne, Ind. junior.

KEITH STACKHOUSE, A STARTER at forward last season, has been shifted to guard. A 6'11" Plymouth senior, Stackhouse has a lot of experience and has a good set shot from outside.

Little Rickie Ayala, 5'7" Brooklyn senior, has long been the sparkplug of the team and he's back for another year. Also trying for guard positions are 5'11" Jim Schlatler, a Ft. Wayne, Ind. senior and Bob Devaney, 5'10" Philadelphia junior.

Other guard candidates are sophomores Jimmy Raymond and Walt Goffrey and junior Ben Corbett.

Newell said that he hopes to have a JV squad this year along with the usual freshman team. Forming the nucleus of the proposed JV squad will be Bill Hillmeyer, Dan Morrissey, Bill Werner, Harry Koustic and Dave Rasper.

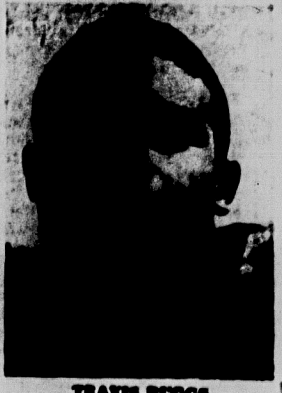
Speed Aids Buggs on Gridiron

Whether he's running the 100-yard dash on a cinder track or down a 600-foot-long football field, Travis Buggs, Spartan right halfback, has got speed.

The 185-pound halfback was outstanding in freeman work last winter. Buggs participated in the 60-yard dash event.

And speed is no handicap on the football field, either. Buggs would be one of the first to tell you that it not only helps him in running plays but also in line backs and option plays.

While attending Washington High in East Chicago, Ind., Buggs won the 100-yard dash in the Indiana state track meet in 1952, and also finished the 60-yard dash in the Hammond Invitational at

the University of Chicago in the record time of 6.3 seconds. Buggs played left halfback in high school and his conversion to right halfback in college presented a few problems, the 20-year-old sophomore revealed.

"Being righthanded, it was naturally easier for me to play the left halfback spot," Travis stated. "But Coach Steve Bets has helped me a lot to make the switch."

In practice, the 5'10" Buggs concentrates on punning and works quite a bit on his blocking.

The limited substitution rule is not new to Buggs either as he played both offense and defense in high school where he won all-star honors in the Chicago Tribune, Herald-American, and Hammond Times.

According to Buggs, his big thrill so far this season was to make the key block which paved the way for Lefty Bolten's last touchdown against Minnesota. Travis plans to continue with

football and hopes to find a career in pro football after he graduates.

"My ambition is to play with the San Francisco 49ers," Buggs declared. He added that he also likes the Los Angeles Rams.

Buggs stressed that if he does make the pro ranks, he wants only a short career followed by secondary teaching of industrial arts and physical education.

He is president of the concert band organization and his hobbies include hunting, fishing and auto mechanics.

At present Travis is enrolled in ROTC and he plans to continue. This may mean spending valuable time in the armed forces that could be used in pro football.

However, one cannot help thinking that Buggs, with his speed, will even give time a race for his money.

Brown and Prof. Louis B. Raynor have pieces in the Designer-Craftsman, U.S.A. 1963 exhibit in Brooklyn, N.Y., museum. Brown's entries in silver and ebony jewelry, and Raynor's entry in ceramics were chosen from among 3,000 entries after a regional show in Detroit.

Work by department staff members continues on display in the Union gallery from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. daily through Thursday. The bulk of the exhibition consists of drawings and paintings by Prof. Charles Pollock, Walter Grant Swartz, Prof. John Gellert, Prof. Allen Lopp, James H. McConnel, Prof. Katharine Winckler, Gamble and Church.

An exhibit, "Approaches to Drawing," is on display in the corridor of the Art Building, A-7 South Campus. Also here is a one-man exhibit of drawings by Pollock.

pointed question-and-answer changes before.

He responded to all of Brown's questions, as it turned out, though with extreme terseness at times.

"Do you think," was one of the questions, "the administration's action in virtually putting a label of traitor on a former President is likely to damage our foreign relations?"

Eisenhower said Brown with a steady glare and said (A) he rejected the premise that the administration had done anything, and (B) he would not answer the question.

Often as many as half-a-dozen reporters at a time stood up and asked for questions.

Eisenhower reddened at times. Once he sharply tapped the table in front of him as he emphasized that he's not going to tell Alty. Gen. Brown, who touched off the Truman-White affair in a Chicago speech last week, how to run his department.

After 18 minutes, the President had enough.
