## Our Lads, Johnny Standley Spark Pep Rally Festivities

Our Lads of "Istanbul" Johnny Standley with the "Book," will team up for a rhythm-packed pep rally tonight. The student government will sponsor the rally and its free Spartan Review of '53," featuring songs by Standley and the Four Lads.

The Lads will do "Down by the Riverside" and possibly their arrangement of the Fight Song, according to Micki McBride, one of the student government coordinators for the program.

Later both Standley and the Four Lads will present a full one-hour show at the Spartan Review in the Auditorium.

Judging of the "Battle of the Beards" and presentation of prizes will also highlight the rally.

Principal speaker will be President John A. Hannah, home for the weekend.

Biggie Munn and several sports writers and announcers will also address the rally group.

Emcee for the rally is George Guerra, former "Little Dynamo" on the Spartan football squad.

After the rally, the crowd will move into the Auditorium at about 9:30 or as soon as possible after a lecture scheduled there by Marguerite Higgins, former war correspondent, is completed.

The Review will open with selections by the MSC Men's Glee Club and will feature full shows

by Standley and the Four Lads. Tommy Aquino's band will entertain in a break between the headliners.

The Lads and Mandley will arrive in town late this afternoon, stay at Kelllogg Center tonight and attend the game tomorrow.

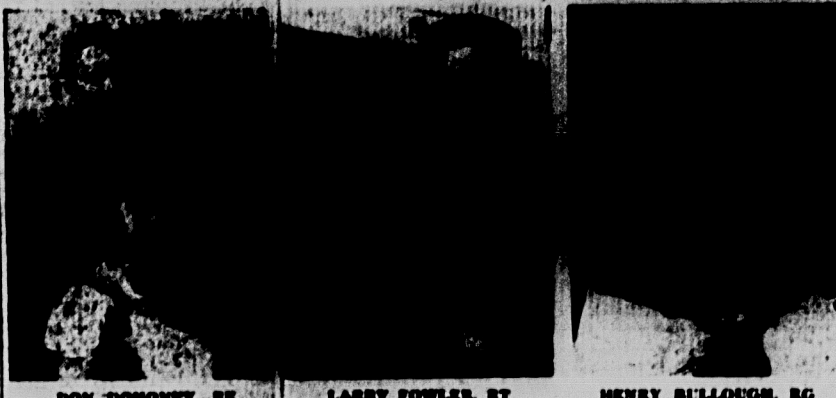
They will dine tonight at the training table with the team. Standley, who has been traveling with Horace Heidt's show, is famed for his recording of "It's in the Book," highest-selling novelty record of 1952 with over 3,000,000 copies.

A one-time drummer who comes from a vaudeville family, Standley appeared recently at the Bar of Music in Hollywood.

The Four Lads, Bernie Torsini, Jimmy Arnold, Connie Corlani and Frankie Passer, became popular in the midst of the Johnnie Ray craze.

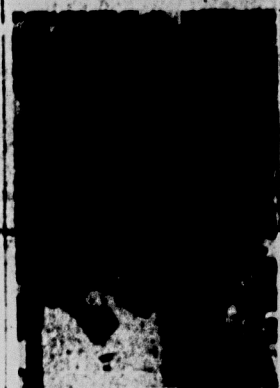

## Overflow Crowd Assured for Tilt TV Cameras to Record 46th Contest in Ancient Rivalry

The state's two titanic gridiron powers, Michigan and Michigan State, will battle on Macklin Stadium turf Saturday afternoon in the 46th struggle of a 55-year rivalry.

An overflow throng of more than 52,000 is assured, while an estimated 60,000,000 people will see the contest on television as the NCAA's "Game of the Week" or hear it aired on one of 30 radio stations. Game time is 1:30 p.m. MSC contests are moved ahead a half-hour for all November opponents because of earlier darkness.

Captain Biggie Munn's Spartans, roused with severe injuries and illness, will enter the game as favorites for one of the few times since the contest started, way back in 1888.

Since that time, the Wolverines have amassed an impressive dominance, winning 28 contests while losing only nine. Three times, the two teams have fought to a tie. Michigan will be at a near physical peak for the contest. The recent return of Capt. Dick O'Shaughnessy at center and Art Walker at tackle has bolstered the Wolverine line considerably. Right half Tony Branoff was also pronounced ready to go Thursday after suffering minor injuries against Illinois last Saturday.

At the same time, Michigan State will be without the services of "bottin' right" halfback Billy Wells, who came down with pneumonia Sunday and may be finished for the season. Bert Zagers will perform in the pony backfield in place of Wells.

Also on the sidelines will be Randy Schrock, front-line tackle who re-injured a knee before the Ohio State game, and Carl Stover, reserve sophomore end who is out with a fractured rib. Schrock is through for the season, according to Dr. James Feurig, team physician.

On the doubtful list is speedy end Ellis Durbett, who is still hobbling around on an injured ankle which has bothered him for several games. Big Bill Quinlan will start at the left end position vacated by Durbett before the Ohio State contest.

Jim Jebb, 187-pound Grand Rapids senior, will replace Schrock at the starting left tackle position as against Ohio State.

Captain Biggie Munn and his staff probably will select the same lineup that has started all season. This group includes Bob Tapp and Gene Hamilton at ends, Dick Schrock and Jim Shing at tackles, Don Dugger and Bob Bates at guards and John Shover at center.

Calling the signals in the Wolverine backfield will be either big Lou Baddari or Flint's Duncan McDonald, serial wizard who will certainly be inserted into the lineup if Coach Bruce Osterman decides to throw an all-out passing attack at the Spartans.

At the halves will be the durable Branoff, leading rusher on the squad with a 4.9 yard average on 70 carries, and serving leader Ted Evans. Dick Baddari is the likely starter at fullback.

Michigan State, second place in the Big 10 with a 4-1 record, needs a victory to retain any glimmer of hope of a conference championship in the first year of graduation competition.

Games only by Purdue this season, the Spartans have won 15 games and have won 10 of the last 25 contests over a non-league grid.

The Wolverines could be headed for one of their worst seasons in years, but will hold a 1-0 lead over Michigan State.

## Who Pays For New Trophy?

Assistant Says Governor Will

Spartans were wondering Thursday who is going to foot the bill for the trophy Gov. Williams said he will present to the winner of the Michigan-Michigan State football game Saturday. The AP reported Thursday two different sources said friends and alumni of the two schools have been invited to share the cost with the governor.

But Frank Blackford administrative assistant to the governor, said Williams is paying for the trophy "out of his own pocket."

William A. Present, Lansing jeweler, said the trophy was ordered through him by the governor.

He said the trophy, a hand-carved statue of Paul Bunyan will stand eight feet high, including the pedestal, and will cost about \$1,500.

Present said the governor "asked me to raise a certain sum in Lansing toward the cost of the trophy and said that some of his friends in Ann Arbor would also contribute."

"The governor plans to contribute too," Present said.

George Guerra, former MSC football star and president of the Central Michigan MSG Alumni Club, said it had been suggested that both the University and Michigan State alumni would split the cost with the governor also contributing personally.

Guerra said he understood Ann Arbor alumni had raised about \$500 but that he did not know whether the MSC alumni "can go that far."

He said the MSC group will decide Friday whether to contribute. Officials agreed the trophy is expected Friday by special express shipment.

Blackford said the trophy would be presented before the usual spring-game operations.

He said it could not be presented at last year because of the state's financial condition during the last club season.

Blackford denied rumors that the governor's office had approached the University to ask a special dividend for the trophy.

Present said he understood the trophy was ordered through him by the governor.

Measuring of quantity and appearance of quality by judges Arthur Raymond, Homecoming King, Pat Yaroch, State News editor, and Mary Ellen Weigle, head of AWS Activities Board, will take place in the Union.

No winners will be announced before the group moves to the pep rally, and all contestants will appear on the stage at the rally.

To the winning living unit will go a trophy consisting of a brown glass shaving mug.

The winning team will get an evening of sweaters and slacks, free dinners and free haircuts and shaves. All of the prizes, except the shaving mug, were donated by Kent State students.

## Speaks in Union Kline Raps Farm Price Information

Misinformation about farm price supports was hit in a speech by Allan B. Kline, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, before about 600 delegates to the Michigan Farm Bureau's 34th annual convention at a banquet in the Union Thursday night.

Delivering the major address of the evening, Kline said the present agricultural situation is posing real problems in the price support program.

President John A. Hannah, home for the Michigan game weekend, gave a welcome address to the delegates after Kline spoke first in order to make plane connections.

Dr. Hannah spoke on the origins of MSC, its leadership in state agricultural affairs as a land-grant college and the need for organization of American agriculture.

Asked by Clark L. Brody, vice president of the Michigan Farm Bureau and member of the State Board of Agriculture, to comment on his work in the Defense Department, Dr. Hannah said that continued high draft requirements were "the cost of world leadership," and that "there isn't any alternative" to maintain our strength.

Meanwhile, in Washington an all-Republican Senate inquiry committee took a swift 40-minute look at the "spy" case at a jam-packed televised hearing Thursday.

At the end, Chairman Jenner (R-Ind.) said he was convinced that former President Truman received FBI reports linking White to a Soviet espionage ring in 1946.

But Sen. Hendrickson (R-N.J.), who sat with Jenner at the two-man inquiry, took a somewhat different view.

Asked if he thought the record proved Truman had seen the FBI reports on White, Hendrickson told newsmen:

"Only by implication, I am not completely convinced we have the whole story. It's a pretty strong record, but I want to be fair about it."

"I would like to hear from Truman's own lips whether he saw those reports."

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## Annual Campaign Campus Fund Drive To Begin Monday

The yearly campaign is the only student fund drive for charitable organizations. Money is raised through Solicitations Day, the U-Test Man on Campus contest, a student faculty auction, and Sparta-tacade.

Fifteen per cent of 1953 allocations will go to the American Cancer Fund for the support of cancer detection units, free medical examinations, and transportation of cancer patients.

A second 15 per cent will be distributed to the Lansing and national headquarters of the Infants Paralysis Fund to aid polio patients.

Also, receiving 15 per cent each will be the American Heart Association and the Tuberculosis Fund to continue research and educational programs.

Campus organizations allocated funds are Spartan Nursery, 15 per cent and the MSC Student Loan Fund, 5 per cent.

Ten per cent each will be donated to the World Student Service Fund, which provides books, medical aid, housing, and educational facilities to needy students in 18 countries, and to the Negro Scholarship Fund.

Michigan was tromped, 19-3, last weekend by the rampaging Vikings. Minnesota blanked the Wolverines, 22-0, earlier in the season as Paul Giel put on a one-man offensive performance.

Big 10 wins have come from Iowa, 14-13, and Northwestern by a 20-13 count. The Spartans conquered Minnesota, 21-0, and rolled to a 21-7 victory over the Hawkeyes.

Spartan fans still carry faint hopes that Illinois will lose one of its two remaining Big 10 games and throw the conference race into a deadlock. A Michigan victory would snuff out even those hopes.

Michigan State has beaten the Wolverines three straight times and will be out for its fourth straight, a feat accomplished only once before in the long rivalry.

Biggie Hopes to Repay  
Score No. 55 to Wolves

**DIGGIE MUMM HAS AN OLD SCORE** to settle Saturday—and that answers to the digits of 55-0.

As far as Mumm is concerned, that No. 55 is still embroiled in Old English on his back. Neither he nor Michigan will ever forget the occasion.

It was back in 1947 and the Spartans were playing the Wolverines—at Ann Arbor on our usual. Mumm was of the Spartans team for the first time in the nation's capital.

The Spartans were lucky to escape with their uniforms. Michigan rolled, and rolled, and rolled some more. Fifty-five points were on the scoreboard for the Wolves when the game was over. MSC had none.

Mumm's 1948 squad narrowed the count, but still lost, 15-7, in the dedication of a rebuilt Macklin Stadium. Moving back to Ann Arbor in 1949, the Spartans were whipped, 7-3. That was the last time Michigan won, however.

**IN 1950, IT WAS 14-7 FOR STATE.** The Wolves were blanked, 25-0, in 1951 for the worst defeat ever suffered by Michigan at the hands of the Spartans. Mumm's charges were forced to come from behind last season, but won again, 27-13. All three games were played in Ann Arbor.

"As far as I am concerned, this is the rubber game," Mumm told the Lansing Downtown Casino Club Wednesday. "We've each taken three shots I've been here and it's time to break the tie."

Mumm won't be satisfied with just breaking the tie, however. He'd like to massacre it. Just to counter that "55" in the record books with a large, two-digit number of his own.

**LEROY BOLDEN, RECENTLY DUBBED** the Flint Firecracker, has never failed to score against the Wolverines. Bolden tallied a touchdown in 1951's 25-0 victory and racked up a pair of TD's last year. He is one of the few players who received the chance to play four years of college ball. The freshman ban was lifted for one year during the 1951 season and slumped back on in 1952.

Billy Wells, confined to the college hospital with labor pneumonia, has encountered a lot of difficulty for Michigan contests. As a sophomore, he sat out the game with a hip injury. His only game against the Wolverines was last year, when he gave a sparkling running exhibition and scored the touchdowns that broke a 13-0 tie.

**FOR SEVERAL WOLVERINES,** the game will have a special meaning. Seventeen seniors will get their last crack at the Spartans, and they'd like to make it a good one.

Seven of those seniors were on the team that lost, 25-0, to State. An even dozen were around to take it on the chin last fall.

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## Harriers in Chicago for Defense of Big 10 Title

Three More Scheduled for Ten Days

**Spartans Attempt Repeat 'Grand'**

The Spartans are scheduled to make it three-for-three in Chicago as they defend their Big 10 title after their third trip to the city in as many tries since the Western Conference championship in 1951. Also, they are to retain the "Grand Slam" won last year — the NCAA title as well as the Big 10 title.

Schludeman has flown a team to the first of these title defenses the next 10 days. The Grand Slam is a distance honor also defended their ICAA title Monday at New York's Van Landt Park and the NCAA championship on the local scene Nov. 23.

Leading the squad in its quest to maintain its perfect record are the only two current Big 10 champions who have left from the team. They are John Cook, senior, and John G. Smith, sophomore, who were named All-Americans last year.

Only one other ran in last year's meet. He is Dick Campbell, Ill. senior, who led the Spartans in the 100-yard dash.

Ken Barr, Crown Point, Ind. senior, was ineligible last fall, ran in the 1951 conference championship, taking fifth place.

Two sophomores round out the Spartan running contingent. They are John Logan, Great Neck, N.Y., and Del Parker, Detroit.

Last of the squad, however, are three of last year's top 10 runners. They were the second, third, and seventh-place finishers in the 1952 Big 10 run. They are Jim Kopyoff, Moberly, Mo., and Wayne Scott, republican, Kopyoff and Walter have graduated, and Scott has left up his eligibility.

In last year's meet, the Spartans ran up one of the lowest totals in Big 10 history. They scored 28 points, just over the record set by Purdue in 1943.

Indiana, which finished second behind the Spartans last year, will have a strong effort and is considered a vital opponent by the Spartans.

Another strong contender is State's crown is Michigan, which did not enter a team in the meet. The Wolverines will be led by George Lynch and John G. Smith, as well as John Moulie, Gene Doney and Ron Wallingford help make it rough for MSC.

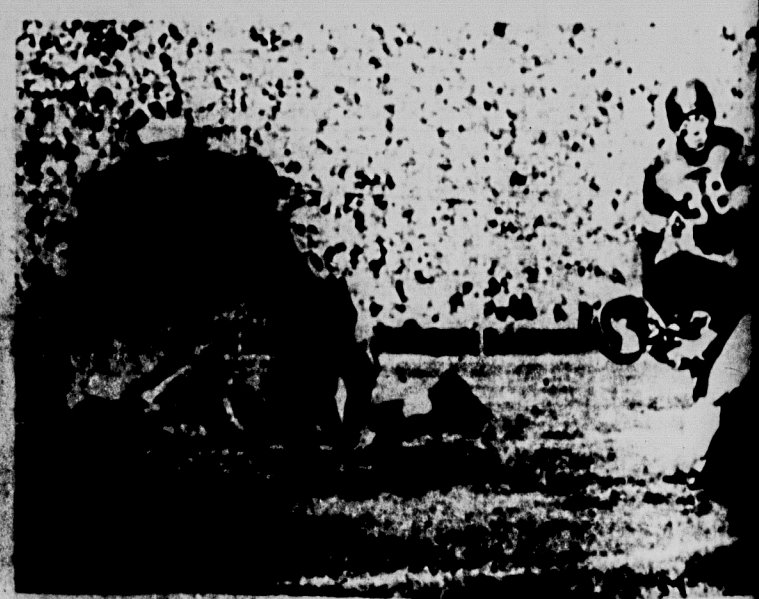
