First of all, each student here at MSC can dimeninate infor-motion to bis parents and others as to the most preasing needs of the school as it functions to serve all students. This setton would apply to building needs, budgetary needs, etc., as they

Full information on such needs is available to the students through the various media of communication located on the campus. This information is not always so readily available to persons By relaying the information to persons off the campus the in-

dividual student or group of students would be effectively dem-onstrating responsibility for the continuing improvement of the school, For example, when the need for a new library became of interest and concern to our student body, many of them organized to disseminate the necessary information about the situation and in no small measure contributed to the gaining of the funds neces-

The small measure contributed to the gaining of the funds need by to the construction of the new library. Each statemt can also contribute even though indirectly to the overall intellectual quality of this school by doing his shelf of mahing the difficult intellectual transition from "know-bedge" to "windom."

Most students come to possess a large amount of knowledge or information about things, but too few students carry out their part of the responsibility of making that information meaningful.

Meaning or understanding is shown by seeing relationships among various items of information, by applying the information to situa-tions as needed, by locating the central point or points in informative material, etc

ve material, etc. The instructor can ask that meaning be acquired and provide the means and opportunity to do no, but only the student can carry through the learning act to the point of meaning. This implies self-responsibility on the part of the learner, and is this self-responsibility which will contribute to the quality f learning by the individual student and throughout the school. Another student responsibility in relation to his school would be hat of maintaining and extending the atmosphere of friendliness, ourtess and thoughtfulness which is one of the outstanding char-

courtesy and thoughtfulness which is one of the outstanding characteristics of the MSC campus. In a superficial sense responsibility might be discharged merely by performing the

esponsibility might be discharged in a social courtexies. But the significance of this responsibility goes deeper than that. It means consciously scoking to become more tolerant of differences in others, to the end that difference is not taken to mean inferiority, and appreciation of persons as individuals is established, in consciously furthering programs, groups, etc., which

is established. It means consciously furthering programs, groups, etc., which operate to the benefit of all the students on worthwhile matters. It means thoughful consideration being given to the underlying purposes of higher education, such as intellectual development and integrity, moral self-responsibility and clvic-social leadership. With these responsibilities in mind and in action, each student can effectively contribute to the development of his school and to carrying out the basic theme of American Education Week, "Schools Are, Your Responsibility."
