Heart Attack Takes Life of Dr. Huggett

Dr. Albert J. Huggett, 56, professor of elementary education, died Dec. 23 of a heart attack at Sparrow Hospital.

Dr. Huggett, a specialist in the field of elementary education, wrote more than six books and 70 articles on the field of education.

He came here as an assistant professor in 1941 from Chicago Teachers College where he was in charge of student teaching and the graduate program.

Previously he had been school superintendent at Lake Orion and Novi, Mich. He was appointed to a full professorship two years ago.

No successor has been appointed.

Trip Loan Debts Due Next Week

Contributions netted in this county will help finance the national vaccination program in which one county from each of the 48 states will be a test area, Harris said.

Hannah's Absence Extended

Board of Ag Adds Six Months

Pres. John A. Hannah today was granted an additional six months leave of absence at the request of the Secretary of Defense C. E. Wilson. The action was taken at a meeting of the State Board of Agriculture, MSC governing body.

Dr. Hannah took a year's leave of absence in February, 1963, to serve as assistant secretary of defense in charge of manpower and personnel.

In a letter to Clark L. Brady, Board chairman, Secretary Wilson said:

"I want to take this opportunity to express the appreciation of President Eisenhower and myself for the action of the Board in granting a leave of absence to Dr. John A. Hannah, which has enabled him to accept his present post as Secretary of Defense."

"... I know that you are aware of our great concern regarding the proper utilization of manpower, both civilian and military, and of the tremendous problems we are faced with in this regard. At the present time the total personnel in the Department of Defense worldwide approximate five million men and women."

"During the coming session of Congress we expect to be faced with many legislative problems in this area and feel that Dr. Hannah's great ability, together with his knowledge and experience, makes it vital that he continue to head this office during their presentation to Congress, since he has directed the formulation of the policies and legislation which will be under consideration."

STUN cards will be available at all times in women's dorms. A box will be set up at the Union desk, Jan. 11, 12 and 13 to drop cards in.

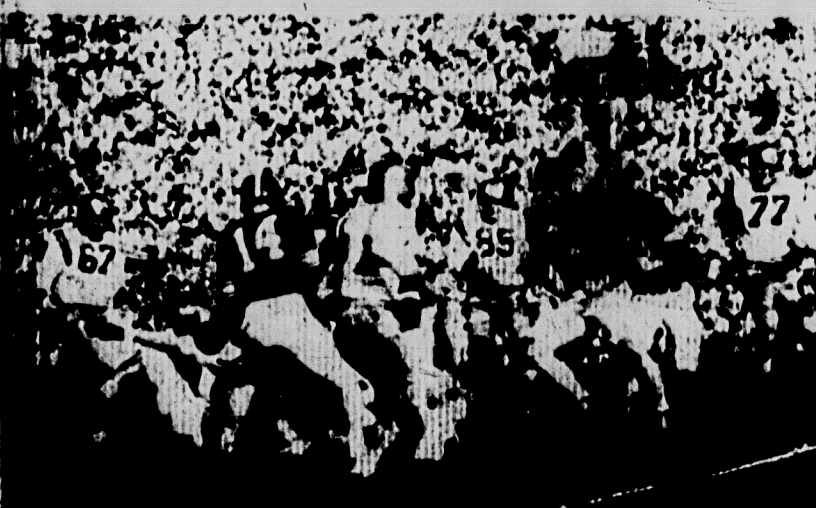

Spartans Find Full Calendar Rose Trail Tires Fans

Four nights sleeping on a train... long drives through the deserts... an hour stop in Las Vegas... shedding coats for the California weather... touring the suburbs of Los Angeles... a Big 10 dinner... and a luncheon... songs... waiting for the Rose Parade... crowds in the hotel... crowds at the parade... crowds at the Rose Bowl... all of these were jammed into the 10 or 11 days that the 1,800 MSC students spent on their trip by train and car to and from their time in the sunny land where they saw their team deal out one of the most amazing games in Rose Bowl history.

It was a long haul. It was an exhausting trip. But the Spartans made it in true Spartan fashion and seemed to love every minute of it.

From the time the two student trains pulled out on Dec. 26 to the time of return Monday night, activities flooded the students.

The train trip consisted of

student government, Union Board and the junior class, featured jam sessions, one-page newspapers, amateur shows, bridge tournaments and free bingo games, all highlighted by the scenery of the West that many of the students were seeing for the first and perhaps the last time.

The Green train stopped at Los Vegas, Nev., on the way out to the coast and the White train on the way back. The students tried their luck on the slot machines and from comment afterward, it seemed that no one suffered any major losses but all gained a lot of enjoyment.

When the 900 students traveling on the two trains hit Los Angeles on Dec. 28, they split up to stay at two hotels, the Roslyn and the Alexandria and the round of festivities got in full swing.

The Big 10 Alumni dinner was the highlight for the Tuesday night before the big game. Bob Hope, Bob Crosby and his Bobcats, and the Modernaires topped the entertainment list for the evening with the surprise visit of Debbie Reynolds stealing the show. Miss Reynolds "just came

over to sit with you," she told Billy Wells as he stood with his mouth hanging open with the shock of seeing his once casually mentioned dream come to.

The Spartan team got an extra chuckle out of Billy's stunned condition since they had been in on the plot for many weeks.

President John Hannah pointed out in his address of the evening that the Rose Bowl, although primarily an athletic function, served to bring together the great

schools of the nation and enumerated the services to mankind, in the line of contributions to the fields of medicine and social work of each of the Big 10 schools.

He also listed the luncheon held by the student government of UCLA on their campus at noon Tuesday for the MSC student leaders as another step in the right direction in placing the emphasis on education.

Many of the MSC students spent Tuesday on a bus trip to Tijuana, Mexico. The trip included a half-hour stop at the San Juan Capistrano Mission.

Wednesday morning found many of the students on another tour. This time they viewed Hollywood, Beverly Hills and Santa Monica. Wednesday night the UCLA Daily Bruin, college newspaper, held a party for the State News staffers.

New Year's Eve was a round of dancing and visiting famous clubs that had been merely names to many of the students. Movie stars, a common sight in Los Angeles, were spotted easily by the students and some coeds danced with a few of them.

Finally on New Year's Day the Spartan rosters dragged out of bed at 6 a.m. to catch 6:30 buses to the Rose Festival. More celebrities, including Hopalong Cassidy, Roy Rogers and Dale Evans were scattered along the parade of floats on the theme, "Roses in Flowers."

Michigan was represented in the parade with a "Water Wonders" float.

Marchers Rated High At Pasadena

Last Group Returns From Longest Trip

The MSC Marching Band received the last welcome home from the Rose Bowl Wednesday night when about 200 people met the train at the Grand Trunk depot.

For the Spartan team return Sunday night at the Lansing airport a turn out of approximately 10,000 was on hand. The Green and White student specials arrived Monday with more than 900 passengers.

The 120 marchers, plus 16 alternates and student members left Lansing, Dec. 26 in a 12-car special train sponsored by the Oldsmobile division of General Motors.

Fans' stop on the 6,000 mile trip was Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 27. The band gave an evening concert from the plaza of the railroad station.

Parade through the downtown areas of Oklahoma City, El Paso and Tucson filled the next two days, with the band arriving at Pasadena, Dec. 30. While in Pasadena the band stayed at Occidental College.

New Year's Day the band joined in the annual three-hour, six-mile long Tournament of Roses parade, following with pre-game and half-time activities in the Rose Bowl Stadium.

After the game the band staged an impromptu concert when spectators called on the members for nine encores.

Saturday the marchers were invited to participate in pre-game formations at the East-West Shrine game in San Francisco. They also staged a parade and concert there.

Leaving the West Coast Sunday, the band stopped for concerts in Salt Lake City, Monday and Denver Tuesday, en route to Lansing.

A highlight of the band reception at the Grand Trunk station was a presentation to two Oldsmobile officials of honorary band memberships. Ed Spink, band president, made the awards to J. J. Debo, assistant manager to the president, and A. S. Corwin, traffic manager.

Dick Goodrow, band publicist, called the trip a "great success," indicating that the MSC musicians played to more than 100,000 persons during the course of the trip, outside of the Rose Bowl.

He said that the band's reception on the coast was highly favorable and that many California sports scribes called it the best musical unit to appear in the Rose Bowl in recent years.

Although the band's arrival Wednesday night came after the completion of winter term registration, the members won't have to go through special procedures before starting classes. All were pre-registered before embarking on the Pasadena journey.

Six Staffers on Leave State Board Accepts Grants of \$102,000

At its December meeting, gifts and grants totaling \$102,714.84 were accepted by the State Board of Agriculture.

A grant of \$35,000 was accepted in the renewal of a memorandum of agreement with the Detroit Arsenal of Centerline, Mich. Prof. J. W. Donnell, chemical engineering department, will use the grant to be used to collect and abstract articles on a classified secret government contract.

A \$10,000 grant from the International Highway Safety Foundation of Detroit will be used by Dr. E. L. Hadden, dean of the Continuing Education Service, to continue the program of driver education now in progress.

Kellogg Company of Battle Creek presented a grant of \$7,000 in renewal of a memorandum of agreement to do remodeling work on the runs at the dog kennels. The grant will be directed by C. M. McCarty of the Kellogg farm. A grant of \$6,000 was accepted from the National Association of Educational Broadcasters, to be used under the direction of R. J. Coleman, director of WKAR. The grant will be used to produce a 15-program series entitled "Great Lakes - Pathway to Progress," for distribution over the NABE tape network.

The State Board accepted a \$3,000 grant from the Research Corporation of Chicago, to provide research assistance and equipment for an investigation of the near infra-red spectra of certain molecules. Prof. C. D. Allen Jr. of the department of physics and astronomy will direct use of the grant.

A \$5,000 grant from Mrs. Ellen E. Fox of Deerfield Beach, Fla., was accepted. The grant will be added to the W. R. Brown scholarship fund.

At the meeting, one appointment, six leaves of absence, and two resignations were approved.

Dr. Clinton E. Peterson of Iowa State College was appointed associate research professor of horticulture. Dr. Peterson will direct a program of vegetable breeding similar to one at Iowa State.

Leaves of absence were granted to staff members of the following departments: Henry A. Stoeck, forestry; Edgar L. Kirk, music; Ralph P. Turner, police administration; and Bert E. O'Brien, economics.

Resignations accepted included Prof. Arthur L. Isbet, horticulture, and Thomas A. Barton, instructor in landscape architecture and urban planning.

Three Held In '48 Attack On Reuther

**Five Others Sought
By Detroit Officials**

DETROIT (AP) - Prosecutors Wednesday accused four men of conspiracy and assault with intent to murder CIO President Walter P. Reuther five years ago, and withheld names of four other persons sought in what they called a "solution" to the attempted assassination.

Wayne County Prosecutor Gerald K. O'Brien disclosed names of three men in jail and a fourth still being sought, but withheld names of the other four and information on evidence he had before the pre-dawn announcement and arrests Wednesday.

Warrants for arrest of the men were based on police information and officials said no grand jury action would be required to bring them to trial.

O'Brien in saying "This is the solution," added, however: "There may be other involvements."

RAF Plane Crashes

ALDBURY, England (AP) - A two-engine Royal Air Force troop carrier plane carrying an RAF rugby team crashed on a blizzard swept hillside Wednesday night, killing 15 of the 16 men aboard. Two men were pulled alive from the wreckage strewn over the snow at Toms Hill, 30 miles north of London. One died in a hospital; the other man was in critical condition. The pilot of the plane, a Valetta, apparently became blinded by the storm and crashed into trees.

Scott Fills New Post

IONIA, Mich. (AP) - Acting Corrections Director Gus Harrison Wednesday was elevated to the permanent \$12,000-a-year post by the State Corrections Commission. Robert H. Scott, associate professor of police administration at Michigan State College, was appointed assistant director in charge of the youth division.

By scoring more than 100 runs again in 1953 Stan Musial extended his own record of "most consecutive years scoring 100 or more runs." He accomplished the feat for the 10th consecutive year.

One of the Defendants of the trial Wednesday of six Michigan Communists tried to injure develop- ments of the Walter Reuther shooting but didn't get very far.

Philip Schatz started to say that Communists had been accused of the attack but Federal Judge Frank Picard cut him off with: "That has nothing whatsoever to do with this case."

One of these arrested and the one sought figured prominently in hearings of the Michigan Senate Crime Commission here in February, 1951. Both confessed they had made huge profits on scrap metal contracts with two companies, both often the scenes of violence in union attempts to organize them.

One is Carl Renda, 36, arrested at his home in expensive, suburban Grosse Pointe, and the other is his father-in-law, Santo Sam Perrone, 56, an ex-convict whose police record dates back to 1929. Perrone is sought. Renda stood mute on arraignment and was placed under \$25,000 bail.

Clement Jacobs, 46, of Tawas, Mich., was taken in custody in nearby Windsor, Ont., and O'Brien said that the fourth man named in the warrant, Peter Lombardo, 31, is serving five years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan., for possession of counterfeit money.

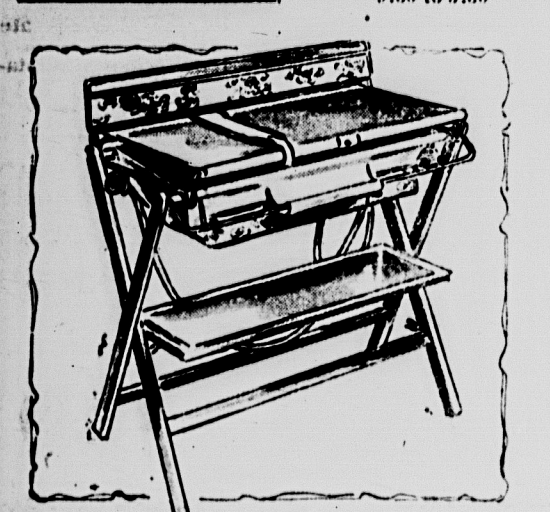

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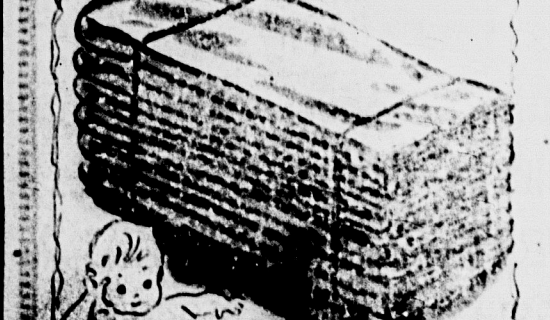

Bolden, Dohoney Top Spartan 'Ironmen'

All-American selectors who picked Capt. Don Dohoney as Michigan State's top all-around player in the 1953 season and LeRoy Bolden as the best Spartan back, have the solid support of Michigan State coaches.

Neal Slated To Start in Senior Bowl

Jim Neal, 210 pound Spartan center from Muncie, Ind., has been named to Paul Brown's tentative starting lineup in the annual Senior Bowl.

The game pits the top seniors north of the Mason-Dixon line against the pride of Dixie at Mobile, Alabama this Saturday.

Besides Neal, the North squad shows Spartans Billy Wells and Don Dohoney.

Brown chose Northwestern's quarterback, Dick Thomas to direct the North's starting backfield which includes 185-pound Harland Carl of Wisconsin, 180-pound Gene Fikowski of Villanova and 210-pound Tom Allman of West Virginia.

Joe Collier of Northwestern and John Ryan of Illinois, both 190-pounders, will be the ends.

The heaviest man on the squad is tackle Bob Flock of Syracuse at 256. The other tackle is Don Chelf of Iowa, 203.

The guards will be Mike Takacs, 203, from Ohio State, and Boston University's Ray Caton, 207.

Steve Green, ex-New York Giant coach, will oppose Brown.

For some of the 47 players from each squad, it will mark their first and last pro game, since the players get cash as well as glory for their afternoon's work.

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Joe Collier of Northwestern and John Ryan of Illinois, both 190-pounders, will be the ends.

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Spartans Elect Bolden, Kauffman

A tie vote, cast in an airplane, resulted in Michigan State's first football co-captains since 1942.

LeRoy Bolden, halfback from Flint and Don Kauffman, from Paducah, Ky., were the men honored to lead teammates during the season. The voting was on the plane returning after their 28-20 Rose Bowl triumph.

Both men were key in dark as to their selection. They knew nothing about it until they read of the choice in newspapers.

Ordinarily in the case of a vote another, ballot, would be cast, but after a conference between Don Dohoney, the captain, and head coach B. Munn they decided to have captains and awarded the tie to both of them.

Bolden, the smallest was the team at 5 feet 7 and 160 pounds led the Spartans running and scoring for the season and is considered a top bet for All-American next year.

Kauffman, 6 foot 1 and 165 pounds, served as Dohoney's study most of the year but also rated highly as a utility since he can play either side of the line on offense or defense ranks as a good punter.

Oddly enough the last co-captains have been chosen from the ranks of the ends and backs. Dohoney, last year's captain and Kauffman, led the Spartans in 51 touchdowns while the 1953 team had 47.

The last co-captains were tackle Dick Mangum and halfback Wally Patterson who were in charge of the 1949 team.

When questioned about selection, Bolden said: "It was a surprise to me. I could not be reached for a moment."

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Russia Agrees To Atom Talks

Plan Proposes Pool For Peaceful Projects

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States and Russia agreed today night to hold preliminary talks concerning President Eisenhower's atom-for-peace plan.

The Soviet Foreign Ministry in Moscow announced Russia was ready to begin the talks—which will deal with such questions as how and where negotiations would be held.

The State Department declared Secretary of State Dulles would proceed at an early date with the conversations with Russians.

The talks are scheduled to be in Washington with Soviet Ambassador G. M. Zarubin for Moscow.

President's plan calls for an atomic pool, to which atom-borne energy would contribute some of its power. The President said the plan, since the United States has been unable to agree to a system of control of atomic weapons, the thing to do is to apply the atomic problem from the angle—a pool of atomic energy for peaceful purposes.

Behind this is that if the plan should work out, the cooperative effort among nations might lead eventually to solving or outlawing atomic war.

Though the talks to which we agreed Wednesday were preliminary, they could be of major importance.

One thing, they could provide a tip-off to officials here as to whether Russia is really interested in making any progress now in solving some of the internal problems posed by the atomic age.

Which here have held that United States would keep its atomic power in its own hands and other officials have been informed about progress of private discussions with the Soviets.

It is realized that, as negotiations develop, they must at some point involve all of these powers clearly under the sponsorship of the United Nations.

A key point in the President's proposal, which was made in speech Dec. 8 to the United Nations, was that the United States has taken the lead in the atomic age.

'Life' Expose Pitdown Man Known Fake, Says Scheele

A recent magazine article showing the falseness of Pitdown man as "the earliest human" was not a surprise to most anthropologists, according to Dr. Raymond L. Scheele, assistant professor of anthropology.

"The falseness of the find has been known for many years," Dr. Scheele said.

A recent Life carried a story about three British scientists examining the Pitdown man's jaw bone and finding it a clever fake. When the remains were found in 1912, it was called the greatest anthropological find of the century.

The Pitdown head was reproduced in hundreds of museums and was called by some the missing link between the man and the ape. Now it is known that the jawbone is from a 50-year-old ape and marked with odd scratches and stains showing it had been retouched to make it look old.

According to Dr. Scheele, it was known theoretically that the bones had to be a fake before they were re-examined.

Dr. Scheele explained that supposing the bone to be a fraud before the tests were applied is an excellent example of how theory can be applied to arrive at facts.

Dr. Scheele said "It was the theoretical research which established that the find was inaccurate and led to the further examination of the remains."

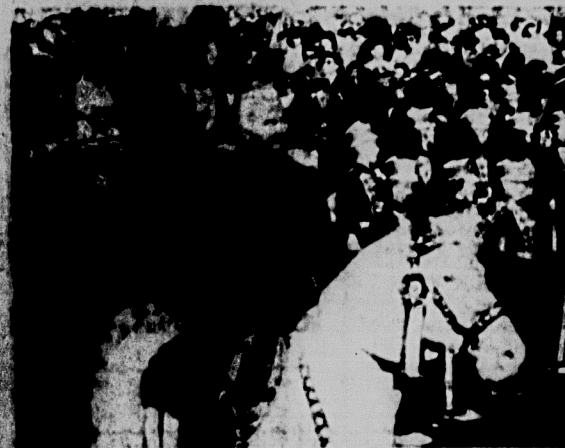

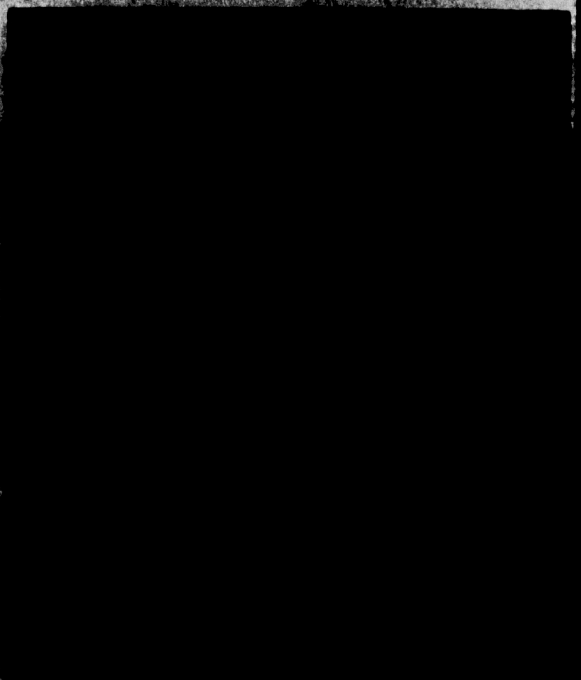
