

Too often, netoriety brings recognition while good deeds stand unnoticed in the ckground.

Michigan State made the headlines last spring when a handful of adolescents de-cided to stage an impromptu "panty raid." Its erstwhile probationary status in the Western Conference evoked many a raised eyebrow. And various isolated cases of student miscanduct have brought notice.

'New, however, the shoe is truly on the other foot. The behavior of hun-dreds of MSC students in California and on route to the coast still has officials scratching their heads in he-

How, they wonder, can trouble stay on the sidelines when so many young persons are far from home and apparently free from parental surveillance? Can pride in school and self and the workings of conscience serve as a deterrant factor?

The college's student representatives on the Rose Bowl jaunt proved that the

answer can be only an emphatic "YES!" A clear-thinking group of student voyageurs descrve unlimited laurels for proving that a large group of young people can behave in the right way at the proper time. Previously, student groups half the size of the MSC entourage caused enough trouble to force a possible curtailment of fu-ture Röse Bowl trains.

But not at Michigan State. Administration officials have indicated that, should the Spartans receive the nod again in future years, a similar college-sponsored trip will probably be forthcoming.

their praise. "The finest group we have ever worked with, bar none," Art Bremen, traffic manager of the Detroit area for Union Pacific, said. "We appreciated the student attitude and cooperation

A similar attitude was put forth by Bain Fischer, traffic manager of special tours for Santa Fe. He said simply that he "had never seen anything like it."

The management of the Hotel Alexan-dria, which housed 636 students during the five-day stay in Los Angeles, was equally prolific in its words of commendation. In a letter to Pres. John A. Hannah, Harry W. Beckett, general manager of the hotel, said: "In all my years of experience I

have never seen a nicer group of young people. They conducted themselves in a most orderly manner . . . I wish to commend you and your staff for the outstanding manner in which your students, conducted themselves."

Words, however, speak less clearly than do actions themselves. On other student trips, it has been necessary to install two trainmasters and conductors on each train to curb student exuberance. A similar arrangement on the Spartan trains ended in little more than a "free ride" for the excess personnel. There just wasn't enough student misconduct to warrant such close scrutiny

Admirable showing, students. If you make a similar jaunt in 1956 or 1957, you have a real mark to shoot for.
