## Basis for Warrants Collapses

**Lack of Evidence May Acquit Men**  
DETROIT (AP)—The key police witness in the Walter Reuther shooting case Wednesday told newsmen he had no knowledge of or connection with the 1948 shotgun attempt on the life of the CIO president. The unexpected statement by Donald Ritchie was released by his attorneys just 24 hours before U. S. authorities were to go into court at Windsor, Ont., and seek his extradition. He had refused to return to Detroit voluntarily.

Ritchie's story to Wayne County Detroit authorities earlier this month led to the issuing of warrants against four men accused of taking part in the attempt to slay Reuther, who was then and is now president of the CIO United Auto Workers.

The reputation of previous statements made to Wayne County Prosecutor Gerald K. O'Brien Jan. 6, was expected to make the extradition proceedings harder for Michigan authorities. O'Brien previously stated that Ritchie's statements were the basis for conspiracy warrants against four men implicated in the shooting.

The four are: Carl Renda, 35; Santo Sam Perrone, 56; Clarence Jacobs, 46, and Peter Lombardo, 51. O'Brien said his case against the four would collapse without Ritchie's testimony. Ritchie's original statement to O'Brien, reportedly was unsigned. It named Jacobs as the "trigger man" in the assassination attempt and named Perrone as one of the plotters of the shooting. Lombardo was named as the driver of a car which carried the plotters to Reuther's home in Detroit. Renda was named as the man who paid off participants in the shooting. Ritchie was named a defendant in the case after he fled from police protection in Detroit Jan. 8 and went into hiding with his common law wife, Betty White in Canada.

A student arrested for stealing a car Jan. 9 was also expelled and the car was recovered.

The strike served to lessen a red threat to Thailand, across the Mekong, and open the way for resumption of river and road traffic between the north and south of Laos, one of the three associated states of Indochina.

## Heifetz Performance Displays Sensitivity

Bad weather did not keep a capacity crowd from attending the recital of the internationally acclaimed violinist, Jascha Heifetz, in the Auditorium Wednesday night. Because of the weather, Heifetz did not use his Stradivarius violin, but chose rather the equally famous "Dolphin" Guarnerius. Opening his recital with the grand sweep of the Handel E Major Sonata, Heifetz at once revealed a broad, clear tone and wonderfully sensitive phrasing. The large movement, especially, seemed to reveal the rounded perfection which has brought him his present fame.

A rather raw, but exciting and dramatic performance of Grieg's E Minor Sonata appealed to the MSC audience. The folk-like rhythms and melodies of Grieg's music sometimes border on monotony, but the third of his violin sonatas is an outstanding exception. The number required close ensemble between piano and violin, and gave Emanuel Bay a chance to display his ability. This is the 19th straight year that Bay has accompanied Heifetz.

The difficult unaccompanied sonatas of Bach have been recently recorded in their entirety by Heifetz. He played the first Sonata in G Minor with a dedicated warmth that moved the audience. The last number of his program was technically most spectacular. The 19th century Belgian composer Vieuxtemps, himself a violin virtuoso, wrote five showy concertos for violin. Heifetz played the last of these difficult concertos. He chose three encores: the delicate, muted "Maid With the Flaxen Hair" by Debussy, a rhythmically appealing Prelude by Gershwin, and the finale of the violin air "Old Vienna." The first two were arranged for violin by Heifetz.

Heifetz remembers his concert here four years ago, and also recalls playing, several years past, with Dr. Ernst Victor Wolf, head of the piano department at MSC. Although never nervous, he is continually dedicated and alert in his performances. He pursues his hobby of stamp collecting almost as ardently as his career of music, and his highest ambition is to find a triangular music stamp. Heifetz has all the technical facility of the violin masters of the past. His dynamic nuances may not be as good as Kreisler or Elman, but he certainly ranks among the greatest violinists of all time.

### Tryouts Set For Speech Competition

#### Contestants to Vie In Talks on Peace

Local tryouts for the Inter-collegiate Peace Speech Association's 48th annual contest will be held Jan. 26 and 28. The four MSC representatives will compete with students from about 11 other Michigan colleges at Ferris Institute in Big Rapids on Feb. 15.

The contest is divided into men's and women's divisions. Any phase of peace may be the contestant's topic. The general topic for the inter-collegiate contest is "Peace through Trade and Aid."

In the oratory contest, the speech may not exceed 1,200 words. Contestants in the extemporaneous division will have one hour to prepare an eight-minute speech on some sub-topic of "Peace through Trade and Aid."

Cash awards will be given. The winning speeches at Ferris will be taped and the tape recordings will be sent to the national committee for judging. National winners will be announced in the spring.

Last year a Hope College student, Gus Van der Jaet, won second prize (\$0 dollars) in the national contest.

Any MSC student who has no F's on his record (Big 10 requirement) is eligible to participate. Gordon Thomas of the speech department said anyone who wishes to try out should contact Prof. Thomas for details.

### Tax Vote Set By Judiciary For Spring

By a unanimous decision Tuesday afternoon, the All-College Judiciary paved the way for a student government tax vote at spring registration instead of later in the term.

According to Amendment One of the government constitution, the tax must be voted on at the spring election of 1954.

Jack Subar, chief justice of the court, said that the question presented to the court was "Just what election is the spring election?"

The decision reads in part "spring election means the day or days designated by the Congress for the vote on the tax."

The tax was originally passed at an all-college election late in spring term 1951. It was set up temporarily for two years with 1954 designated as the time for a permanent vote.

Reason for changing the voting time, according to Dave Hyman, government president, is that the government feels more students would vote at a registration ballot.

Hyman said Congress would decide the issue at another meeting, possibly next week.

### Depicts Career Cabinet Gives Cup to Ike For First Year

WASHINGTON (AP)—A beaming President Eisenhower got a surprise gift from his Cabinet—a handsome crystal cup depicting highlights of his career—as he began his second year in the White House Wednesday.

The 65-year-old chief executive, presented by an aide as "tribute on the challenge" of perhaps the toughest job in the world, received the gift while Cabinet members, Republican party officials, leaders of the Citizens for Eisenhower Committee and White House assistants looked on.

Mrs. Eisenhower also was present for the ceremony marking the first anniversary of her husband's inauguration.

### Plans Drawn Up for New High School

Plans for a new East Lansing high school to be located on a 31-acre lot at the corner of Albion and Durham have been drawn up by a recently-formed taxpayers' school facilities committee.

"The committee was favored to gather facts and figures to be presented to the taxpayers to show the need for a new school," according to Ralph Steinhilber, chairman of the 12-member committee.

Plans for a new East Lansing high school to be located on a 31-acre lot at the corner of Albion and Durham have been drawn up by a recently-formed taxpayers' school facilities committee.

Voters who are not registered are asked to do so through the city clerk or township clerk before Monday, Feb. 15.

The school would be built to house from 600 to 800 pupils, anticipating a 1,501 enrollment by 1961 for junior and senior high grades.

At a recent meeting of the taxpayers' committee, Malcolm Williams, of the Warren S. Holmes architectural firm, displayed a blueprint of the work planned so far. Plans show a one-story wing containing 24 classrooms and a library, and in the opposite wing, a two-story structure containing the gymnasium, auditorium, swimming pool, music rooms and cafeteria.

Last year a similar plan for a new high school was presented to the voters, but failed. Estimated expenses have been cut from \$8 million to \$1,800,000.

### MSC Staffers Study Noted Election Races

#### Press Coverage in 1952 Analyzed

Professor Ralph Smuckler and Leroy Ferguson of the MSC political science department's Governmental Research Bureau have been engaged in a study on Press Coverage of the 1952 Senatorial Elections in Connecticut and Wisconsin.

In this study, Smuckler and Ferguson have scrutinized the newspaper coverage of the famous Wisconsin campaign in which Senator Joe McCarthy defeated his Democratic opponent, Thomas Fairchild.

Two Connecticut elections studied were William Purtell, Republican, who faced the Democratic incumbent, William Benton.

In the election to fill the vacancy left by the death of Republican Brian MacMahon, President Bush ran against Democrat Anthony Riboldi. In the two Connecticut elections, Purtell, Republican, and Bush (D) were victorious. McCarthy (R) topped the Wisconsin contest.

The Smuckler-Ferguson study aims were: (1) The use of issues made in the press; (2) the general nature of the campaign appeals; and (3) the manner in which the press handled the election news.

About 20 daily papers and 25 weeklies in the two states from six weeks preceding the elections were used in the study. The methods of the research have included a content analysis of the papers in the two states. The study is part of the Bureau's research into American political procedures. Results of the study will be made public in a couple months.
