NFL Revises Controversial Video Rule

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The National Football League bowed to a court order Wednesday and re-wrote its controversial rule concerning control of television of league games.

The NFL club owners, in a preliminary to the opening of their annual meeting Thursday, unanimously decided not to appeal the ruling handed down last fall by Judge Allan E. Grim in the U. S. District Court.

Some club owners, feeling that Judge Grim's ruling had vindicated to a certain extent their stand on television controls, wanted to appeal to a higher court in hope of getting a more favorable decision.

After hearing the league's lawyers explain and interpret the decision, they agreed unanimously that there would be no appeal.

The past three weeks have been devoted primarily to conditioning. This is the hardest part of the season to the trackman.

Several performances of the recent practices seem to indicate that the holiday trials are beginning to iron themselves out.

Dick Jarrett, Oak Lawn, Ill. senior, paced off the 1,000-yard run in 2:18.9, a mark that would have been a new school record if it had been run in an intercollegiate race. The official record is 2:18.3.

Speedster Kevin Gosper, Australia senior, has whipped off a 300-yard dash in :33.4 in the 300-yard dash. Gosper is heading into his first year of competition for Michigan State.

In the 600-yard run, Dave Hoke, Oklahoma City sophomore, turned in a good 1:14.8.

Other men who are showing signs of getting into good shape for the distance and middle distances are seniors Lyle Garber, Riverside, Calif.; John Cook, London, Ont.; Ken Barley, Corva, N. Y.; and Lee Vartha, Plymouth.

In the sprints, a two-way battle is going on between Ed Brabham, Brooklyn, N. Y. sophomore and Travis Buggs, East Chicago, Ind. sophomore.

The top candidates for starting hurdle positions are John Corbett, Buffalo, N. Y. senior; Henry Olson, East Chicago, Ind. senior; and surprising Joe Savoldi, Harvard sophomore. Savoldi is also one of the leading high jumpers.

Dave Goodell, Mt. Pleasant sophomore, is the leading shot putter at the present time. Big gun in the pole vault at the present time is Chuck Coykendall.

The first competition of the year for the squad will be the Michigan A.A.U. meet at Ann Arbor, Feb. 6.

Philadelphia Delays Split With NBA

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The Pennsylvania Athletic Commission Tuesday deferred for at least 60 days its plan to withdraw from the National Boxing Association, hoping to "reach agreement" with the NBA "and preserve boxing."

Commission Chairman Frank Wiener said bluntly "something must be done about the awful matches recently seen on television—and we must restrain TV, too."

Winner, backed up by commissioners George Jones, Jr. and John Haskins, gave those reasons why Pennsylvania "is very dissatisfied with the NBA's:

1. "It showed weakness" in not suspending Archie Moore, lightweight champion, when he failed to sign to defend his title against Harold Johnson; instead Moore is defending again against Joey Maxim in Miami Wednesday.

2. "Apparently permits" managers of champions to select opponents in this manner—"and this is not good at all."

3. "We believe NBA should insist that the top contenders always meet the champion in the division."

4. "We do not believe in return matches because it denies opportunities to other contenders."

5. "We do not believe that NBA should permit managers to hold out for exorbitant guarantees, because this is really an effort to avoid a match."

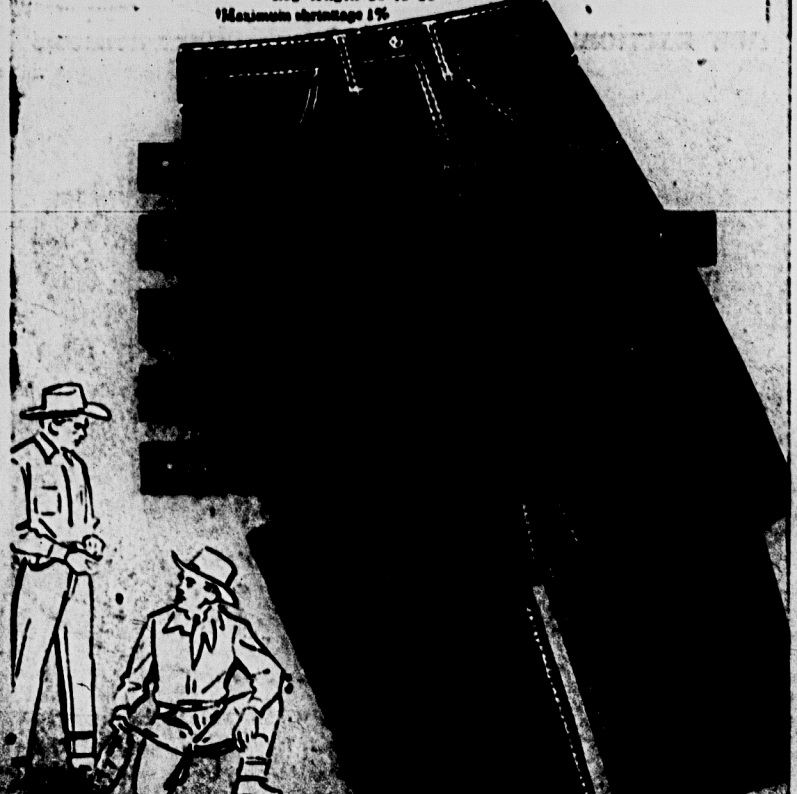
